

First, I have a question for you. At what age do you think you should teach your child to read?


When they're babies? At 2 years old, 3, 4, or 5 years old, or wait until they're in school?

Did you know that according to statistics, 67% of all Grade 4 students cannot read at a proficient level!

Of that 67%, 33% read at just the BASIC level and 34% CANNOT even achieve reading abilities of the lowest basic level!

Therefore, if you've been planning to leave it to the school to teach your child to read, then you're putting your child at a disadvantage!



7 Reasons Why You Should Teach Reading From Young Ages

Knowing how to read is one of the most important life skills, and it's very difficult to succeed in life if you are illiterate.

As we have mentioned above, we should start teaching our children how to read from as young as possible, possibly at birth.

Below, we will discuss the top 7 reasons why it's extremely valuable for parents to teach reading from young ages to their children.

1. Preparing for Kindergarten

4. Makes Learning to Read Easier


