

### Two More **I**mmigrant Ships Dock

### Fear Bloodshed If Denied Landing

JERUSALEM, (AP)-Two more immigrant ships crowded with Jewish refugees anchored just outside Haifa harbor today, adding an explosive pressure to the Palestine situation already tense with reports of a pending British blockade.

Fear Disorders

Arrival of the two ships brought to 3,900, by Jewish estimate, the number of Jewish refugees aboard ship at Haifa or en route who may not be allowed to land because they arc without immigration cer-

Many Jews have predicted blood-shed if the immigrants are not allowed to land.

Jewish circles said they believed the British intended to load the newcomers on two British troop transports, standing by in the barricaded and heavily guarded harbor, and take them away, possibly to a prepared detention camp on the island of Cyprus in the eastern
