

Plane Wreckage Believed Sighted

Mountain Climbers Face Dangerous Trip

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Seatile—(P)— A picked mountain climbing party faced a dangerous journey to the precipitous, 10,000-foot level of Mt. Raincer today to check on what may be the wreckage of the mountained with 32 men aboard on a San Diego-Seatile flight last December 10.

Thirteenth naval district headquarters reported the "tentative" identification of the wreckage by Assistant Chief Ranger Bill Butler, on Tahoma glacier on the mountain's southwest face.

Butler reported he sighted through field glasses from a highridge late Monday a plane's metal "skin" and what appeared to be another piece of wreckage.

Lt. Gordon Stanley, Sandpomt naval air station rescue and flight officer, said the spot is clore to the course which had been traced for the lost plane.

Relatives of men aboard the plane have posted a \$5,000 reward for its discovery.

Because of the snow and rockslide conditions in the area, Mc-Chord field was assigned the job of keeping aircraft away from the ground search area because of the danger of vibrations starting slides which might threaten the search party.

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
