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From the Director, Laura Villa:

We miss you Cindy Donahue!

SFY 19 brought tears to our eyes when our Long Term Care Ombudsman volunteer Cindy left this world to be in a better place. She left us with memories that will never fade away, her smile, laughter and most importantly her way of perceiving volunteerism. She will remain in our hearts forever. Cindy dedicated over 10 years to the SEAGO-AAA LTC program; she visited LTC facilities on a monthly basis and was always available to step in when needed. Cindy taught us that with dedication and a smile everything is possible, and this helps us day to day as we follow our path to success.

The Real Emergency and Disaster Innovative Meals-READI Meals Program evolved from a desire to address the lack of emergency nutritional response policies throughout our region. Our Health and Nutrition Program Coordinator invested much time, research and effort to bring this concept to life. DES-DAAS helped support our vision through the first stage of the program's implementation. Harvest Right freeze driers were purchased, assembled and put to the test. Boxes of fresh produce were donated to AAA by Borderland Foodbank, in Santa Cruz County. AAA staff tested the machine by freeze-drying fruits and vegetables, which in most cases, in a time of dire need will provide safe, nutritious food that will be exactly as the name implies; ready.

In mid-2019, SEAGO-AAA invested time and effort to apply for a federal grant through the Administration of Community Living (ACL). When this grant was not obtained DES-DAAS allowed us to use carryover funds in order to move into the second phase of the READI Meals project.

With positive results in Cochise and Eastern Santa Cruz counties, The End of Life, Thoughtful Life Conversations program reached out to the David and Lura Lovell Foundation, who granted SEAGO-AAA with \$141,950 over two years. These funds allow us to continue our instructional and informative efforts in Cochise County and expand to Graham, Greenlee and Santa Cruz counties. The TLC program continues to grow in Cochise County, thanks to the hard work and dedication of Ronnie Squyres, the program director, and her team of passionate volunteers. Together they are increasing the number of TLC interest and workshops daily. Although the current national health crisis has temporarily curtailed our ability to physically provide information and instruction, AAA is utilizing multiple virtual platforms to keep the chain of distribution viable. In observance of National Healthcare Decisions Day in April 2019, AAA hosted a workshop in Sierra Vista for over 70 attendees and valuable presenters, which was very well received. In SFY19, Graham County came on board as a provider, via a subcontract made with Southeastern Arizona Community Unique Services (SEACUS) who oversees Graham and Greenlee counties.

Through increased advocacy and additional funds granted to our region, SEAGO-AAA was able to increase the units of service overall as well as to provide emergency help for those who are in greater need. During the end of SFY19 Case Management alongside with Home and Community Based service providers worked diligently to remove people from the waiting list as well as switch those who had higher qualifications for attendant care services. This is particularly important since housekeeping services will be eliminated in the new fiscal year, thereby allowing us to serve those who are in greater need and potentially increase their units of service in the future.

In essence, the SEAGO AAA seems like your ordinary service and resource provider. However, the SEAGO Area Agency on Aging is more than what we do; it is who we are. Our team of six whole- hearted women who care about our region provide continuous support and dedication to our clients through all the services that we provide. Without their teamwork and passion for serving, our organization would not flourish and our efforts would not be as successful. To them and to our supporters, I'd like to extend a warm, heartfelt thank you.

Area Agencies on Aging (AAA) were established through the older Americans Act amendments of 1973 in order to provide a local structure for addressing the needs and concerns of older persons.



60 and over and/or their family caregivers, and disabled adults in Cochise, Graham, Greenlee, and Santa Cruz Counties in Southeastern Arizona by providing information and assistance in accessing services that will help older adults stay in their own homes and communities. The goal of an Area Agency on Aging is to enable older people to maintain maximum independence and dignity in the least restrictive environment. The amount of assistance that is provided is dependent upon the needs of the older adult. These services can be short-term (such as getting signed up for a prescription drug program) or long-term (such as someone who is frail or who has a chronic health condition receiving ongoing monitoring and support from a Case Manager) and anywhere in between. Examples of community-based services include: congregate and home delivered meals, caregiver support, case management, attendant care and help with benefit questions.













during SFY18 came with its hiccups. With four different people coming on board, learning the scopes of work and implementing policies it became harder to advance with staff turnover. In this program, the Family Caregiver Coordinator was to bring the program to life and find innovative ways to engage caregivers in available resources through their communities. The FCSP coordinator collaborated with partners in Graham, Greenlee and Santa Cruz to assist with their annual Caregiver Conference events in order to reach out to unpaid caregivers. This helped us increase our outreach efforts and continue working towards the goal of the development of FCS program in our region. With the most recent FCSP coordinator who came on board beginning of SFY20, the story changes.






Health and Nutrition Program part time staff has brought the HNP program to another level with her passion and dedication. With Support from the Southwest Gas who funded part of the Aging Mastery Program class in Willcox. Tai Chi for Arthritis which was started along with three devoted instructors in Santa Cruz County helped increase visibility and recurrent classes throughout the county. These evidenced based programs allow the AAA to look for ways to help older adults decrease the risk of falls. A Matter of Balance added two volunteers in Cochise County imposing the AAA to find ways to sustain these programs moving forward and increase the amount of people we are reaching out to. The implementation of the Real Emergency and Disaster Innovative meals (READI) was created. With support from Department of Economic Security-Division of Adult and Aging Services (DES-DAAS) supported the idea and funded the initial proposal. READI is a freeze drying method that our four-county region congregate and home delivered meal providers can use to prepare for emergency situations.



By freeze drying left over food, veggies, fruits and more, these sites will be able to reduce food waste but most importantly provide their participants with shelf stable food that can last over 25 years and does not lose its nutrients or its flavor.





We were able to help our clients save over \$159,079.00 annually by advising them of their Medicare options and assisting them to enroll in the most cost effective Medicare Prescription Drug Plans. A good portion of our counseling time is spent on billing issues that can often be resolved with hospital and clinic billing offices, thereby saving our clients' money and protecting their credit rating. Many clients were screened and given application assistance for Medicare Saving Programs which save each eligible client over \$1734.00 annually in Medicare Part B premiums alone. Screenings and application assistance for the Low Income Subsidy or "Extra Help" save eligible clients approximately \$420.00 annually depending on the level of assistance. Our 3 SHIP volunteers spend over 700 volunteer hours a year, giving back to their communities and assisting their neighbors with Medicare questions and issues. We also offer educational presentations geared at keeping our seniors safe from fraudulent schemes and health care scams.



Grandparent scam, charity scam, funeral scam, sweepstakes scam. The list goes on. Fraudulent ploys to get money from senior citizens are so common these days that many have their own name.

The Federal Trade Commission said people 60 and older make up 26 percent of all fraud complaints – the most of any age group. The National Center for Victims of Crime puts the annual total cost of financial fraud in the \$40 billion range and points out that those of Medicare age are more likely to be targeted.

Hoping to make a dent in those staggering numbers, SEAGO's Area Agency on hosted 17 Senior Scam Jams.



The SEAGO Area Agency on Aging's 5th Annual Conference—Life's A Journey—Tools for the Road—has come and gone. On June 5^{th,} 2019 over 170 attendees joined us at the Cochise College Sierra Vista Campus to learn, network and share resources. Starting with the CEO for the National Association of Area Agencies on Aging, Sandy Markwood's dynamic keynote address "What Does the Future Hold for You: Trends and New Directions in Aging," set the tone. Conference goers were treated to a lineup of outstanding presenters. David Parra, the Associate State Director for Multicultural Outreach for AARP galvanized the audience with his presentation on "Social Security & Medicare – Challenges Ahead." Kathleen Heard, retired Director of SEAGO – Area Agency on Aging was honored with the "Pioneer in Aging Service Award" for her 40 plus years of service.

The afternoon was filled with resources and information from Ronnie Squyres "Journey's End Conversations," Amber Frame's relaxing "Tai Chi for Health" demonstration, and Laura Morehouse's informative "Aging and Addicted: Opioid Use in Older Adults." The day closed out with Doc Morgan from the American Red Cross giving us tips on "Personal Disaster Preparedness" and Greg McQuaide from Cochise Health and Social Services educating us on the importance of the "Cochise County at Risk Population









Kathleen Heard was presented with the N4A "Pioneer in Aging Service Award" for her 41 years of dedication to South Eastern Arizona's Aging.

During those years Kathleen started congregate meal programs and developed community based long-term care services. Benefits and Medicare counseling, long term care options and advance directives orientations also became essential elements of the Area Agency's work. She loved this challenging and interesting work, and deeply appreciated the incredible community partners that exist in the aging network in southeastern Arizona.






Then and Now

SEAGO – Area Agency on Aging's Conference on Aging has grown into the biggest Aging Conference in Southeastern Arizona. With the help of the Desert Southwest Chapter of the Alzheimer's Association and SEAHEC, our first Conference was held at the Bisbee Senior Center on Saturday, June 6th, 2015. We had 27 attendees, including the 5 vendors who set up information tables for us.



and prepare individuals on end of care life planning ended March 31, 2019. A review of the course progress showed that AAA exceeded our expected goals! During the course of the grant, 21 Honoring a Life: Advanced Care Planning workshops were completed, 9 community areas were served, and 15 local organizations, including faith-based, senior centers, libraries, Cochise College and more, were involved. We touched 281 participants' lives, with only one paid coordinator and 11 volunteer facilitators. With the data collected throughout the 8 months of the program funded by the Legacy Foundation, and the collaboration of our new volunteer grant writer Mary Jackson, course facilitator Veronica "Ronnie" Squyres, and the SEAGO AAA team, we submitted a grant proposal and application to the David and Lura Lovell Foundation to continue our efforts. On January 24th, we received notification that the Lovell Foundation Grant was awarded. This is a two year grant totaling \$141,262 which can be extended to three years if interest is present and our volunteer base grows. In announcing this to the Advisory Council On Aging in the previous months, the interest grew and we included Graham, Greenlee and Santa Cruz counties in the proposal. Our goal is to start with our partners in Graham County widening to Greenlee and Santa Cruz Counties in 2020. We are looking for potential volunteers who can commit to becoming certified as facilitators and hosting at least two workshops in a year.
