Stockholm, Aug. 13.—(AP)—The newspaper Aftonbladet said today that two "ghost rockets" were observed in Sweden yesterday, and that one of them almost caused casualties. A couple boating on a lake in central Sweden were nearly hit by a diving bomb which burst into many parts and disappeared beneath the water, the paper said.

WAITING LIST FORMED FOR ENLISTEES IN NAVY

A navy recruit waiting list has been placed in effect, according to directives received by Chiefs G. B. McClellan and H. G. Woodard, local recruiters. The Joplin office has been directed to send only two men for enlistment for the remaining part of August. This does not necessarily mean it will be more difficult for a young man to enlist, the recruiting officers say, but it will require a longer time for him to do so. He must wait his turn to be called.

Russia Proposes Joint Defenses

Moscow, Aug. 13.—(AP)—Soviet Russia announced today she had proposed to Turkey that the Black sea powers take full authority in drawing up a new treaty governing the Dardanelles and that the U. S. S. R. and Turkey should organize defenses of the straits jointly. The Russian note said the 10-year-old Montreux convention, whereby Turkey was granted the right to militarize the straits "does not correspond to the interests of security of the Black sea states and does not guarantee conditions preventing the use of these straits with aims inimical to the Black sea powers."

SUSPENDED SENTENCE IS GIVEN K. C. WOMAN

El Paso, Tex., Aug. 13.—(AP)—Mrs. Raymond I. Mulford, 37, Kansas City, Mo., was given a six months' suspended sentence today by Federal District Judge Charles A. Boynton, on a guilty plea to a charge of inducing her 16-year-old daughter, Opal, to escape from the Jackson county detention home. The girl escaped June 12 from the home and later eluded federal officers three times. She was scheduled to testify in the case of George Russell Payne, 44-year-old preacher, who is accused of ravishing her, but whom she says she loves.

Galena, Kan., Aug. 13.—The city police car was damaged slightly last night when a motor car driven by Bob Colgrove crashed into the rear end of the police car on West Seventh street. Both cars were traveling west when the incident occurred. Night Patrolmen Fred Bever and Fred Eagle were cruising around looking for a car which had been reported to have crowded several cars off the highway and as the police car was slowed down to look over a motor car which had pulled off beside the highway, the Colgrove car plowed into the back end of the police car.

WAR VETERAN NAMED SEATTLE POLICE CHIEF

Seattle, Aug. 13.—(AP)—Mayor William F. Devin late today named Sergeant George Eastman, 33, as Seattle's next police chief. The appointment came a week after the city council rejected the mayor's appointment of Richard R. Foster, assistant chief at Kansas City, Eastman, a war veteran, was second to Foster in the examination score by a three-man board. He heads the records bureau of the Seattle police traffic division. The council is expected to confirm the appointment.

FAIR BLUE RIBBON GOES TO BEER-FILLED HEIFER

Springfield, Ill., Aug. 13.—(AP)—A yearling heifer, filled with four bottles of beer, won a blue ribbon today at the Illinois State fair. The animal plodded stolidly into the coliseum arena after an employe of the J. Garrett Tolan farms, of Pleasant Plains, Ill., poured the beer down the heifer's throat to bloat her flanks. Judges picked "Enquirer Dell" as champion Aberdeen-Angus senior yearling heifer.

Red Troops Reported North of Iran

Washington, August 13.—(AP)—Iranian Ambassador Hussein Ala said tonight he had received some reports that the Russians have concentrated troops in the Caucasus north of Iran, but that his information did not indicate the purpose of the concentration. Troops in that area, Ala said, might be used either to counter British pressure against Iran in the south or to bring pressure on Turkey in view of Russia's new demands for a hand in direct control of the Dardanelles. The British, Ala said, have brought in mechanized Indian troops at Basra, Iraq, on the Iranian border near British-operated oil fields and this, he declared, has created a serious situation involving Britain, Iraq and Iran. There are also reports current in diplomatic quarters here, Ala said, that the Russians have concentrated some forces around their Black seaport of Odessa, but again he declared he had no indications of the purpose for which such military strength might be assembled. Baremore Funeral Friday. The funeral services for James E. Baremore, 61 years old, have been scheduled tentatively for 2 o'clock Friday afternoon in the Thornhill-Dillon chapel. Baremore died suddenly Monday afternoon in Gray's Electric Shop, 116 West Sixth street, where he was employed. TRUMAN TO BE MEMBER OF CONGRESS OF INDIANS

Washington, Aug. 13.—(AP)—President Truman is going to become an honorary member of the national congress of American Indians. N. B. Johnson of Claremore, Okla., president of the organization during ceremonies accompanying the signing of the Indian claims commission bill today invited the president to attend the annual convention at Oklahoma City, November 6 to 9. "The president said November 6 was an important date," Johnson told a reporter later. "I guess he referred to the election. But we intend to make him an honorary member anyway."

Hard-to-Get Nails Sold Fields by WAA In Irregular Manner, Probers Are Told

Washington, Aug. 13.—(AP)—House investigators heard today that the war assets administration's Philadelphia office sold hundreds of kegs of hard-to-get nails to Benjamin F. Fields, Washington promoter, despite absence of proper certification on his applications. Lucian Sneed, hardware sales manager for the office, testified he allocated nails to Fields from government surplus on direct orders from his superior, William J. Gilreil, the general sales manager, after protesting the improper certification. Testifying before the house surplus property committee, Gilreil had denied that any "special treatment" was given Fields' applications. He also declared there was no connection between Fields' dealings and his own dismissal from his job August 7. His "firing," Gilreil asserted, was due to "politics." Exactly how many nails Fields got and what became of them was not developed. However, Sneed identified four separate orders for 257, 300, 187 and 475 kegs respectively. Yesterday, the committee heard testimony that Fields made a profit of over \$4,000 on a quick purchase and sale of government-owned bronze screening. With Sneed in the witness chair, the committee did get an itemized account of the cost of an evening's entertainment of Sneed by Glenn Dies, then an associate of Fields, at the swank Shoreham hotel here last June. "Hugh Wise, jr., committee counsel, put into the record hotel checks totaling \$38.88 for dinner and drinks served in Sneed's room. They were signed with Sneed's name, but Sneed said that the next day the management advised the account had been paid by Benjamin F. Fields and associates. When Sneed left the stand, Chairman Slaughter, democrat, Missouri, commented that he considered the witness "a clean-cut young man" who was "out of his depth" in dealing with Dies and Fields. Representative Rizley, republican, Oklahoma, said Sneed had inadvertently become mixed up "with these sharpshooters" and had "bared his breast" to the committee. He told his comrades that Sneed's grandfather was an officer of the confederacy, his parents live in Oklahoma and his family is as "highly respected" as any in the state. STUDENT "VET" HOUSING LAGS BEHIND SCHEDULE. Washington, Aug. 13.—(AP)—Only 11,000 of the 103,000 authorized temporary housing units for student veterans were completed at college campuses by August 2, the federal public housing authority disclosed today. Termining the report "deeply disappointing" the National Education Association predicted that "additional thousands of veterans" will be unable to exercise their G. I. educational rights this fall. Instead of having all the federally financed units ready for the rush of veterans on September 20, the approximate date on which most schools open the fall term, an FEHA spokesman said, the agency now hopes to have another 18,000 ready this month and a like number completed in September. IRON LUNG TO BE FLOWN TO TULSA FOR POLIO USE

Tulsa, Okla., Aug. 13.—(AP)—Captain J. W. Shamel, commandant of army air transport command units here, said today he had completed arrangements for army planes to speed an iron lung from Massachusetts to Tulsa Thursday. The lung will be used in a special isolation ward for critical polio cases. A plane will pick up the machine at Westover Field, Mass., Thursday morning and fly it to Memphis, Tenn., where a ship will be waiting to complete the flight to Tulsa, the officer said. An Officer Candidate. Baxter Springs, Kan., Aug. 13.—Technician Fifth Grade William E. Hiatt, jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. W. E. Hiatt of Baxter Springs, has been selected to take a foreign service officer's examination next month, according to word received by his parents here. He left Monday to report to New Jersey for overseas assignment for the Quartermaster corps in the European theater of operations. He received his training at Fort Sam Houston, Tex., and Fort Lewis, Wash., and served as a company clerk.
