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# Army Air Force Finds Flying Disc

## New Mexico Air Base Has Strange Skycraft But Reveals No Details

ROSWELL, N.M., July 8-(AP)—The army air force here today announced a flying disc had been found on a ranch near Roswell and is in army possession.

Lt. Warren Haight, public information officer of the Roswell Army Air Field, announced the find had been made "sometime last week," and had been turned over to the air field through cooperation of the sheriff's office.

"It was inspected at the Roswell Army Air Field and subsequently handed" by Maj. Jesse A. Marcel, of the 509th Bomb Group Intelligence office at Roswell, "to higher headquarters."

The army gave no other details.

Haight's statement:

"The many rumors regarding the flying disc became a reality yesterday when the intelligence office of the 509th Bomb Group of the 8th Air Force, Roswell Army Air Field, was fortunate enough to gain possession of a disc through the cooperation of one of the local ranchers and the sheriff's office of Chaves county.

"The flying object landed on a ranch near Roswell sometime last week. Not having phone facilities the rancher stored the disc until such time as he was able to contact the sheriff's office, who in turn notified Major Jesse A. Marcel, of the 509th Bomb Group Intelligence office.

Action was immediately taken and the disc was picked up at the rancher's home. It was inspected at the Roswell Army Air Field and subsequently loaned by Major Marcel to higher headquarters."

The rancher's name and location of his place were withheld.

George Walsh of radio station KSWB which provided first news of the announcement said only Major Marcel, Col. W. H. Blanchard, commanding officer at Roswell Air Field, and the rancher had seen the object here.

The sheriff, Walsh reported, upon receiving word from the rancher went immediately to the intelligence officer at Roswell Field.

## American Stars Win Game, 2-1

CHICAGO, July 8 - (AP) - The American league, picking away with an eight-hit attack and razing the ball with its pinch-hitters, continued its all-star mastery over the National league by coming from behind for a 2-1 victory before a standing-room crowd of 41,122 at Wrigley field today.

The National league's only marker, a 360-foot homer by Johnny Mize, New York's slugging first sacker, in the fourth inning was nullified when the American outfielders scored a tally in the sixth and another in the seventh, the latter on singles by Bobby Doerr of Boston and pinch-batter Stan Sencoff of Washington.

In fashioning the American league's 10th victory in the 14 game series, four junior circuit pitchers held the National leaguers to only five hits, only one of them coming after the fifth inning.

Rookie Frank Shea of the Yankees, who tolled the middle three innings and was measured by Mize for his homer, was the throughout the country to give winning pitcher. The loser was both the losers and pitcher Boston's Johnny Sain, who pitched the fatal seventh inning.

## Seed Laboratory Held in City This Week

The annual federal seed laboratory conference, in the nature of an advanced school for trained specialists, opened here Monday to continue through Friday. Position specialists are enrolled from Oregon, Washington and Idaho.

Only six such schools are held in the country, the only other western one being at Sacramento, says Dr. O. L. Justice, USDA seed technologist, who is here from Washington, D. C., to head the session. He is assisted by Mr. Louis A. Kanipe, head seed analyst at the Oregon State seed laboratory on this campus.

Problems and new techniques in seed germination are being stressed at the conference this year, following emphasis on purity testing last year.

The new board, which will have general jurisdiction over all schools in the county with the exception of Corvallis, will meet again on August 5 to establish policies regarding teachers' salaries, capital outlay, transportation and standard schools.

## Woods to Head County's Rural School Board

The Benton county rural school board, elected at the annual school elections last month under terms of a new law passed at the last session of the state legislature, met for the first time here yesterday afternoon and organized by electing E. R. Woods as chairman and J. J. Shaffer as vice chairman for the coming year. County Superintendent E. H. Cattle is ex-officio secretary.

Terms of the five members of the board were chosen by lot, with Carl H. Haight drawing the short one-year term, Woods and Van W. Smith will serve two years, and Shaffer and Walter F. Hubbard three years.

## House Passes New Tax Cut Bill By Large Margin of 302 to 112

WASHINGTON, July 8-(AP)—The house passed today the Republican-backed bill to cut income taxes by \$4,000,000,000 annually for 45,000,000 taxpayers, beginning January 1.

The vote was 302 to 112, or more than the two-thirds majority needed to override a presidential veto.

On the roll call 228 Republicans and 69 Democrats voted for the bill, while 109 Democrats, 2 Republicans—Hull of Wisconsin and H. Carl Anderson of Minnesota, and the American Labor party member, Marcantonio of New York, opposed it.

It goes to the senate where approval also is forecast.

The action, which may encounter another presidential veto, came after Speaker Martin, R., Mass., personally appealed to the house to pass the bill by such a decisive vote "as to persuade the president that the people should have this delayed justice."

## Three Sewer Bids Accepted by City Council at Meeting

Out of respect to the memory of the late Mrs. George Peavy, the city council last night held only a short session and then adjourned to meet Thursday night when a public hearing on the city's budget will be held.

Acceptance of bids for three lateral sewers were approved by the council dug to the date being set at a previous meeting.

Lateral sewer 125, on 32nd street from Fillmore to Polk went to the Ramsey Construction company which bid low at \$3400.50.

The Corvallis Sand and Gravel company bid low on the other two projects. Lateral sewer 124, 32nd street from Fillmore to Grant, was bid at \$5229.15, and lateral sewer 123, 32nd street from Harrison to Tyler, went for \$1731.90.

## Yank Blueprint For Arms Cut Is Approved, 9-0

LAKE SUCCESS, July 8 - (AP) - The United Nations security council today approved an American blueprint for arms reduction discussions despite a Russian warning that the plan would bring about a collapse of arms regulation efforts.

The vote was 9 to 0, with Russia abstaining.
