Now to the nitty gritty of the AGM

Remits

The Executive's remit to increase levies was approved unanimously.

Canterbury's remit to increase host club reimbursement was defeated (9 votes for, rest against)

Canterbury's remit to increase the handicap scale for AC was approved

Canterbury's remit to increase the handicap scale for GC was approved (Both of these need to go to a CNZ handicapping committee to work out where the steps will fall)

Auckland's remit to have a conversion table for GC players starting AC was defeated. Auckland's remit to add wording to the GC regulations was approved.

Counties-Manukau's recommendation regarding Executive minutes was withdrawn

Hawkes Bay's recommendation regarding the name for NZ teams as "Black Mallets" was defeated

Voting for Executive members

Lester O'Brien finished his term as Vice President and has retired. Lester did a short speech on his involvement in croquet and was thanked for his service on the Executive by the President.

There was only one nomination for Vice President and that was from existing Executive member Annie Henry of Nelson. She was therefore elected as Vice President.

In becoming Vice President, that left a vacancy for councillor. There was one nomination, that from Murray Goldfinch of Otago and he was duly elected. Congratulations Murray and we look forward to your contribution to the Executive.

Sunday, 12 October 2014 Session on Challenges that Associations/Clubs Face

Facilitated by D. Annie Henry

An important part of strategic planning is to hear from the people who are closely connected with what is happening at the club and association levels. An hour was given to learn more about the challenges that the associations and clubs have while they are growing. The Executive was asked to sit with their association as observers (and participate where appropriate). The information collected will be used four ways.

First the information collected will be fed back to the Executive to exam the results in light of the CNZ Strategic Plan. CNZ will look at the priority challenges and explore to what extent they can provide support. Second, the Sport Development Officer, Greg Bryant, will be working with the associations as he visits them throughout the country. Challenges that an association (and clubs) face will be fed back to Greg to help in his role of working with the associations. Third, the information generated can be taken back to the respective associations for further discussion and clarity. Fourth, associations could network with others who share the same challenges.

The Process and Results

The first couple of minutes each person wrote what s/he saw as his/her association's challenges. Then they were divided into four groups. Each person shared the challenges and a recorder wrote them. They had time to discuss the challenges and share insights with each other. They selected the top 3 or 4 priorities from the list that was generated. The next part of the process was for each group

to share with the entire group what their challenges were. The top ones were recorded. After each group had an opportunity to report, the top 4 were selected and agreed upon as a first draft. They are:

- Finding administration at club and association levels. (People to serve.)
- Recruiting of members.
- Getting golf croquet players into tournaments
- Needing more umpires and referees

Others listed by the total group but not included in the top priorities were:

- Convert golf croquet players to association players
- Attract midlife members (part of recruitment listed above)
- Keep croquet in the public eye
- Get new players to play competitively.
- Accept young and old players (two groups who sometimes have difficulties being accepted at their stage of croquet life)
- Geographical challenge and culture of the area

Jenny and Chris Clarke provided the coaching on Friday and then 16 players ranging from -4 to 6 played a Swiss event with prizes in different handicap ranges on Sat to Mon.

The temperature varied from 22 to 8 degrees and the lawns were running around 10-11 seconds until Monday's rain. Jenny Clarke was fast out of the blocks, recording a number of triples, but suffered a defeat to Peter Couch, who after taking 4.5 hours to beat a Tony O'Donnell (handicap 6) in the first game, managed to complete a tpo to beat Jenny. Elsewhere, Richard Kimberley reached 5/5 before dropping a game to Geoff Duckett and Kathie Grant moved into contention on 3/4 after beating Jenny. Ed Cunningham was playing plenty of games and had just two losses, so was another possible winner.

Losses for Peter and Kathie on Monday morning meant that only 3 players could win. Tournament Management

Preparing for Weather Disruption

Many of us have played in tournaments that were severely disrupted by wet weather and unplayable lawns. It's a lot worse if you are the manager and have to sort out what to do!

Losing the first day of a tournament scheduled for at least two days is generally straightforward. There should be a suitable format for the time left, although it may require Swiss (especially for AC); check the table in the booklet **Managing a Croquet Tournament**. In many ways a total washout of the tournament is even easier because you just send everyone home, as we had to do a few years ago at Rose Gardens.

Where it gets tricky is when you have played a full day and the deluge comes overnight so that you have to start late on the second day and can't fit in the planned number of rounds. This happened a couple of years ago when I was managing a 2-day GC tournament. Although two events could be handled fairly easily, the other was planned as an 11-round round robin and there wasn't time to play all the last 5 rounds. Whatever way I split the field into two sections, some first day games wouldn't count and we would need to fit in a few section play games before the two section winners could be found and play the final.

Since then I have thought about how a manager could prepare for the situation where the weather forecast is bad but significant loss of time on day 2 is not certain. The result is a series of draws similar to those under **Some**

Selected Draws for Seeded or Random Section Play in Managing a Croquet Tournament, but which can be split into two sections if necessary part way through a tournament. For example, the draw for 12 players below can be split into two sections of 6 with the first 5 rounds counting as section play.

Players ADEHJM go into Section 1 and BCFGKL into Section 2.

JOHN W. SOLOMON

It is with much sadness, but also with many many happy memories that I remember a very dear croquet friend John Solomon, who passed away this month.

From my earliest croquet days at NaeNae Croquet club under Ashley Heenan's tutelage John's name was frequently mentioned by Ashley, usually in the context of something a bit flashy I did on the court, "That might be all very well but you wouldn't last 5 minutes against Solomon". John and Ashley had become friends when Ashley was a musical student in London, sharing both an interest in croquet and music. John was a fine clarinettist and could well have had a career as a professional musician, but as John's mother Pat once told me neither were much as pianists. She had to endure them both hammering out some of Ashley's compositions on the Solomon's pianos!

John started croquet at a young age playing on a lawn in his parent's garden, the mallets were as tall as he was so he invented a unique grip, both

sets of knuckles facing forward, that allowed a small schoolboy to swing one of them. It became known worldwide as the "Solomon" grip. His mother was a member at Roehampton and soon John was cycling down to the club to play. With little tournament experience at age 19 he was selected to play for England in the 1950 MacRobertson Test Series to be held in New Zealand.

He played with much distinction throughout the tests and also won the NZ Doubles Championship with Humphrey Hicks and much to the amazement of all the NZ Open Singles. A feat he was to repeat in 1963 this time winning the doubles with Patrick Cotter. In all he won 48 Championship titles, including the C.A. Open Singles, Men's Singles, and Doubles 10 times each. President's Cup (Best 8 or 10) 9 times, Champion of Champions 4 from 4, and the Mixed Doubles once. He represented England or Great Britain in five MacRobertson Shield Test series, and was the Captain in 1969 and 74. In the 60's peeling finishes were often not recorded with results, so in 1962 when John won all 14 games he played in the President's Cup Maurice Reckitt simply reported, that although he didn't keep count John appeared to complete all his games with a triple peel. He was the first player I knew to attempt sextuple peels and although he never completed one in a match, in 1969 he succeeded in a friendly at the Hastings Croquet club in partnership with David Curtis against Arthur Ross and Frank Bennett. He was very active in Croquet administration starting as a member of the C.A. Council at age 20, he served for 49 years and during this time he was President for 22 years. He fostered Croquet internationally presenting the Solomon trophy for an annual competition between the C.A. and the U.S.C.A.

One very fond memory I have is of a sunny afternoon at Hurlingham, the day of the club picnic in 1986. Prior to the series the visiting MacRobertson Shield players had been invited to take part and help full the croquet courts, so I asked Bernard Neal if he could persuade John to come out of retirement and partner Bernard against Ashley and myself. Paul Skinley and Graham Beale asked if they could be excused from playing so they could watch John Solomon. They arrived to watch complete with a bottle of champagne, not to be out done John ordered two for the players and we enjoyed the most delightful three games of croquet I've ever had the privilege of playing. Paul kindly remarked that it was simply beautiful croquet.

For me he was the greatest and most complete player to ever swing a mallet, the greatest in every sense of the word great, to watch John Solomon playing croquet was like listening to a favourite piece of music.
