

Guidelines for Analysis of Art - Art and Design

An art analysis essay is based on a thorough knowledge of the piece of art you have to analyze. If you have never attempted this kind of essay and now you can't help but feel the panic settling in, all you need to do is focus on the same writing techniques you follow for other academic essays. Art analysis is only different in terms of its content. All the rules of effective writing you learned as an [essay writer service](#) remain in place. You are halfway there already! You just need to become a little familiar with the content and structure of art analysis.



Understand the Piece...

Before you begin thinking along the lines of analyzing, you need to make sure you have understood everything there is to understand about the piece you need to analyze. Art analysis can be fun as you can appreciate art and get to experience an interaction with the work you are supposed to be analyzing. The whole thing is not by far as arduous as certain other essays can be!

Read About It...

Look at the piece. Read what other art critics have said about it. This is what I would do if I had to [write me an essay](#) on art analysis. This is extremely significant because articles based on criticism of the piece are the quickest and most effective way of helping you gain a better understanding of the work. Through the critique, you will also learn to appreciate the work for what it is. You will gain an insight into the various aspects of an artwork that need to be considered while you analyze it and the connections you can draw between these aspects of the piece.

Links between the different aspects you discuss will form the most important and interesting part of your analysis. A piece needs to be properly introduced to you for it to mean something to you. As you read and research, you will be able to identify several aspects to talk about. There will be several ideas in your mind about how to make sense of the work, and explain the role that different elements play in making the piece what it is. Try to not only read but feel the art. You need to be able to feel how and why the artist has chosen to do what they have done for every piece is made with an idea or a message the artist wants to convey through it.

A Reason to be Motivated...

When you think you have gathered enough information to be able to verbally explain the piece to someone you may know who knows nothing about the piece (or art, for that matter), you can compare what you knew before your research about the work and what you know now. Let this be a motivation for you, as you are bound to know more than what you started with. You can breathe a sigh of relief and move on to the next step with more confidence in your ability to pull this off.

Read About the Artist...

While you read about the work, you will also come across information about the artist. Make sure you don't ignore these bits of information because they play a key role in your understanding of the piece. Each artist has their unique way of creating art. Some favor certain mediums, while others prefer certain styles, colors, shapes, or lines. Knowing how an artist prefers to create their pieces can teach you what to expect from the work. It will also make you [write my essay](#) more sophisticated as you offer sentences like "This is quintessential Van Gogh".

Yes, it can get impressive if you know about the artist.

Analysis...

Before you begin writing, allow yourself to engage in some pre-writing activities. The essay has to start with a description of the piece. Make sure you enlist the most visible elements of the piece. This is what you see at first glance. Describe the scenario or object in the piece and move on to presenting the next most important piece of information: the medium. Then, you can add more information about the scale, style, lines, shapes, color palette, and schemes used by the artist. When you are sure you have covered everything someone would like to know about a piece they are unfamiliar with, you can begin working on the next stage of your analysis.

Now all you have to do is take all these bits and pieces of information you have just described and connect them. Describe the role these choices of styles, colors, lines, and shapes have played in producing the effect the artist has aimed to create. For example, if you are analyzing 3D art, you would want to tell how certain lines, shapes, and angles have contributed to producing a sense of motion. Explain how the different elements come together to convey symmetry, geometry, or motion. This would be an excellent time to add that bit of sophistication by learning more about the writer.

Interpretation...

After the analysis, devote some lines to the interpretation of the piece. This is your moment to display all the creative inferences you have drawn from the work. Expand on the details of how the

writer has meant to convey an idea and the details of any symbols that may represent some underlying philosophy or ideology. Most writers out there belong to certain artistic ideologies that make the work possess meaning and gravity.

Evaluation...

Towards the end, provide some of your personal opinions regarding the piece and the experience of viewing it. Voila! There goes the outline you needed to write a decent analysis.
