# Five Important Topics To Discuss During Your Rhinoplasty Consultation

Rhinoplasty, also referred to as a "nose job" or sometimes "nose reshaping" is among the most frequently performed cosmetic surgeries performed today. Rhinoplasty alters the proportions of your nose to give you the look you desire. Rhinoplasty may also be done to correct breathing problems due to structural defects within the nose, or to repair facial damage resulted from an accident or other event.

### Are you a good candidate for Rhinoplasty surgery?

If the growth of your face is in full swing and you're in good health, then you might be a suitable candidate for the procedure known as rhinoplasty. Ideally you should be a non-smoker, and you must have realistic goals for the improvement of your facial appearance. If you're in this category, Then read on to learn more about the kinds of questions to ask your surgeon when you meet for a consultation regarding your nose job procedure.

# **General Certifications - Training Experience, Experience, And General Certifications:**

Request information from your surgeon regarding his experience in surgery and his training. Where did he train and what certifications do he have and how long as he or she had been operating on plastic surgeons? There are numerous certifications for plastic surgeons. It is a good idea to research the surgeon you choose after having been to a consultation. Once you plan for additional hints about nose job, <u>browse around here</u>.

### **Rhinoplasty Specific Surgical Expertise**

Ask your surgeon how long he has been performing rhinoplasties and how many total nose jobs he's done during this time. Find out more about their success rate. What percentage of patients are satisfied with their procedures and believe their nose jobs successful? How many require revisions? How many revisions result in satisfied patients? It is also worth asking what number of nose surgeries they perform on a weekly or monthly basis as in addition to what percentage of the overall procedures they carry out include rhinoplasty, as opposed to different surgeries. This will give you a good idea of how often your surgeon is performing the same procedure as well as making sure their rhinoplasty skills are sharp.

### **Revision Policy**

Find out what your surgeon's guidelines regarding revisions if you are dissatisfied with the results. This is a crucial question. One doctor may provide an unreserved revision if you are unhappy with the outcome for various reasons. Another surgeon may be charged extra if they are required to make changes according to particular criteria. Be sure to inquire about the timeline

for revisions - how long after your procedure do you need to wait until a revision becomes possible should you require it.

### **Rhinoplasty Questions Directly Related To You:**

Discuss with your doctor their experience in rhinoplasty to accommodate ethnicities. This will allow you to determine how this procedure could affect the final outcome. Is your surgeon specialized in male or female nose jobs, or does she have the same experience and expertise with all genders? If you're thinking about additional cosmetic surgery procedures in the near future, inquire with your surgeon how your current rhinoplasty might impact these procedures and whether now is the best time to consider a nose job.

# **Rhinoplasty Techniques:**

Request your doctor to explain the methods she uses in <u>rhinoplasty</u> surgeries. Ask your doctor if she utilizes minimally invasive procedures in order to minimize scarring. Talk to your surgeon and do your own research into the options for open or closed rhinoplasty. Additionally, inquire as to which technique your surgeon will use. Two methods surgeons employ to shape the nasal tip are open rhinoplasty and closed rhinoplasty. Closed rhinoplasty is a technique which involves making incisions along the columella (soft tissue that connects the nostrils).
