

Identify Latest Flying Saucer--Nothing More Than Meteorological Device

Fort Worth, Tex., July 9.—
The latest "flying disc" which Army Air Corps officials said was found on an eastern New Mexico ranch proved today to be nothing more than a weather balloon.

The identification as a bit of "meteorological equipment" was made by Warrant Officer Irving Newton, Stetsonville, Wis., an official of the Eighth Army headquarters weather department.

The Fort Worth office said the weather stained, rubberized "disc" was only a bit of equipment used by Army weather bureau officials.

Public Relations Officer Capt. G. F. Haist said:

"Experts have identified the equipment as a box kite—or a 'rawin high altitude sounding device' used by meteorologists.

The original announcement of the discovery of a so-called "flying disc" came from the Foster ranch near Corona, N. M.

W. W. Brizzell, an employe of the ranch, found the balloon last week and brought it in several days later.

An Air Corps public relations officer at Roswell, N. M., Lt. Warren Haught, electrified the country with his report of finding a "disc."

But a few hours later the report blew up with the Fort Worth identification.

Brig. Gen. Roger Ramey, commanding general of the Eighth Air Force field, had insisted the "disc" evidently was
