1. Call to Order and Introductions

Chair Michael Bryce called the meeting to order at 10:06 a.m. Chris Vertrees conducted a roll call of members and guests that were participating in-person and via Zoom.

2. Call to the Public

Chair Bryce made a Call to the Public and no one spoke.

3. Approval of September 21, 2023 Meeting Minutes

Chair Bryce asked the TAC to review the minutes for needed corrections. Chair Bryce asked for a motion to approve the September 21, 2023, Meeting Minutes.

4. District Engineer's Report

Southeast District Staff had a scheduling conflict and were unable to attend the meeting.

5. STBG Ledger Report

Chris Vertrees referred the TAC to the STBG Ledger located on page 6 of their packet. Chris advised the TAC that \$29,644 in OA. Chris advised he will hold on to the funds until March. If not needed, he will look to loan those funds to ADOT or another COG/MPO.

6. TIP Report

Chris advised the TAC that since our TAC meeting in September, the following administrative amendment was made to the TIP:

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DGS 17-01 – City of Douglas (Chino Road Extension Phase 2) – Douglas was awarded a Congressionally Directed Spending Project in the amount of \$3,000,000. The project is currently programmed in the TIP for Design in FY24. Current design documents are over 7-years old and require updating. Douglas had an initial cost estimate of \$80,000 to update design. At that cost, Douglas was going to pay for design. However, design costs estimates have escalated to \$254,282. This has exceeded their capacity to pay for design inhouse. They have chosen to use a portion of their CDS award to pay for design. Our TIP has been amended to reflect the following:

Funding Type: CDS Project Year: FY24

Total Project Cost: \$254,282 Federal Cost: \$238,912 Local Match: \$15,370

7. Santa Cruz County SMART Applications Discussion and Approval

Chris referred the TAC to pages 10 to 33 of their packet. Chris advised that Applicants may request AZ SMART Funds for the following activities:

- Reimburse up to 50% of grant development and submission costs of a federal grant application;
- Match for a federal grant;
- Reimbursement for design and other engineering services that meet federal standards for projects eligible for a federal grant.

Chris advised that SEAGO has received 2 AZ SMART Fund applications from Santa Cruz County:

Application 1

Project Name: I-19 Ruby Road and Rio Rico Drive

Federal Discretionary Grant: Santa Cruz County intends to apply for the Local and Regional Project Assistance (RAISE) during the FY25 grant cycle.

Project Limits: Ruby Road at I-19 including interchange ramp intersections, and east and west frontage road intersections including East Frontage Road from Kipper Street to Rio Rico Drive and West Frontage Road from Calle Calabasas to Rio Rico Drive.

AZ SMART Fund Request: Santa Cruz County is requesting \$3,200,000 in funding for design and engineering services and \$50,000 in assistance for Grant development and Submission costs.

Application 2

Project Name: Ruby Road Bridge over Potrero Creek and the Union Pacific Railroad

Federal Discretionary Grant: Santa Cruz County has applied for the Reconnecting Communities Pilot Program in September 2023.

Project Limits: The bridge over Potrero Creek is located approximately 1/4 mile east of I-19 on Ruby Road. The project proposes to reconstruct 1,500' of Ruby Road westerly from the eastern edge of the I-19 Arizona Department of Transportation (ADOT) right-of-way.

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AZ SMART Fund Request: Santa Cruz County is requesting \$3,300,000 for match assistance from the AZ SMART fund.

Leonard Fontes from Santa Cruz County briefed the TAC as to the purpose of these two applications.

Chair Bryce asked for a motion to approve the Santa Cruz County SMART applications.

MOTION: Tom Palmer moved to approve

SECOND: Travis Fast

ACTION: APPROVED UNANIMOUSLY

8. SEAGO Pavement Assessment Project Update

Chris updated the TAC on the SEAGO and Vaisala RoadAl North American User Group Meeting that occurred at Cochise College Benson Center on October 5, 2023, from 10am to 3pm. The meeting allowed Vaisala users to exchange ideas and share new ways of addressing their road maintenance challenges.

Chris updated the TAC on data collection progress. Through November 6, 2023, SEAGO has collected 1,089 miles that equates to 56.7% of our local network being completed.

Chris advised the TAC that our contract with Vaisala is scheduled to end on May 1, 2023. We do have an option in our contract to extend it an additional 2 years. Chris asked for direction from the TAC as to extending this contract. Chris was directed to proceed with discussions with Vaisala on the extension. Chris will bring it back to the TAC at our January meeting.

9. SVMPO/SEAGO Regional Strategic Highway Safety Plan (Update)

Chris reminded the TAC the Safety Plan Kick-off meeting is scheduled for 12pm following our TAC meeting. Chris referred the TAC to page 36-38 of the TAC packet for information on the meeting.

10. ADOT Call for Traffic Data

Chris referred the TAC to page 39 of their packet. Chris advised that ADOT has requested traffic count data be entered to TDMS by February 1, 2024. SEAGO will assist in entering the data.

10. ADOT Call for OSB Projects

Chris referred the TAC to page 40-62 of their packet. He advised that call, the application, and OSB Guidelines can be found in the packet.

Chris advised ADOT has identified 3 bridges in our region that are in poor condition. ADOT is requesting applications for these bridges. These bridges will be a SEAGO priority for this application cycle. Those bridges are:

- White Water Draw Bridge (Cochise County)
- Curtis Road Bridge (Graham County)
- Babocomari Creek Bridge (Santa Cruz County)

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Chris advised that Mark Henige, ADOT LPA will be available to discuss the application process during his ADOT LPA Section Update.

11. ADOT LPA Section Updates

Mark Henige provided updates to the TAC involving the OSB Program and additional ADOT LPA updates.

RE: ROAD PAVEMENT ASSESSMENT PROJECT EXTENSION

On April 1, 2022, after a procurement process, SEAGO entered into a contract with Vaisala to provide the technology needed for our **Regional Road Pavement Assessment Project.**

The contract is set to expire on March 31, 2024. The contract allows for a 2-year extension of the project. At our November TAC meeting, the TAC approved allowing SEAGO to begin discussions on a contract extension.

We have received a cost proposal from Vaisala to extend the project an additional 12 months at the cost of \$68,921. All elements of the previous contract will continue without changes with the exception of project miles that will be capped at 2,000. Our cost per mile has seen an increase from \$30 per mile to \$34.50. The primary cause is the loss of the multi-year discount of approximately 4%. The following is the budget for a 12-month extension.

SEAGO currently has \$65,428 in STBG OA available that can be applied to the project. Before presenting a TIP Amendment for approval, I will need to secure \$23,490 in additional STBG funding. If the contract extension is approved, I will begin the process of seeking loans to implement this project. I anticipate bringing a TIP Amendment to the TAC at our March meeting. I have attached the Vaisala cost proposal to this email.


SEAGO - RoadAl

This document sets out Vaisala's proposal for the implementation of RoadAI technology to deliver efficiency gains, cost savings and service improvements to the surveying, inspection, auditing, and ongoing asset management practices at SEAGO.

1 Overview

The technology uses a smart phone to collect video data which is then processed using Computer Vision; this process automatically analyses the video data and the Vaisala RoadAI applies PCI methodology to categorize and report pavement defects, so that it can be integrated with existing asset management systems. Video data can be collected at normal driving speeds, and because the analysis process is fully automated, results are available within a few hours of upload, enabling data to be collected and results produced across the **whole road network multiple times** per annum, with **lower investment and resource** than current processes demand.

Figure 1 – Pavement Condition Heatmap



Road Condition data generated by RoadAI can replace the condition surveys currently carried out in SEAGO, and because of the frequency and repeatability of the data collection, identify any lengths of highway that are deteriorating rapidly in a timelier fashion, enabling the programming of maintenance works more efficiently.

2 The Strategic Case

2.1 Safety Inspections

RoadAI provides a range of tools that are designed to support reactive maintenance and safety inspection teams, taking a significant amount of network investigations and inspections off the network and into a desktop environment, reducing the number of ad hoc site visits, and bringing environmental and safety benefits, while providing greater oversight and efficiency to the process of network management.

Surveyors also have the facility to interact with the video footage and 'drop pins' on the map UI, by using a media button linked to the mobile phone.

Once the data is loaded onto the system, computer vision analysis is used to derive much more value that can be leveraged by other functions...

2.2 Road Condition Surveys


Road condition data is generated automatically, without allocating resource specifically to condition surveys, and reported at a much higher frequency, to enable the planning of maintenance works to be focused on areas where lower cost treatments can be deployed, to prevent the development of more serious defects, and ultimately extend the life of the asset. RoadAI enables road condition data to be generated using non-specialist tools and personnel, while still providing data that is consistent, accurate, and auditable. Using RoadAI in this way enables:

- Early intervention with lower cost treatments based on asset condition to deliver >5% increase to the life of the asset.
- Data driven forward program planning consistent, objective road condition data
- On demand reports network deterioration modelling

2.3 Traffic Signs and Lines

Video data that has been collected by inspection teams can be further analyzed to generate traffic sign inventory, and road marking condition data, to enable data driven risk-based management of these assets, and driving improvements in service delivery at a fraction of the previous cost.

3 Service Description

The RoadAI service has been configured in consultation with the SEAGO project team, and is based on a combination of the following core elements:

- Organizational Base License
- Data Collection Licenses
- Application Layers
- Data Storage

3.1 Organizational Base License

The Organization Base License (OBL) covers provision of the core service including:

- Anonymization of data.
- Map based user interface (UI).
- Geospatial video.

- Annotation tools.
- Unlimited client logins and access to UI.

The cost of the organizational base license is based on the size of the organization ¹, and the duration of the contract.

- Proposed Length of Road Section for inclusion in the project 2,000 miles.
- Contract duration 12 months
- Contract period 04/01/2024 to 3/31/2025

3.2 Data Collection Licenses

Based on anticipated use profile and in consultation with the SEAGO project team, we have configured this proposal to include 1 Basic data collection license.

3.3 Application Layers

RoadAI can be configured to enable different application layers to suit the objectives of SEAGO. Application layers can be activated or deactivated each year, and the contract value adjusted to reflect the application layers in use. The application layers currently available are:

3.3.1 Road Condition

Data is analyzed and reported in sections tied to the sectional reference data² for SEAGO's desired road network.

Defects can be viewed as discreet heatmap layers on the map-based UI, or as a combined overall condition heatmap.

Defects can be exported as Excel file or Shapefile.

3.3.2 Line Markings

Data is analyzed using computer vision process to identify line marking condition based on visible deterioration. Line marking condition data is available to export in Excel or Shapefile format.

3.3.3 Road Signs

Road signs are automatically detected and created as point objects on the UI map layer. Signs can be extracted in Excel reports with location and condition data, and URL linking back to UI to view images and video of sign location.

SEAGO 2023 Call for Traffic Counts

Dear Chris

Each year, traffic count data, collected by local and regional agencies, are requested to help the state to comply with the Federal Highway Administration's Highway Performance Monitoring System (HPMS) requirements, which, in turn, enables Arizona to receive federal aid funds for eligible roads.

- ADOT is respectfully requesting all 2023 traffic count data collected by your agency. Where possible, data should be imported to the MS2 TCDS web portal (https://seago.ms2soft.com). Other data formats may be accepted, where agencies are not sufficiently familiar with the MS2 TCDS.
- To be included in the 2023 HPMS report, the latest traffic counts should be loaded by February 1,
 2024. Please reply (or request individual jurisdictions reply) indicating where the latest count data are available and whether those data have been shared.

The <u>ADOT Traffic Reporting Dashboard</u> contains a statewide "Status Map" that clarifies where and how often traffic counts are needed on each functionally classified road for federal HPMS reporting. ADOT encourages local public agencies to utilize these tools to inform and plan local traffic count programs. <u>Tutorial Story Maps</u> on uploading traffic data are available on the <u>ADOT Data Analytics website</u>. 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To All Districts, RTES, COG/MPO and Tribal Transportation Partners:

The Arizona Department of Transportation (ADOT) Traffic Safety Section issuing a formal call for Highway Safety Improvement Program (HSIP) safety projects for SFY27 & SFY28 HSIP projects. Please distribute this message to your member agencies.

The call for projects is in support of the Transportation Performance Management (TPM) and the Arizona Strategic Traffic Safety Plan (STSP). To this end, the new call for projects will again focus on reducing fatalities and serious injuries on all public roads, projects submitted will be prioritized for statewide HSIP funds.

Changes to the HSIP Program (See HSIP Appendix A for details):

- FHWA project naming convention added (Appendix E)
- All potential applications will be reviewed by ADOT consultant and the consultant's fee has been added to the cost estimate
- ADOT will set-aside HSIP funds to cover potential construction cost increases on local 100% HSIP projects
- Design consultant's cost must be at least \$150,000 and the above the line construction phase must be at least \$500,000
- Arizona Tribal Safety Infrastructure Program (ATSIP) has been added
- Construction contingency has been increased to 40%

Anticipated HSIP Available Funds by FY: As of January 4, 2024

SFY27: \$32,700,000.00 SFY28: \$56,100,000.00

Below are the key dates for HSIP eligibility. (Detailed list of dates is on the HSIP webpage.)

- 1. HSIP Applications due no later than COB May 3, 2024
- 2. Scoped applications returned by February 16, 2025*
- 3. An HSIP Webinar is scheduled for January 18, 2024 from 1:00 pm to 2:30 pm (invitation email was sent out with Google Meet invite on January 2, 2024)
- 4. Final list of eligible projects submitted to PRB on March 18, 2025
- 5. Final list of eligible projects submitted to State Transportation Board on April 18, 2025
- 6. Eligibility letter sent out after approval of project by State Transportation Board
- * Any HSIP application received after the deadline will not be processed. Please ensure that when applications are submitted to ADOT that the projects are placed in the associated COG/MPO TIP "Parking Lot" so that, if eligibility is approved, it can be added to TIP before the submission of the Project Initiation Request Letter to the ADOT LPA Section. If a Project Initiation Request Letter is received and the project is not programmed in the corresponding TIP, it will be returned unprocessed at the risk of the LPA not having it submitted before the deadline.

As with previous years, HSIP eligibility will be based on the minimum benefit to cost ratio at or above 2.5. Only fatal and suspected serious injury related crashes will be considered correctable. All state and local projects will be selected on the same funding levels with priority going to the projects with the highest benefit to cost ratios.

Because of the time between application and funding, ADOT strongly encourages applicants to consider low cost temporary safety countermeasures as interim safety treatments where such countermeasures exist and are practical to deploy.

Below is the link to the HSIP Manual, application and Appendixes updated 2023. Ensure that all HSIP applications submitted to ADOT are on the updated application form. If any application is received on a previous form, the application may be returned unprocessed.

If you are an LPA, all HSIP applications must be submitted through your COG/MPO or the application will not be considered. This will ensure that each project will appropriately be considered at the COG/MPO level before submission to ADOT. This will also ensure the ability for the projects to be placed in the associated TIP "Parking Lots" required for consideration. COG/MPO and State agencies must submit all applications to the HSIP Program Manager. In addition, ADOT strongly encourages applicants to contact ADOT staff for questions or application review prior to final submission date.
