FROM THE RECTORY

Dear Friends,



As you read this we will be celebrating Advent Sunday when four members of our choir will have been confirmed. Please pray for them as they take this important step in their journey of faith. Advent is a time of preparation for the coming of Christ and there is much about it that is special and magical. At my first Christmas at St Mary's I think it was the crib service and Old Swinford Primary School's Carol Service that most touched me. I'm not sure about 'no room at the inn' but there was nearly no room for the curate to sit down at the latter. It was lovely on both occasions to welcome so many visitors into church and in particular to share the joy and wonder of the children. Please remember that for many Christmas is a time of stress and loneliness and consider how you can bring some of the Christmas Spirit to those in need, whether it is a visit, a gift, encouragement or a safe place to weep. I hope that the following may help you to reflect on the Christmas message.

Les Santons

On my first visit to Marseille I was fascinated by the terracotta figures available for sale in many of the shop windows. 'Oh they are Les Santons' I was told, 'the little saints, all the people who worship the Christ child'. The figures are made of terracotta clay, some are miniatures, others are larger and are dressed in appropriate Provencal costume.

The tradition began around the time of the French Revolution when the people were banned from going to church, especially on feast days, and the local craft makers called santonniers began to make the figures so that the people could worship within their own homes. Setting up of the crib scene is still an important part of the Christmas traditions for many families in Provence.

In some ways this is very similar to the nativity scenes that we have in England but there are some notable differences. The nativity scene itself will consist of the same characters that we have although, traditionally one of the shepherds is dressed in typical Provencal clothing. Rather than the stable being positioned in a village in rural Israel it is based on a Provencal village, in some cases it may be a copy of the village where the scene is set. There are also many other characters in the scene, each one is dressed in Provencal costume and each one bears a gift for the Christ child. One will carry a duck, one a basket of eggs, another a bundle of sticks and another a posy of flowers. Each will bring something according to their gifting and trade. Great attention is paid to detail and each is made with equal care whether it is a model of a wealthy merchant or an old lady with her bundle of sticks. The local priest will be there carrying a red umbrella, apparently a mark of respect at the time. One character has nothing to bring so he carries a lantern to light the way for the other pilgrims. No one is excluded from the scene whether male or female, able bodied or disabled or rich or poor; each one is made with equal care. The elderly are well represented. When I asked why there were so many I was told that their faces are much more interesting to work with.

In some villages there will be a large crib set in the church and the santons in the scene will belong to village members and brought to the church each Christmas. Often the face on the figure will be carved in the image of a relative who has died. I remember one elderly gentleman in his 90's who proudly showed me the figure of his wife that he had made after her death.

I love the inclusiveness of the santons where each comes to worship bringing what they have and whoever they are. May God bless each of you this coming Christmas.

Had I missed something?Then I realised that the event that was being reported was the 50th anniversary celebration of Wendy's leadership of Sunday School *all of sixteen years ago.* Phew.... time flies.

Having enjoyed looking through this potted history and smiling whilst remembering a small part of it myself, it's definitely Back to The Future, wishing 'Children Together' and all the Leaders involved, present and future, as many happy years of teaching the Christian Faith to children as have gone before.

For all you computer-minded worshippers and parishioners out there, we will now be able to offer you the chance to view your magazine online as a pdf file. This could be saved and transferred onto any computer device including an i-pod or phone.

Since John Sutton took over as webmaster of the church website, he has been looking at various ways of utilising the opportunities that publishing a website can offer. It is now possible to request to view your magazine online, instead of or as well as having a paper copy through your door. This also means that you will be able to go back and view past copies of the magazine in case you missed any. Older copies of the magazine will be made freely available whilst other more recent copies will have restricted access behind a user name and password. You will obviously still need to subscribe to the magazine to access your copy but even if only 10 people choose to view the magazine in this way then that's 50 sheets of paper and toner ink saved!

To request a user name and password you will need to e-mail the parish office or go to the magazine area of the Church website (see address on Page 2) and submit your e-mail address. Our Parish Administrator will then send you your login details. It is felt that this might broaden the range of people being able to access the magazine and also save costs particularly when posting copies out to people who live further afield. We hope that many people will see the benefits of using the possibilities of our modern technology and will try out this new feature.

Christingle services bring together communities and families and friends of all ages.

Christingle is The Children's Society's largest fundraising appeal, raising key funds (£1.2 million last year) to help support its work with vulnerable children.

Christingle was established by the Moravian Church in 1747 as a symbol of Christ's light and love. The Children's Society introduced it to the Church of England in 1968 and it has since become a popular family and community event. The first Christingle at St Mary's was in 1969. During the celebration children receive a Christingle which is made of an orange, a lighted candle, a red ribbon and sweets on cocktail sticks, each part acting as a symbol of the Christian faith.

This autumn has seen exciting developments and new activities in the Coach House with the introduction of the Clover Leaf Community Group's programme of courses for people with special needs. Clover Leaf has been formed by an enterprising partnership of carers following the closure of some of

Dudley MBC's social care day centres. The Coach House provides an ideal base for their project and their activities complement the initiatives offered by Sounding Board and No Limits Community Project. The Clover Leaf programme includes arts and crafts sessions on Mondays and Fridays and social days with games, music and basic cooking on Thursdays. It is pleasing to see the Coach House resources in regular full daily use in its original mission of services to socially isolated people while retaining the additional range of varied community activities. It also continues to provide a pleasant environment for monthly meetings of church groups including Mothers' Union and The Anchor bereavement care group.

Autumn Coffee Morning

The autumn coffee morning is now established as a regular October half-term fixture which attracts continuing support from visitors old and new. This year's event was as popular as ever; its enjoyment was enhanced by the feel-good factor of the recent Coach House achievements and a lovely autumn morning. Visitors were able to admire some of the contributions from the Clover Leaf group including a splendid mosaic / collage picture of the Coach House, new furnishings and greatly improved gardens. The event included the usual stalls of bring and buy, cakes and preserves and a raffle which collectively raised over £570 for the Coach House funds.





WEBSITE UPDATES

Further to the notes from the editors about the new way of accessing the magazine I would also like to bring you up to date on other website developments.

On the front page of the website we now have a scrolling text banner which is refreshed every week advertising a service or event which is imminent. Also a 3D view of the church which can be accessed when you follow the link to 'click here'. You may be prompted to download a piece of software from Microsoft called Silverlight which will allow you to navigate around a 3D view of the church. I have also added on the front page the ability to download a copy of the current pew sheet in case you weren't able to get to church and a church calendar showing the main services and events taking place in church to keep you up to date. You can scroll through the months ahead or jump to a particular month, print off a copy of the calendar and view the calendar in different formats

Along with the ability to access the church magazine online as described by the editors you can also download a music file from the bell ringing page to listen to the bells ringing a touch of Stedman Triples.

The aim is to make the site a useful and easily accessible source of information both for members of the congregation and also visitors wishing to find out more about the church.

If you have any more ideas of either what you would like to see on the website or how you would like to see the website being developed please feed back to the Parish Administrator. How about the sermon as a podcast? No guarantees, but I'll do my best to incorporate your idea into the site.

However, we did have time to go into the House of Lords and visit the gift shop, where many souvenirs were purchased! Margot James, MP for



Stourbridge, then welcomed us all in one of the very imposing committee rooms and held a question and answer session for the pupils who asked Margot about her experiences as a new MP, her proudest achievement since her election in May and whether she was friends with the Prime Minister!

Margot said, "It was a real pleasure to welcome local children to Parliament today; they asked a wide range of questions and were really well informed. They are a credit to their school and a credit to Stourbridge."

After lunch by the river – a little windy and cold but at least dry - we set off on our walk along the embankment to the London Eye where our "flight" gave us a birds eye view of the city. All too soon it was time to board the coach home with a weary but still happy band who had had a day to remember.

ST MARY'S WITH ST JOHN'S MOTHERS UNION

Twenty six members attended the November meeting. The opening service was led by Janice Sutton and Betty Foulkes on 'Remembrance.'

The death of M.U. member Edna Brettle was announced and thanks were given for her life and service in nursing, Girl Guides and at St Mary's.

"Relationships not rules" is the M.U. theme for 2010 and our speaker, Margaret Penn, from Kingswinford, gave a thought provoking talk on 'Breaking or bending the rules around the world.' She explained that laws and regulations are needed for order in society – but obeying the LETTER rather than the SPIRIT of the law can stifle change or reason above service, justice or love.

For example, since 1973 MU membership is not restricted but open to all who support the five aims to support family life – so women, men, single, married or divorced are welcome. From 1961 to 1989 East and West Germany were divided by the Berlin Wall and severe restrictions on passing from one side to the other were imposed. Many people did escape – one family even used a gas balloon to cross. Apartheid rules on inter-racial marriage in South Africa were defied despite personal suffering and social exclusion. Now, with legal safeguards, M.U. members can support parents and children of many in hostels or prisons in our Diocese through prayer, gifts or service.

After the vote of thanks refreshments were served.

THIS MONTH'S RECIPE LEMON AND AMARETTI CAKE

I have learnt that for Christmas to appear effortless and fun for your family and friends it is rarely achieved without planning and organisation. With this in mind I suggest you make and freeze this cake in advance. I made it last Christmas as an alternative for Christmas pudding haters and served it warm with home made custard. Any left overs can be eaten as an alternative to Christmas cake.

This is ideal for people who are on a gluten free diet, just check that the amaretti biscuits do not contain flour, occasionally some do. The amaretti biscuits puff up as the cake cooks and turn chewy on cooling. It's a very moist cake and can be served as a dessert.

For the cake:200g softened butter
200g golden caster sugar
200g ground almonds
3 medium eggs
Finely grated zest and juice of 2 small lemons
2tsp sifted baking powder
9 amaretti biscuits depending on size.

To serve:-Sifted icing sugar Crème fraiche or custard

Prepare a 20cm/8in loose bottomed cake tin about 5cm deep. Line and butter the tin. Preheat the oven to 190C/170C fan/gas 5.

Place all the ingredients except the amaretti biscuits into a food processor and mix until smooth.

Spread about 1/3 of the cake mix in the base of the tin. Arrange a circle of the amaretti biscuits on top a few cm from the edge, and a few in the middle. Spoon over the rest of the cake mixture smoothing the surface.

Bake for 35mins approximately until a skewer comes out clean.

Sprinkle with icing sugar just before serving warm or cold with crème fraiche or custard.

- Don't forget to kiss the cook, Happy Christmas.

AND FOR THE WINE.....

Christmas is coming.....although apparently not everyone loves Christmas pudding! On summer's days we might have served our lemon and amaretti cake with a lemon sorbet and opted for an intensely flavoured Limoncello liqueur. However, as a winter dessert, accompanied by custard, we do not need such piercing flavours. A glass of Amaretto would of course pick out the almond flavours wonderfully - the Italians seem to be blessed with all that is best in the world of sweet liquids don't they?! Prosecco carries an almond note: sounds like a Prosecco Passito [with the grapes dried to concentrate the sugars] would be ideal - but I'm only aware of one such wine, imported by a merchant in Oakham. Rutland, with a passion for quirky Italian wines! Nevertheless, the baked cake/dried grape match is persuasive. The cake mixture will moderate the lemon flavouring so let's head to northern Italy, where the technique of air-drying the grapes produces a wine of nicely balanced sweetness and flavours. By contrast, in southern Italy and the islands, the grapes are dried in the sun and the flavours more intense and raisiny. Araldica, a major name in Piedmont in northern Italy produce a more widely available Moscato Passito wine, moderately sweet and spot on here. Hmm, and a winter cruise to the Aeolian Islands off the coast of Sicily to find some Malvasia di Lipari seemed so tempting the things we wine people have to forgo to get the wine-match just right! Enjoy your Christmas sipping.
