WHY DO GOLDENS NEED RESCUING? You may be

shocked at how many goldens end up homeless and unwanted. MTGRR has seen a marked increase in owner surrenders of beautiful, healthy dogs. In these cases, our rescue is a wonderful alternative compared to going through the emotional and practical difficulties of rehoming the dog by yourself or turning the dog over to a pound, since owner surrenders are subject to immediate euthanizing, whereas strays are normally held for a few days to give the owner a chance to reclaim them. Furthermore, municipal animal controls do not have resources to deal with the extreme overcrowding that they face, and the tragic bottom line is that there are not enough homes for all the unwanted pets. MTGRR fills a critical role by taking in these dogs, caring for them, and helping them get into adoptable condition.

MTGRR has made a huge difference to so many dogs, but we continue to operate on a very sparse budget. All donations are used to pay vet bills (yes, we get discounts, but the bills are still extensive). In case you are wondering, a donor generously funded the MTGRR branded hats and coffee mugs that are listed on the next page.

Check out the Before and After photos on the following pages to see how your donations can make a difference.

Middle TN Golden Retriever Rescue rescued six "breeder dogs" in late 2008. These females, ranging in age from 5 to 7, were used all their lives to produce litters. Overbreeding and lack of vet treatment caused them to develop painful infections in the mammary glands called mastitis. The infection can kill the litter and cause severe swelling and huge tumors in the mammaries (below left). In addition, the excessive breeding resulted in an aggressive form of malignant ovarian cancer for at least one dog. MTGRR paid extensive medical bills to treat these dogs and placed them into loving and responsible hands, where they are getting affection, care, and kind attention for the first time in their lives.


Success Stories: Penny



In Memory of Mister

"We had three rescued goldens before we got Mister, all of whom were classic goldens, full of fun, self confident and that special golden vibe.

My wife had seen Mister on the MTGRR website and seen something in his face that said this boy needed a home. She drove up to pick him up and visit her sister. When she drove in on Sunday I was somewhat taken aback. Here was a skinny almost hairless boy whose spirit seemed broken. He was scared of his own shadow, very averse to men and very sad. The thing he liked to best was go to a part of the house where he could be alone.

He tolerated me, barely, but hated the sound of my big feet coming up the stairs. If you threw a ball for him, he would run away. No belly rubs were tolerated. No walking on a leash, he would try but freeze up after a short distance.



Yet out in the yard with his brothers and no humans he was a totally different quy, head up, tail up, having fun.



Progress was very slow, I would say it was 2 years before he came to me to get his head rubbed. But that was one of the best days of my life, it meant so much to me that he had come to trust me.

Mister gradually came most of the way out of his shell, he learned to enjoy walking with his brothers, loved to go to the beach, and trips to the Georgia mountains. He still sometimes liked to sit in a corner and stare at the wall, but that was just Mister.

For a boy who had been poorly treated he gave love unreservedly. Biggest darkest eyes of any dog I ever had. And those curls. At the vet he was known as Mister Curly.

His last year (2008) was tough with 2 operations, but he gamely recovered and defied his prognosis by making 1 last trip to the beach and the mountains and had a good Christmas. Of

course, Mister being Mister, his favorite spot was behind the tree! One other little quirk, when we would walk, Mis-


ter always liked to walk right behind me, I feel that he will always be back there just out of sight.
