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Its Celebration in the Churches.

The Day Which Commemorates the Resurrection—How it Will be Observed—The Music, the Flowers and the Pomp and Display Which Will Attend the Festival.

The greatest of all the festivals of the Church occurs on Sunday, when Easter, the day which commemorates the rising from the dead of our blessed Lord and Saviour, will be observed throughout the Christian world. Very dear and precious to the heart of the faithful is this day-the culmination of the forty days of penitence and gloom, breaking in as it does at the end of a week of sorrow incomparable and obasing away every vestige of heartache and soul weariness with the fullness of its irradiating brightness. It is the sunny day in the church year, the brightest of all the red-letter days, coming with the budding of Springtime, when Nature herself in all her plonitude typifies the resurrection. With the breaking of the early morning of the holy day now so close at hand, the first day of the week, and in this instance the first day of the calendar month as well, the joyousness of the Easter feast will be upon all the ohurches, but ospecially upon those of the Episcopal and Romanist faith. In these latter all the pomp and ceremonial of which an elaborately devised form of ritual admits will

be availed of to make of the approaching festival a season of unerampled splendor and display. With altars beautifully bedecked and brilliantly lighted; with holy priests arrayed in gorgeous vestments; with flowers and savory incense and splendid music, and in the presence of multitudes of revorent worshipers the day will be celebrated. This in the large and wealthy congregations; but in the smaller, the more lowly, the prayers and praises which will be uttered will be no whit less fervent, nor will the joyousness be in anywise diminished though the altar bear but a single spray of Spring blossoms placed there by loving hands. How and in what manner the Easter of two days hence will be commemorated in our Churches the record given below tells fully. Our readers may have their choice of high or low services; of matins or of high celebrations ; of services whereat the sweet young voices of children carol forth their Easter lays or of those where the best that money can procure or art provide is set before them. In either choice they will be sure of satisfaction.

The Episcopal Churches.

To those familiar with festival occurrences it will be at once apparent that in the Episcopal churches generally there is a marked advance this year in the character of the music over former seasons. The record is as follows:

ST. ANN'S.

The Easter services in St. Ann's on the Heights will be characterized by all the splendor which attaches to the high celebrations in this church. The Rev. Noah Hunt Schenck, D. D., will officiate, and Mr. Dudley Buck, organist and choirmaster, direct the music, which will be very brilliant. The choir comprises Mrs. Kate Reed, soprano; Miss Lizzie P. Schott, contralto; Mr. J. C. Meacham, tenor; Mr. Henry S. Brown, basso, and large chorus. After the first of May the music in St. Ann's will be under the direction of Mr. A. H. Messiter, organist and musical director of Trinity Church, New York.

Hall and Miss Mary Mc-Cuo, sopraui ; Mrs. James Furey, contraito ; Mr. Joseph Garriga, tenor ; Mr. James Furey, baritone ; Mr. E. Burns, basso, and large chorus.

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OLD TRINITY, NEW YORK.

There will be three services in Trinity Church, Broadway and Wall street, at half past seven, nine aud eleven o'clock. At the latter Hummell's Mass in E flat will be sung, the accompaniment by the Philharmonic orchestra, with Christmas Anthems by Gounod and Gade. The music will be under the direction of Mr. A. H. Messiter, organist and musical director.

Roman Catholic Churches.

Early masses will usher in the dawn of Christmas morning in the churches of this denominato n, and later on the high feast will be celebrated with all the spiendor of circumstance at command. The order of service in the principal churches which follows offers a wide field for choice.

ST. PETER'S.

The musical services in St. Peter's Church, Hicks and Warren streets, are always very fine on high festival days, and for the approaching holiday Mr. Augustin Cortada, organist and musical director, has arranged an exceptionally fine programme, as follows :

ST. THERESA.

At the Church of St. Theresa, Classon avenue and Butler street, high mass will be celebrated by the pastor, Rev. Father McNames. Giorza's Mass in F, for four voices will be sung, under the direction of Miss Marie Lynch, organist, by the choir of the church, which embraces Miss M. Kehoe and Miss M. Burns, soprani; Miss S. McGeehan and Miss Burns, contraiti; Mr. G. Shaw, tenor, and Messrs. E. Gannon and W. Savage, bassi. At the Offertory "Adoremus te" from Lambillotte's four voice mass will be given. Prelude and postiude for organ, by Miss Lynch, complete the musical programme.

ST. STEPHEN'S.
