FROM THE RECTORY

Dear Friends,



As I am beginning to write this, (on a train to London – I am going to meet Mary and our daughter Rebecca there), the carriage is bathed in a blaze of bright, Autumn sunshine. There is a strong sense of the world turning into the light, even as this day early in November begins to wane.

'Turning into light' might be a vivid description of the season of Advent which, perhaps as you read this, is about to begin. It will seem an odd Advent, I suspect, with a winter General Election dominating the news for the first few weeks. I am sure I haven't been alone in praying that the level of political discourse might rise from the abusive, divisive and aggressive tones which marked the end of the last parliament. The referendum on Britain's EU membership seems to have unleashed a deep, negative energy; we might hope our politicians are capable of turning this into a positive and equitable response to the many problems faced by our society.

Advent can be a deeply reflective season. I think it is a time in which we should pray to be surprised. We are adept in the creation of idols – gods of our own making; in old Israel's terms: the idols of stone and wood, of iron and bronze which, in the end, stare back at us with our own eyes. Advent is a time when we might relearn that God is the God of surprises, the God who speaks to us unexpectedly with a voice not like our own. As Rowan Williams wrote: 'We are here at all, celebrating Advent, because there has been a word spoken, a word of unexpected interruption, a word that establishes for good the difference between the God we expect and the God who comes, a word that shows us once and for all what an idol looks like in face of the truth.'

I pray that I can cast aside my idols of success or security, the speechless and unperceiving models of myself I throw up in front of my path and in this Advent time I pray that I may really listen for the living Word which is for me. We might all make this our prayer because, I think, all of us want to be seen and talked to by God who is at once completely outside our own experience and completely within it as well.

So, with Peter Traben Haas, we might make this our Advent prayer:

'Abba. Unwrap the layers of my heart in these Advent days so I can more clearly see the presence of your Christ in both friend and stranger.

Amen.

REMEMBRANCE 2019

St Mary's Service of Remembrance held at the 10.00 am service on Sunday 10 November evolved around a number of key themes.

Key to all was the recognition paid to all who have been wounded or who lost their life in the service of their country in the pursuit of world peace. One hundred years on from the first national Act of Remembrance at a rapidly built, temporary Cenotaph, Roy Peacock shared thoughts and details of the importance of Remembrance, the significance of the poppy and of the memorials that were established in almost every village, town and city to commemorate the dead of World War 1 whose bodies would not be brought home from the battlefields.

Those memorials and the services that take place around them have become the focus of much wider commemorations of all those who have, during the subsequent years, served in the armed forces in theatres of war and humanitarian operations throughout the world.

In his address, Revd John Flitcroft reminded us that this occasion, and the on-going work of the British Legion, is no glorification of war, but a sombre acknowledgement of service and a meaningful practice of true humanitarian care for one's neighbour.

The Revd Alex French blessed the floral tributes to be laid on the graves in St Mary's churchyard of those who have died in the service of their country. Then, after reading the words of Binyon's exhortation, the Last Post was sounded and the church community joined with others throughout the country for the two minutes silence. After Reveille, as the floral tributes were taken into the churchyard, the congregation laid their poppies of commemoration on the Chancel steps, adding to the knitted poppies that had been so lovingly prepared by the ladies of the needlework group.



The poppies laid on the Chancel steps will be gathered together and will lie at the foot of the memorials in the Lady Chapel for the coming year, a continuing symbol of our daily awareness of what man can do for man and of our need to do all we can to encourage and promote peace

ALL SOULS

Many people have expressed their appreciation of the All Souls Service which took place on Sunday 3rd November in commemoration of those friends and family members who have died, especially in the past year. The Revd John Flitcroft and Revd Alex French shared the lead of a service in which carefully chosen words, music and opportunities for personal tribute enabled the congregation to reflect on their loss, grief and acknowledgement of those who no longer walk this world but whose presence is otherwise always with us.

Thank you to John and Alex and to our choir under the leadership of James Bradley for this fitting and memorable service.

MICHAEL WOODALL

It is with sadness that we acknowledge the death of Michael Woodall, a loyal, devoted and much loved member of this church community. We send our condolences to Margaret, Rachel and the family and offer our support in prayers and as thanksgiving for a life of service.

Since 1972 Michael had served St Mary's as an active and committed worshipper, a member of the choir for many years and as someone who was always seeking opportunities to support and promote the church in the local community. Michael led many important developments in the church, fulfilling the roles of Churchwarden and Master of Fabric. Alongside the many others he would encourage to assist and support him, Michael oversaw the installation of toilets, directed the creation of the Narthex and its facilities and jointly led the stonework appeal for essential repairs to the East window and much more. Not only did he bring his professional knowledge, skills and influence to these tasks, he brought an enthusiasm that infected others. He found ways to persuade those he may have helped in the past to help him with fund-raising and the organisation of events to raise those funds.

Health issues have restricted Michael's involvement in church events for the past several years. Throughout this time he maintained a keen interest in what was going on and enjoyed those special occasions when, especially at Easter, he was able to attend a service.

Michael will be remembered for his gentle yet determined and productive ways, his (sometimes mischievous) sense of humour and, above all, his loyalty to his family and to his faith.

ST MARY'S WITH ST JOHN'S MOTHERS' UNION

Members were thanked by M.U. headquarters for their contribution to the Summer of Hope Appeal which will be used for M.U. work in Northern Ireland and Burundi. We also held in remembrance Jackie Smith and Margaret Exley who had died.

Roy Peacock spoke on Remembrance. His family had army connections over three generations. As a young boy in Kent he observed the Battle of Britain air raids and combat overhead. Post war he completed National Service in the army before taking up a teaching career as a history teacher. He has completed research and written books on local history, especially on the lives of men and women involved in the World Wars.

The Grazebrook Window in the Lady Chapel shows flags of allies including Japan and Italy. After the war St Mary's originally placed a carved memorial board in the churchyard garden. This listed those killed and those who served and returned to Old Swinford. Currently it is being renovated and can be seen in the Narthex.

At home and abroad families were invited to have their own sentiments carved at the base of the war gravestones. Churches initiated memorial cenotaphs to the fallen, later local and national authorities, towns, schools, and clubs erected them. Our choir members had their own plaque. One former choirboy, Felix Baxter, who lived at 'Thornleigh' in Hagley Road, a large detached house where the Crabmill is today, served in a Lancashire Regiment and was awarded a posthumous Victoria Cross. Roy brought home the cost and tragedy of war as well as the bravery of those who served.

When the bells are rung in this way it produces a more muted tone, which is appropriate to times of remembrance and reflection.

In the evening, with the muffs still in place, a quarter peal of Grandsire Triples was rung starting at 5.30pm. A quarter peal on eight bells consists of 1260 changes and typically takes from 45 minutes to 60 minutes to complete. On this occasion, the quarter peal was completed successfully in 51 minutes.

A NEW BISHOP OF DUDLEY

Downing Street has announced that the Venerable Martin Gorick will become the next Bishop of Dudley, working with Bishop John across the whole of Worcestershire and Dudley. Martin is currently the Archdeacon of Oxford and Residentiary Canon at Christ Church College and Cathedral.

In his current role, Martin has particular responsibility for the churches and clergy in the city of Oxford, as well as being Diocesan Interfaith Adviser. He has held strategic responsibility for growing new congregations of all shapes and sizes across the three counties that make up the Diocese of Oxford, overseeing an ambitious £5 million bid to support church revitalisation and planting, fresh expressions of church and pioneering ministry in major new housing areas. Martin has always enjoyed the Church of England's connections with people and places outside the church, and oversees and supports the work of over 100 chaplains in prisons, schools, colleges, military bases and hospitals.

Martin was ordained in 1987 and prior to moving to Oxford in 2013, was Vicar of 'Shakespeare's Church' in Stratford-upon-Avon where he was also Chaplain to the Royal Shakespeare Company. From 1994-2001, Martin was Vicar of Smethwick Old Church and Area Dean for the Black Country Deanery of Warley. He has also worked as Bishop's Chaplain for Richard Harries in Oxford and started his ordained life as Curate of Birtley, an industrial and mining town near Gateshead in the Diocese of Durham.

On his appointment, Martin said: "I'm looking forward to joining God's people in Dudley and the wider Diocese of Worcester as they seek to live lives of love, compassion, justice and freedom. We're currently living in a challenging times with many divided communities. The Church has a key role to play in offering a place of safety and sanctuary where all people can come together to share their common humanity under God. As Bishop of Dudley, I would want to lead that work while supporting and encouraging all in our congregations to live out their faith in Jesus at home, at work and at school as well as in church."

The Bishop of Worcester, Dr John Inge, said: "Martin is a hugely gifted priest with an enormous amount of experience in ministry, not least as a vicar in the Black Country. I look forward greatly to working with him for the growth of God's Kingdom in this diocese to which he is already committed. I pray that he and his wife Katharine will find much joy in their new life here."

Martin will be consecrated as a Bishop on 28 January and will be officially welcomed into his new role in the Diocese of Worcester with events in Worcester and Dudley in February.

A CHRISTMAS MESSAGE FROM THE DEAN OF WORCESTER

In many churches and cathedrals, people are invited to light candles and to write down their prayers. Often children do this, and often they are thoughtful and thought-provoking. Here is one I read some time ago. It simply said, "Dear God, everyone misses you".

Now I don't know what passed through that child's mind as he or she wrote those words. Were they just the sort of words you write on a holiday postcard to a much-loved grandparent, or on a get-well card to a poorly aunt, an affectionate phrase that seemed the right sort of message to send to God? Or was there more to it than that? Whatever that child had in mind, I think those words bear thinking about. "Dear God, everyone misses you".

The Christmas story is the story of the God who is missed. For centuries, the prophets had foretold the coming of the Saviour, but when he came how few noticed it! How many doors were closed against him? Our failure to recognise the Christ when he comes is a theme that runs through the gospels, in the stories of his infancy, his ministry, his suffering and death, and his resurrection. Everyone, or almost everyone, "misses God".

But the words have another way of being read. "Everyone misses you": that is, everyone would love you to be here, everyone longs for you; there is in every human heart a deep yearning for God, a desire for the meaning and purpose and peace of mind that God alone can give. "Everyone misses you".

And the message of Christmas is that God acted decisively to meet this human need for him. God has drawn near, God has made his home with us: "the Word", says St John, "was made flesh and dwelt among us". The God whom all the ages have longed for has come to us at last. And the message of Christmas, and of Christianity, is not of the rumour of some far distant God, but of God who has made himself one with us: in the person of his blessed Son he has shared our birth, and our life, and our death; and in his resurrection he points us to the life which lies beyond this life and lifts us into the gracious presence of the Father. "Dear God, everyone misses you". "Dear child", says God, "but you have come home to me and I have come home to you".

Yea, Lord, we greet thee Born this happy morning, Jesu, to thee be glory given; Word of the Father, Now in flesh appearing: O come, let us adore him, Christ the Lord

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
