#### FROM THE CURATE



#### Dear Friends

I always think of February as a bit of a dreary month. The days are still quite short, and the weather can either be gloomy and wet or clear and icy. There's really not much to look forward to. There are however two things which I have considered over the years to work in favour of February: firstly it is a short month, and secondly it has Valentine's Day in the middle of the month.

Valentine's Day is a ray of sunshine at the centre of this dark month. I know that it is fantastically over commercialized, and many of the cards are over-sweet or perhaps over-saucy for our tastes. And yet I would wish to champion the day because it is a day which focusses on love, and in a world which seems to have the focus of its attention on dark and destructive things, a day which has at its centre the idea of love, cannot be a bad thing.

Of course love comes in many forms, and can sometimes be twisted and manipulated to show itself as self-centred and controlling. But that is not the fundamental understanding of love which many people share on this day. Instead they celebrate an appreciation of another person for who they are, and the love they declare for that person is outward looking and essentially giving rather than grasping in nature.

It is this idea of love which is at the centre of the Christian faith. We have just celebrated the gift of Jesus to the world as an act of the love. At Easter we celebrate the natural consequence of that loving gift which is rejected by the world as Jesus is crucified, and yet death cannot hold back the power of love and Jesus is raised from the dead.

In the New Testament we read a great deal about love as the key to living a good life. Jesus, and many others, distil the law into two phrases: 'love God and love your neighbour', whilst in his first letter John clearly states that your love of your neighbour is an expression of your love of God, the two must go together as they complement each other.

So perhaps in the middle of this rather dark and dreary month just take the time to think about who you love, and perhaps tell them. That demonstrates your humanity, your love of your neighbour and also your love of God.

Activities available during Lent 2017

## Lent Course - Are you able to attend and/or help lead?

We are in the process of putting together a Lent course which will run throughout the five weeks of Lent, looking at and reflecting upon specific female figures from the bible. Each session will last between 75-90 minutes and will be set up as a home group, with a variety of groups running throughout a week at various times and in various locations. To this end we are looking for friends to volunteer to host a group (you just need to be able to offer your lounge and refreshments) and also to lead a group (a thorough briefing will be given before Lent begins). It doesn't matter whether you can commit to leading or hosting to mornings, afternoons or evenings as we are hoping to get a spread over a week.

You don't need to be either a host or a leader to get involved in the course. We will be looking for people (you don't need to come to St Mary's or attend any church) to come along and join a group. Once the days, times and venues for each group are finalised there will be information available about how to join in.

If you feel that you could offer your house as a host venue, or would like to lead a group (leadership can be shared between two people or more) or would just like further information please speak to either Stephen or Alex. Further information about the course content and times of groups will be circulated in due course.

# **Quiet Day - Praying farewell**

#### NINE LESSONS AND CAROLS

The clock strikes three, the low notes of the organ rumble and then fade away. In red and white robes the choir stand together in front of their conductor who, after a pause, raises his arms and points to one of the young boy choristers. He steps forward and begins to sing, his lone voice echoing the words of 'Once in Royal David's city, stood a lowly cattle shed'.

It is estimated that some 30 million people tune in to the BBC's broadcast of Nine Readings and Carols from King's College, Cambridge every year. It is as if this service alone, for many, stands for all that is Christmas; the history, the music, the words, the setting. In this magnificent building, its founder, King Henry VI decreed in 1441 that 16 'poor and needy boys, of sound condition and honest conversation', along with six professional 'singing men' should raise their voices to the glory of God inside his new chapel.

But this service does not date back to such times, and is, in fact, a much more recent introduction with interesting associations.

Most of us are familiar with the story from the Western Front when, in 1914, German and British troops, together, sung the melody and their own words of 'Silent Night, Heilige Nacht'. Amongst those who lived through the horror, the indescribable, unimaginable brutality and squalor of life in the trenches was a young army padre, Eric Milner-White, in civilian life the chaplain of King's College. When he returned to Cambridge in 1918, this imaginative, sensitive and tremendously kind man set about reforms at King's. Facing the reality of the reactions of the men who had fought alongside each other, Milner-White did away with enforced religious worship for his students, recognizing what he regarded as the 'inevitable under present circumstances'.

Instead, Milner-White set about making the chapel's special occasions, at Easter, Advent and, above all, Christmas - a feast of colour, beauty, warmth and simplicity that would appeal to a grieving generation, disillusioned with faith and hardened by war.

And so the service of Nine Lessons and Carols was born. With no sermon, no psalms, no Latin, it took its inspiration from a format devised by the Bishop of Truro and was open to anyone who wanted to attend. Central to the event was the College's choir who led the simple re-telling of the Nativity story through readings and song.

The college authorities were horrified at the radical departure from tradition but the new service, held just six weeks after the guns in Europe had fallen silent, was an instant success. At its core is Milner-White's 'bidding prayer' of welcome, in which his fallen comrades were movingly commemorated. 'Let us remember before God', says the prayer, 'all those who rejoice with us, but upon another shore - that multitude which no man can number.'

And to return to that lone boy chorister..... No one knows until the conductor's arms are raised to beckon forward his chosen one, who will sing that solo verse. Several boys will have been coached in the preceding days but the final decision is last minute...it helps to avoid the worst of nerves so often the product, not so much of the musical responsibility but, of the excitement and encouragement loaded on the boys by their families.





#### A NEW STEWARDSHIP OFFICER FOR THE DIOCESE

At the end of January, the Revd Alison Maddocks will begin her new role as Stewardship Officer for the Diocese of Worcester. Alison will work with parishes to help them think about and review their financial giving as part of their Christian discipleship.

Revd Maddocks comes to Worcester from the Diocese of Derby where for the past five years she has been a Leadership Development Officer in the diocesan office and vicar of Breadsall, a village two miles outside of Derby city centre. Prior to this Alison was a workplace chaplain in Nottingham and Birmingham and before ordination had 18 years experience working in the head office of Boots in Marketing and Personnel.

Alison said: "I'm really excited about this new post and further exploring the theology behind good stewardship. Discipleship in the everyday has been a strong part of my ministry to date and I'm looking forward to building on this. The Church has been slow to realise the changing nature of the world and the need to re-engage with the material as part of our worship. I'm looking forward to getting out and meeting people, finding out where they are and hearing their stories."

Stewardship is an important part of the Kingdom People vision. Christian discipleship entails not only commitment to the life of prayer, to study of the scriptures and to receiving the sacrament in public worship, it also shapes what we do with our time, talents and money.

Alison has moved to the Diocese with her two relatively grown-up daughters, husband and aged dog! The family love messing about in boats, as well as walking and are looking forward to having a whole new area to explore.

#### **BISHOP JOHN TO LEAD VISIT TO PERU**

Bishop John last visited Peru in early 2012, and there have been major changes since then and since the last group visited in 2014, with three Peruvian bishops consecrated in July 2015 and an indigenous diocesan bishop in place since April last year. The aim of this visit is to strengthen relationships with the new diocesan leadership and to discuss the direction the partnership might take in the future.

The group will travel around the Diocese, hopefully visiting at least three of the five areas of work: Lima, Arequipa and Chiclayo. Recent months have been a period of transition and although the Diocese of Peru is still struggling financially, real efforts are being made to encourage sustainability.

Those in the group who have visited before will be renewing old friendships, and will hopefully provide support and encouragement to the

people of the Diocese and the projects they support. As always, there will also be many things to learn from the Peruvian hosts.

Bishop John said: "I'm very much looking forward to going to Peru again to visit our Christian sisters and brothers there. Our link is a precious one which I value greatly."

Please pray for the trip and for our brothers and sisters in Peru.

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#### **CHURCH ACTION ON POVERTY**

This year the theme of Church Action on Poverty Sunday, 26 February, is 'poor church, transfigured church'. On Transfiguration Sunday, Church Action on Poverty is asking: if our churches are to be communities that put the poorest first, how must we change? What must we let go of? What sacrifices are we called to make? How can we allow God to transform us into what Pope Francis has called a "poor Church for the poor"?

Why not hold a collection or soup lunch – your donations can transform more churches through listening and engaging with people in poverty. Or perhaps you could use the worship materials on the website (www.church-poverty.org.uk/sunday) to reflect and pray for change.

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#### A NEW CHAPLAIN TO THE QUEEN

Buckingham Palace has announced that the Revd Georgina Byrne, Residentiary Canon at Worcester Cathedral, has been appointed as a Chaplain to the Queen.

This honorary role will be in addition to Georgina's duties at the Cathedral. Chaplains to the Queen preach occasionally in the Chapel Royal in St James' Palace, London. They wear a scarlet cassock and special bronze badge. There are currently 34 honorary chaplains to the Queen; when appointed, Georgina will be the youngest.



Georgina said:

"I feel extremely privileged to have been honoured in this way. The letter from Buckingham Palace arrived, like a very special gift, just before Christmas and I've been smiling ever since."

The Bishop of Worcester, Dr John Inge, said:

"Canon Georgina Byrne is an outstanding priest and I am delighted that this has been recognised by Her Majesty the Queen. The great honour bestowed on her is good news for us at the Cathedral and in the Diocese: we can all bask in reflected glory."

The Dean of Worcester, the Very Revd Peter Atkinson, said:

"All at Worcester Cathedral will be delighted by the news of this honour for a popular and respected member of the cathedral community."

The appointment as a Chaplain to the Queen is made by Her Majesty herself following a nomination, generally from the candidate's diocesan bishop and the Bishop of Carlisle, the Rt Revd James Newcome, currently Clerk of the Closet and as such head of the College of Chaplains of the Ecclesiastical Household. The last Chaplain to the Queen in the Diocese of Worcester was the former Archdeacon of Worcester, the Venerable Frank Bentley.

#### ST MARY'S WITH ST JOHN'S MOTHERS' UNION

We learned that through our fund raising we were able to make donations to 'Away from it All Holidays', which provides a welcome break away for families who otherwise would not be able to afford one, The Women's Refuge, a safe place for abused women and their children, and Wheels for Africa which helps towards the cost of providing transport to Community Development Co-Ordinators in very remote regions of Africa.

There was no other business and our meeting concluded with tea and biscuits kindly provided by Audrey Tranter and Janet Shaw.

The members would like to thank Anne May for her lovely gift of scented sachets which were in all our New Year packs, received at our last meeting.

Our next meeting will be on 14th February when our speaker will be Maureen Baker whose topic will be "My passion for flowers".

We wish all our members who are unwell, a speedy recovery and look forward to seeing them in February.

#### THIS MONTH'S RECIPE

#### **EASY TOMATO SOUP**

Almost a store cupboard recipe as I always have these ingredients in my cupboard. It does taste and look very much like the most popular tomato soup. I make it for my grandchildren instead as it's a healthier option and cheaper. Feel free to add salt if you must but I find a stock cube takes care of the seasoning.

500g carton passata
1 potato peeled and chopped
1 onion peeled and chopped
1 vegetable stock cube and water
Milk
Olive oil

Fry the onion gently in the oil without browning until soft. Add the potato and passata, crumble in a stock cube, add boiling water; enough to cover the vegetables. Simmer for 30 minutes until the potato is soft. Cool slightly before blending in a food processor until smooth. Gradually add enough milk until you have the correct consistency. Re-heat and serve.

#### AND FOR THE WINE...

Tomato, onion, olive oil, potato: farmhouse fare, which sounds like a candidate for a rustic red doesn't it? Except here we are making a soup and significantly, we are using passata. Tomatoes, freshly plucked from the plant match wonderfully with a cool climate Sauvignon Blanc - indeed "tomato plant aroma" occurs periodically as a tasting note for this grape. However, the passata brings a rather different dimension. We may not be talking rich intense sun-dried tomato, but we are certainly contending with a note of sweetness which we should reflect in our wine selection.

The other factor here is the quantity of milk you choose to add. If you only add a little and retain much of the richness of the passata, perhaps an Amontillado sherry might be just right - an ideal sipper at the start of the meal.

However, if you increase the milk/passata balance, then an off-dry white wine might suit better. Sparkling? Riesling Sekt is difficult to beat as an off-dry bubbler, but its clean fruits are not the answer here. Instead, an off-dry English wine could be a sound choice. Avoid anything too light-bodied and low in alcohol as it will be overwhelmed unless you go for a really milky soup - which doesn't sound a good sell to me! However, there are some promising options. The Bacchus grape is always described as Sauvignon-like. Steer clear of anything leaning too much to citrus and lime-blossom flavours. Plump instead for a Madeleine Angevine from a good producer: Sharpham Estate on the banks of the Dart valley in Devon still wins for me.

#### LETTER FROM THE BISHOP OF WORCESTER

Andreas Whittam Smith is best known as the man who started the Independent newspaper. Equally significantly, as First Estates Commissioner, he has effectively 'run' the Church Commissioners for quite a few years – and done so brilliantly. He's stepping down soon and late last year he addressed the House of Bishops. I was struck by what he said – that he feels more hopeful



about the Church of England now than he has done for a long time.

That's quite something coming from a seasoned old hack like Andreas and I found it very encouraging. Why did he feel so hopeful? He felt the Church is at long last waking up to the fact that 'business as usual' is no longer an option and, more than that, is taking bold and innovative steps to reform and renew.

The scale of the challenge is enormous: The proportion of people in our country who have much understanding of the Christian faith, let alone practise it, is declining fast. What is needed is nothing less than the reevangelisation of England. That's not an invitation to despair though, but a challenge to which, in the power of the living God, we can rise.

One exciting development in our diocese is the *Calling Young Disciples* project. Ruth Walker, its director, has already begun her ministry here and three Mission Enablers have already been appointed and will be taking up their posts soon. I hope and pray that their ministry will bear much fruit — not just to reverse the 'institutional decline' of the Church but bring people to a vibrant faith in the living God revealed in Jesus.

The renewal of the Church is not just up to them though; responsibility for it lies with us all. Please pray that we may all, as Kingdom People, fulfil our vocation to witness effectively to God's great love for everyone in Christ. May He make us instruments of His love, His compassion, His justice and His freedom.
