they are now. "We're going to need all the friends we can get, and we've got some good ones down there if we've got sense enough to keep them," he observed.

He was asked whether he thought that good-will navy cruises to Latin America might be misinterpreted as a form of "big stick" brandishing, and he emphatically denied it.

"The one thing we don't want to do," he warned, "is to try to wield any big stick. They are a very fine and sensitive people. We don't like anyone interfering in our business, and they don't like anyone interfering in theirs. No domination, no domineering powers, no intervention."

He refused to discuss questions concerning American air and naval bases in South America, saying that he had gone there with "nothing to sell, nothing to buy, and nothing up my sleeve." He also passed questions why he did not visit Argentina, observing merely: "An official making a trip does not control his itinerary. No further comment."

Admiral Halsey is on duty in Washington as an adviser to the Navy Department. Questioned about the possibility that he might leave the Navy, he said that he had "no more idea than a jack rabbit" about his future plans.
