Farm Bloc Spokesmen Warn of Black Mart If Controls Revived

WASHINGTON, Aug. 12—(INS)—Spokesman for a major farm organization, the Flour Millers and Livestock Feed Manufacturers' Assn., today predicted the re-birth of wartime black markets if price controls are restored on basic food items.

ROCKETS ROAR OVER SWEDEN

Army Probing Source of Firey Missiles

STOCKHOLM, Aug. 12—(UP)—The Swedish army sent investigators today to Central Sweden where rockets were reported to have crashed last night during a veritable shower of the mysterious missiles.

The first reports seeping thru a military blackout indicated the army investigators found nothing at the scene of the reported explosions. They gave rise to a theory that the rockets are made of material of which little or nothing is left when they explode in the air.

The strange rockets zoomed thru the Swedish skies in greater number than ever before. An army source said the visitation was regarded as "most serious."

Most unconfirmed theories were that the Russians were experimenting with rockets or flying bombs and German scientists were helping them with their work.

Rockets were reported to have crashed at three points or more in Central Sweden last night. In dispatching investigators, military authorities hinted that they were seeking information upon which to base protests against firing of the missiles over this country.

Hundreds of callers reported the passage of the comet-like objects within an hour's time.

The army was maintaining a blackout over exactly what happened. But spokesmen who declined to be identified made it plain that high authorities were coming around to the view that a showdown might as well be sought in the rocket firing which has been going on for weeks.

Shooting Star Clocked at 677

RICHMOND, Va., Aug. 12—(AP)—An Army jet propelled S-80 Shooting Star which streaked from Wright field, Dayton, to the Richmond Army air base—a distance of 295 miles by air—in 35 minutes may have set an unofficial speed record of 677.14 miles per hour, Army officers stated yesterday.

4 Small Nations Given Chance To Speak Before Peace Parley

PARIS, Aug. 12—(INS)—The peace conference today invited Albania, Mexico, Egypt and Cuba to state their views on draft treaties now pending before the 21 voting members.

The Soviet Union lost an attempt to admit Albania alone and exclude Mexico, Egypt and Cuba.

The vote to invite Albania was passed unanimously. However, Russia, Poland and Byelo-Russia voted against admittance of the other three powers.

Next Byrnes called for establishment of an agenda for the conference.

HOT FIRST NINE PAVES WAY FOR HANDY VICTORY

Moes Withers under Barrage Of Birdies Sunday at Lost Creek

Breaking Dave Moes' heart with a sensational exhibition of putting on the front nine of the morning round Sunday, Jim Stout went on to defeat his opponent, 10 and 9, to capture the 1946 Lima News City golf tournament at Lost Creek Country club.

Stout thus defended the city crown which he won in medal play at Shawnee Country club in 1945 and his margin of victory was the widest ever compiled in any finals match.

The 34-year-old Stout, Lima Electric Motors employe, married and the father of two children, actually won his championship on the first four holes.

On No. 1 green he dropped a seven-foot putt for a birdie to go 1 up on Moes who had a par. On No. 2 Stout sank a cutting 18-footer for another birdie while Moes got his par and the margin was 2 up in Stout's favor.

Stout putted for a birdie from eight feet away on No. 3 but his ball hung on the lip—for a par while Moes missed a six-foot putt and bogied, Stout winning the hole to go 3 up. On No. 4 Moes had a hole in one as his tee shot narrowly missed going out of bounds in the creek. He tried to lift but could not get under the ball enough and it went into the creek. He then conceded the hole and Stout was 4 up.

Stout posted a 3-1-36—67, four-under-par, for the first 18 while Moes had a 36-39—75 as the winner-to-be fashioned a 7-up lead.

R. W. PARMENTER DIES ON MONDAY

Retired Editor Had Been Hospital Patient Six Weeks

Robert Winthrop Parmenter, 88, of 729 W. Spring-st, widely-known retired editor, printer and building and loan director, died at 9:04 a. m. Monday in St. Rita's hospital where he had been a medical patient for six weeks.

He was injured in a fall at his home, June 7, when he suffered a broken hip.

He was born Apr. 9, 1858, in a house which stood on N. Main-st. where Gregg's department store is now located. He was the oldest child of Cornelius and Mary Boyer Parmenter. His mother was reputed to be the first white girl born in Lima after its incorporation as a village. She was born in her father's combination home and tailoring shop located on the public square on the site of the Sigma theatre.

His father became postmaster of Lima in 1867 and three years later moved the postoffice to the ground floor of the Parmenter building north of the alley at the southwest corner of the public square. On the second floor he installed The Lima Gazette, of which he was editor and co-owner.

Here at the age of 10, Parmenter began his career as printer and newspaperman. He was graduated from the old Union school, which stood on the area now occupied by Central high school. This was then considered to be the western limit of Lima.

3 Marionites Being Held on Drug Charges

TOLEDO, Aug. 12—(AP)—Three Marion persons, one of them a physician, were held in county jail today on charges of violating narcotics laws. They will be arraigned tomorrow before U. S. Commissioner Norton Neipp.

Held are Dr. Robert G. McMurray, 46, accused of fraudulently issuing a prescription for morphine; Paul R. Moran, 52, and Mrs. Violent M. Miley, 48, charged with conspiracy to sell morphine sulphate not in or from the original, stamped package.

John B. Moran, 45, unrelated to Paul Moran, was arraigned before Commissioner Neipp Friday on a charge of illegal possession of morphine tablets and was freed under \$2,500 bond.

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Arrival over the week-end of the Transports Renville and Oneda at Tsingtao cast doubt on the evacuation report which received no official confirmation.
