Lumber Shortages Will Get Worse

WASHINGTON, Aug. 24.—Present lumber shortages, a key factor in the nation's housing plans, may get worse rather than better, the Forest Service of the U. S. Department of Agriculture warned today. The reason: We are not growing enough trees.
Estimating that the U. S. will need 42 billion board feet of lumber a year for the next 10 years, the Forest Service declares that "it will be difficult" to push lumber output above 33 billion board feet each year.
"Meanwhile," the Forest Service predicts, "the average farm or home owner is going to have difficulty getting all the timber he would like to have."
Some wastes can be avoided by better cutting, marketing and milling practices, while protection against fire and pest losses may help some, it was reported.
"But in the long run, we shall have to grow more timber than we do now if we are to supply the needs of a prosperous nation," service officials said.

U. S.-Red Clash In Korea Denied

SEOUL, Korea, Aug. 24.—Lieut. Gen. John R. Hodge denied a Washington columnist's report of "skirmishes" in Korea but admitted today that Russian and American troops exchanged warning shots last July.
The military commander of the U. S. zone of occupation in southern Korea said the report carried by the columnist, Drew Pearson, was not true. Hodge released the following statement:
"On July 1 an American patrol inadvertently entered a village just north of the 38th parallel (which divides the American and Russian zones) in Russian occupied territory. Warning shots were exchanged and the American patrol withdrew."
"On July 16 an apology for this error was sent to the commanding general of Russian forces in northern Korea."
The officer in charge of the patrol was relieved of his command.

First Texas FM Radio Station Operating

HOUSTON, Aug. 24.—Texas has a frequency modulation radio station.
Regular FM broadcasts—using a static-free frequency too high for the ordinary home radio receiving set to pick up—were started by station KTHH.
Use of the high-frequency wave bands has been hailed by radio men as opening up the air to more stations and static-free broadcasts. Radio observers believe that in five years all new radios will be capable of picking up FM broadcasts.
"We were the last to receive Government authority for FM broadcasting in Texas," said Owner Roy Hothel, "and the first to go on the air."

Talmadge Slips Away For Mexico Vacation

BROWNVILLE, Aug. 24.—Gene Talmadge, Democratic nominee for Governor of Georgia, arrived here by airplane from Atlanta, told reporters he had come to Texas' Rio Grande Valley to buy Hereford cattle for his 1000 acre Georgia Ranch, then slipped across the Mexican border enroute to Mexico City for a planned secret vacation.
Herefords are not raised in the Rio Grande Valley.

Scientists Offer Explanation of Mystery Rockets

WASHINGTON, Aug. 24.—Mysterious rockets reported over Sweden during the past few weeks keep experts here guessing and speculating. The best guess is that Soviet scientists, aided by Germans, have reactivated the famous Peenemunde rocket proving grounds on the Baltic, now in the Soviet Zone. This is where the testing and development of the V-1 and V-2 German rockets was done.
Lockets Costly
During the war rockets occasionally landed in Norway and Sweden by mistake during tests. There were no swarms of aerial objects such as now reported, but the Scandinavians were aware of the activity of the Germans.
The large number of rockets puzzles our experts. A long-distance rocket such as would reach Sweden is a costly affair and it would seem unlikely that many of them would be wasted in tests.
"Daughter" Rockets
It may be that the objects actually seen are "daughter" or "granddaughter" rockets. A large rocket would be launched and after it travels a considerable distance it would give birth to another and smaller rocket which would continue in flight. This process might be repeated by the "daughter" rocket, producing a "grand-daughter" rocket.
Or a large rocket might produce a considerable number of "daughter" rockets in quick succession, forming a swarm.
When the flaming objects first were reported, astronomers thought that they might be meteors from outer space.
