

# Prominent U. S. Citizens More Hopeful On Peace Than Public

PRINCETON, N. J.—The general public is a lot more pessimistic about the outlook for world peace than prominent citizens recently canvassed across the country in a special poll of names included in Who's Who in America.

The poll among the citizens in Who's Who, an "informed group," so to speak, is nearly evenly divided on the issue of whether the United States will be involved in another war within the next 25 years.

who say they think we shall be at war again within 25 years, 34 per cent think so, and 27 per cent who offer no opinion.

Among the general public, the number who see war ahead within 25 years is close to two out of every three included in a nationwide poll.

In conducting its special poll among citizens prominent in various fields—science, medicine, education, banking, industry, labor, law, clergy, etc.—the institute put the same question as was asked of all voters in a similar survey.

**More Rockets Over Sweden**

STOCKHOLM — (AP) — The newspaper Aftonbladet said yesterday that a "host bomb" bursting over a Swedish lake, had nearly caused casualties and criticized military authorities for their failure to explain the nature of the missiles, which have been reported almost daily by observers for the past two weeks.

The paper said that two persons boating on the lake, located in central Sweden, were nearly hit by the bomb, which burst into many parts.

Swedish military authorities said yesterday that they had received no tangible proof of the frequent celestial phenomena observed over the country resulted from foreign experiments with aerial missiles.

In report Aftonbladet said "it ought to be possible to state whether they are meteors or not, and if they are rockets, one should be caught."

**AFL Flays Lea Bill**

CHICAGO — (AP) — The executive council of the American Federation of Labor Tuesday said it was the "unanimous conviction of the council" that the Lea bill "represents the lowest point in our history of national labor legislation."

The Lea bill, enacted this year, forbids use of threats or force to compel a radio station to hire more workers that it wants and James C. Pettilio, chief of the American Federation of Musicians, has threatened to halt all radio network broadcasts if the U. S. supreme court upholds its constitutionality.

To Back AFM

William Green, AFL president, said the federation "would back up the efforts of the AFM to have this discriminatory law adjudged unconstitutional."

The council adopted a resolution which said:

"Never before has any congress so arbitrarily and completely struck down the basic right to strike for plainly lawful purposes. Never before has any congress so openly indulged in such flagrant discrimination in favor of a powerful industry, the broadcasting industry, and in unfair opposition to the workers, the American musicians, who made possible the phenomenal success of that industry."

Green said the resolution was adopted voluntarily by the executive council.

Post Office Request

He also stated that the Post Office Mechanics' Union had requested a charter of affiliation with the AFL. The union has 3,000 members, Green said. He said the application would be referred to a council consisting of representatives of AFL government employes' unions, and that he expected that council would recommend issuance of a charter.

Earlier, the AFL executive council went on record favoring "a sweeping congressional housecleaning."

Although emphasizing "the AFL will continue its non-partisan political policy the council, in a statement issued at its quarterly meeting directed that "the political activities of the AFL, both on local and national bases, be expanded and intensified."

Green told newsmen "We are not hooked up with any political party and never will be."

# Army Officers Forbidden To Fraternize With Contractors

WASHINGTON, D. C. — (AP) — The Garsson combine expose produced fresh new army instructions forbidding officers from "close association, social or otherwise" with contractors. Undersecretary of War Kenneth C. Royall declared today.

In an address prepared for an American Legion Victory day observance here, Royall stoutly defended the army's overall record in letting war contracts.

But he observed that the "type of close relationship" brought out by the senate war investigating committee's hearings in Washington last month "should not be countenanced."

"Even if not directly proven to be dishonest, it might well result in undue influence upon government officials," Royall said, adding: "We are issuing additional instructions to make even clearer that this kind of thing must not take place."

The committee heard testimony that Maj. Gen. Alden C. Warr and other chemical warfare officials attended a wedding in New York of the daughter of Murray Garsson, one of the promoters of the multi-million dollar munitions combine.

Without referring to this testimony or to the Garsson inquiry by name, Royall said the war department is "investigating these particular cases" to determine to what extent its policy had been violated.
