Again we are demonstrating against unjustified police killings of two Black people Alton Sterling in Baton Rouge,

LA and Philando Castile in Falcon Heights, MN.

It should be clear to all by now from the responses of the local, state and federal governments and courts, that these are state sanctioned police killings where government finds reasons to deem them as justified.

We must not be deterred from challenging these police killings of our people. Like the mainstream media and government efforts to use the Orlando, Fla. massacre to promote Islamophobia, the Dallas, Texas shootings of police will be another attempt to place the blame on the movement for Black liberation highlighted by the slogan Black Lives Matter.

These police killings and the position of the government represents the same US policy on the endless wars to dominate and exploit oppressed nations and peoples throughout the world. This policy of state sanctioned police killings of mainly working-class Black and Brown people points out the level of crisis of the capitalist economy.

Black Manifesto

The police killings are taking place during a period of economic crisis when corporate and state powers are also subjecting working-class Black,

people of color and sections of the white working-class to conditions causing serious illnesses and death at work and in our communities.

These struggles cannot be effectively fought separately without a political context and alignment of the various struggles as battlefronts of a movement for Black liberation and radical change.

As the deepest and most consistently impacted by the racist capitalist system, other oppressed and exploited peoples and communities look to the Black liberation movement to set a direction that can be the catalyst for the broadest fight back against conditions that negatively impact the majority of the people in the US and throughout the world.

Black Liberation Assembly

In order for the Black liberation movement to be this catalyst and leader, the various struggles against racist capitalist oppression and exploitation must be brought together into a Black Liberation Assembly to unite them around some core demands that help to educate, mobilize and empower the many struggles.

The Black Workers For Justice is calling for the building of a Black Liberation Assembly to begin developing a program that is part of a process of rebuilding the national Black liberation movement.

An organized Black liberation movement led by the Black working-class would have the vision and capacity to build a people's front to wage the broadest struggle for radical change.
