WASHINGTON, Aug. 24—Mysterious rockets reported over Sweden during the past few weeks keep experts here guessing and speculating. The best guess is that Soviet scientists, aided by Germans, have

reactivated the famous Peenemunde rocket proving grounds on the Baltic, now in the Soviet Zone. This is where the testing and development of the V-1 and V-2 German rockets was done.

Cockets Costly

During the war rockets occasionno swarms of aerial objects such as now reported, but the Scandinavnow reported, but the Scandinavians were aware of the activity of

the Germans. The large number of rockets puzzles our eyperts. A long-distance rocket such as would reach Sweden is a costly affair and it would seem unlikely that many of them would be wasted in tests.

"Daughter" Rockets

It may be that the objects actually seen are "daughter" or "granddaughter" rockets. A large rocket would be launched and after it travels a considerable distance it would give birth to another and smaller rocket which would continue in flight. This process might be repeated by the "daughter" rocket, producing a "grand-daughter"

Or one large rocket might produce a considerable number of "daughter" rockets in quick succession, forming a swarm. When the flaming objects first

were reported, astronomers thought that they might be meteofs from outer space.




