Coaching

Game Sense" uses games as a learning tool to:

- increase motivation of players
- · develop tactical and strategic thinking
- improve skills

This approach is "game" rather than "technique" centred. Traditionally, we've taught techniques in isolation, eg repetitions of a particular stroke. While the technique is important, there is limited value in practising it without taking into account other factors involved in executing the skill. By making a modified game the focus of the session, players are challenged to think about what they are doing and why. The players must first have a clear understanding (model) of what the game is about. The technique follows the game when the need for it is established.

Tournament Managers Course

A highly successful course for budding Tournament Managers was held on 6th September at the Marton Croquet Club.

The course was taught jointly by Michael Hardman and John Wall, both from Rose Gardens, Palmerston North, ably assisted by Vince Neall on the computer. It attracted people from as far afield as New Plymouth, Wanganui, Levin and Wellington.

The intensive one-day course gave participants with a good insight on how a tournament should be set up and managed, including pretournament procedures, how to select the best type of draw for the number of entries and the number of days available, and managing the draw as the tournament progresses. It became clear that planning for all contingencies, including the weather, is an essential skill! We now have a much better understanding of setting up blocks for section play, how to work out the subsequent rounds and even how to cope with the formidable "Swiss" format.

The course was very informative and enlightening. Participants came away with a lot of valuable information as well as samples of self-calculating spreadsheets. Just fill in the numbers!

Caption: LEVIN brothers Declan and Connell Leahy have been selected for golf croquet's National Youth Development Squad, just two months after picking up their first **croquet** mallet.



Natural raw talent with a mallet has seen Levin brothers Declan and Connell Leahy selected for golf croquet's National Youth Development Squad, just two months after first learning to play the sport. The brothers started playing socially at Levin Croquet Club's golf croquet twilight sessions, which ran

for six weeks at the start of the year, and their high scores soon came to the attention of club coach Ted Anderson.

"I made it my business to go have a look at them and chatted to them about playing in the Secondary Schools regional golf croquet tournament in March."

Anderson coached the pair for an hour a day, up to four days a week, over three weeks to get them match ready. Representing Waiopehu College, where both are students, the brothers exceeded their expectations of getting into the top three, by beating the eight other schools to come first. Selected to compete in the National Secondary Schools tournament, which ran two weeks later, the brothers came ninth out of 24, playing against more experienced teams, and caught the eye of the National Youth Development Officer and current National Association Croquet champion Greg Bryant.

The brothers are just two of 15 players nationwide selected for the Golf Croquet National Youth Development Squad.

Connell, 17, said playing in the nationals introduced them to a whole new level of skills. "We were pretty happy with our placing but really excited about being selected for the development squad."

They will head off to Dannevirke in December for a four day training session where they will be mentored by the top players in the country. The development squad marks the first step on the pathway for potential selection into the national team to represent New Zealand.

While Declan, 13, reckons big brother is the better player, Connell was quick to respond. "We both bring different strengths to the game. In a head to head match it would be quite even."

Anderson said the brothers have natural aptitude. "There is a lot to learn in the game's strategies and etiquette. We've done the best we can for them and now they've got the chance to go to the top, for them the sky's the limit."

June McDougall has also retired after her third term on the Executive. June has been a hard



Remit and Recommendation Schedule

Part A: Remits forwarded by the CNZ Executive

Remit 1: Executive: Increase in Levies Remit:

The Annual levy for the 2015/16 season be increased as follows:

Existing member	+\$4	\$42.00
Return to Croquet	+\$4	\$42.00
New to Croquet	+\$2	\$21.00
Junior 13-18	-\$8	\$10.00
Junior 0-12	-\$4.50	\$5.00

Reason:

- Increase in CPI
- Likely loss of SportNZ Community Sport Investment from 1/7/2015

Reduction in Youth levies to encourage club membership.

<u>PART B: Remits forwarded by member</u> Associations

Remit 1: Canterbury: Change to Host Reimbursements

Remit:

For CNZ tournaments, with immediate effect, CNZ will reimburse clubs at \$30 / lawn / day which includes the use of other club equipment such as hoops and balls

Reason:

The current commercial cost of maintaining <u>each</u> lawn in round figures, is \$3,500 per annum. At current rates, the reimbursement for many tournaments is less than \$15.00 per day per lawn.

Remit 2: Canterbury: Change to AC Handicap Range

Remit:

For Association Croquet, the minus end of the h/cap scale is to be open-ended to give a level of differentiation for premier players.

Reasons

This is in line with international standards and gives an incentive for minus players to maintain a handicap card.

Remit 3: Canterbury: Change to GC Handicap Range

Remit:

For Golf Croquet, the minus end of the h/cap scale is to be open-ended to give a level of differentiation for premier players.

Reason:

It is internationally accepted that the current handicap system gives an advantage to low handicap players and too little differential between the best players.

Remit 4: Auckland: Conversion Tables

Recommendation

That the AC Handicapping regulations are amended as follows:

Guidelines: "Players New to Association Croquet but with a Golf Croquet handicap to have their starting handicap based on the following table:

GC	New AC
Handicap	Handicap
0	6
1	8
2	9
3	10
4	12
5	14
6	16
7	18
8	20
9	22
10	24
11	24
12	24

A club or association handicapper has the discretion to deviate from this schedule when determining an initial AC handicap based upon any relevant factor including AC coaching received and the player's AC skills.

Explanation:

There is a table for players with an AC handicap to set their GC handicap but no vice-versa.

Remit 5: Auckland: GC Handicapping Regulations

Recommendation

That the Golf Croquet CNZ Handicapping Regulations be amended to incorporate the following clauses from the AC handicapping regulations.

Clause 1 "Definitions" Be added with the following amendments:

Cl 1.3 Changing "Association Croquet players" to" Golf Croquet players"

Cl 1.5 Change "9-16" to "9-12" Cl1.6 Change "Laws of Association Croquet " to "The WCF Golf Croquet Rules" Cl 1.8 Change "bisques" to "extra turns" and delete "(Laws 37 and 46)"

Clause 5 "Players Shall:" Be added after deleting the words "singles" in C5.1, 5.2 and in the last sentence replace the word "singles" with "competitive".

Explanation:

Presently there is no requirement for a player to use their AHS card in the Golf Croquet Handicap Regulations and these amendments will ensure cards are used when competitions are held.
