It feels weird for me to get my hair cut by a male because I'm used to all female hairdressers who work at Supercuts and Sweet & Sassy etc. Another thing I have noticed is that the hair salon's charge is based on the hairdresser's experience level. From 15RMB (\$2.5) regular haircut to an 80RMB superior haircut, the price difference jumps 4 times. I've tried both and I don't feel that the superior haircut amazed me with 4 times the quality of a regular one. Up until now my parents and I have kept with the regular haircut. Oh, I almost forgot, you don't need to add tips in China when you get a haircut. In America a haircut with added tips would cost about \$12.50. With that much money, you can get 5 haircuts in Nanjing!
