

Homes For Vets Will Soon Be On Way Here

Temporary homes for 40 veterans' families in Elyria and vicinity will soon be on their way and under construction, according to an announcement at Cleveland today by Charles B. Lawrence, Jr., director, Region VIII, Federal Public Housing Authority.

He announced that the Hoth-Schneider corporation, Cleveland contractor, has been instructed to proceed with the delivery of barracks buildings now stored at Marion.

Safety-Service Director I. D. Faxon reported that grading of the Gulf road property on which the temporary homes are to be built will be started tomorrow.

Faxon pointed out that plans have been drawn for placing the buildings and that the plot has already been staked for grading.

The Federal Public Housing Authority announcement at Cleveland said that 40 tropical metal barracks which is approximately three miles northwest of the city.

The assignment of this temporary housing was made a few months ago, and Lawrence announced that the buildings can be moved now that the site is ready.

Fields Is Given Four Hours To Get Records

WASHINGTON — Benjamin F. Fields, Washington contractor, "leg-peddler," today was granted a four-hour postponement by his second appearance before a special House investigating committee investigating surplus property.

The delay was granted when Fields claimed he was unable to produce records that had been subpoenaed. The committee has been trying to find out exactly how Fields split a \$100,000 commission which he received in the sale of \$2,000,000 worth of scarce brocade with screening obtained from the War Assets Administration.

The committee investigating surplus property disposal was told by Fields two days ago that "hand-processing" is reserved for special clients who want their orders to be put through rapidly.

Fields defined "hand-processing" as physically carrying all papers involved in a transaction from office to office. He said that assured prompt service for its clients when they seek to buy property from the War Assets Administration.

Committee Chairman Roger C. Slaughter, D. Mo., told a reporter, however, that "Fields put his orders through for firms with a lot of high sounding titles, but when you examine them, they all have the same address."

Mat. Emmett C. Maschler, an Army officer in charge of records at the Richmond General Depot, had told the committee that "if someone had a dummy consignee, the obvious way to handle it would be to put the deal through by hand-processing."

Hard To Trace Orders His version was backed by Paul V. Chapman, assistant chief in the traffic division of the Philadelphia office of the W.A.A. Chapman said that "hand-processing" often "gums up" his department as it makes it difficult to trace orders.

CEDAR POINT — Lake counties and Lorain County conservancy districts are studying legislation to obtain money for erosion control along Lake Erie, a leading conservationist said today.

Lorain County CIO Council On Record In Several Matters

The Lorain County CIO Council announced today that it has gone on record as supporting Philip Murray and urging the possibility of reopening wage increase studies if rising living costs are not controlled.

The announcement said that the Council Board will be asked to keep control on important food commodities and that President Truman, the Office of Price Administration, and the Secretary of Agriculture will be asked to support vigorously the application of price control.

The Council also is supporting CIO units in Elyria in their efforts to establish proposed fabricated houses and is supporting an Ohio State CIO council resolution in behalf of old age pensioners who are in need of medical and hospitalization aid and who will require from \$50 or \$60 a month as a result.

The county organization again strengthened its action against supporting the construction of a Lorain city airport, the announcement said. The council also announced support of Lorain bus drivers in their demand for a wage increase, and also support of the Lorain telephone workers and the International Maritime Union.

Delegations Elyria, an employee of the Bendix-Westinghouse Automotive Air Brake Company, and Thomas Pycraft, of Lorain, secretary of the county CIO Council, were elected as the council's delegates to the Ohio state CIO convention in Akron, September 6 to 10.

The council also appointed a committee of four members, with alternates named, to attend regular monthly meetings of agricultural and city organizations, ministers, teachers and labor organizations. The meetings are sponsored by the Lorain County Farm Bureau Cooperative Association. The CIO Council committee is composed of Al Totter, Carl Longwell, Ann Siewert and James Gredline.

The council's announcement said that Governor Lausche will be asked to expand his call for a special session of the legislature to include consideration of increased wages and benefits to injured industrial workers, state employees, teachers and inmates of state institutions.

The council again condemned actions of the so-called "United Labor Party," with headquarters in Akron; condemned recent action in Columbia, Tennessee, which resulted in the burning of 31 Negroes, with two killed; and condemned the recent lynchings in Georgia. It was announced that a resolution will be drawn up to be sent to President Truman, Attorney General Clark, and the governors of Tennessee and Georgia.

Army To Ask For 185,000 Draftees WASHINGTON — The Army plans to ask Selective Service to call up 185,000 draftees between now and March 1, 1947, when the draft act expires.

Maj. Gen. W. S. Paul, war department director of personnel, said 185,000 would be required unless there is a sudden and unexpected upward trend in voluntary recruitment.

Five Boys Ordered Committed To Industrial School

Five Lorain boys were ordered committed to the Ohio Boys Industrial School yesterday afternoon and 12 others were ordered to report to Juvenile Office Carl Curtis at Lorain High school on Saturday, August 24, for instructions as to their future conduct.

Only one of the five ordered committed to the Boys Industrial School will be taken there immediately, however. The commitment order was suspended in the other four cases.

The orders were imposed by Juvenile Judge M. H. Nye during a hearing yesterday afternoon. The boys had been charged with stealing automobiles in Lorain and vicinity over a period of several months, with breaking into stores and other business establishments, and with other offenses.

Eighteen boys had been scheduled to appear at the hearing, but one 17-year-old youth is now in the Navy. Curtis said that an attempt will be made to bring him back for a hearing later.

The five boys who were ordered committed to the Industrial School had appeared twice before in Juvenile Court on delinquency charges. It was reported. Parents of several of the boys were present at the hearing, and in most cases they told the judge that they knew nothing about the offenses which resulted in the hearing yesterday.

Several of the boys admitted taking automobiles — one, two or three — and others admitted being members of groups which broke store windows. Only one boy admitted taking one only car estimated its value at about \$200, and Judge Nye pointed out to him that this would constitute grand larceny if he were an adult.

Judge Nye asked several of the parents for suggestions as to what they thought should be done to stop the activities with which the boys were charged, but the parents usually indicated that they had no definite suggestions.

The judge advised the parents to "look after these boys more carefully" in the future. He also ordered the boys to report to the clergymen of the churches of which their families are members, to tell the pastors what they have done, and to follow the instructions given them by the ministers.

East Liverpool Strike May Soon Be Ended EAST LIVERPOOL. — Settlement of the three day strike of city-owned water, incinerator and street department employees was in sight today after city council approved a wage boost of 18 and 1-2 cents an hour.

A general union meeting tonight was to receive the council offer, which also included double time payment for three annual holidays and a promise to obtain action on a uniform municipal vacation plan.
