JERUSALEM, Sept. 16.—Palestine police, forewarned by news of attempted terrorism in the Holy Land, searched the Sarafand area today for a bomb-carrying band of saboteurs who attacked a police station and wrecked power lines in a daring raid.

Seek Survivors Norwegian Tanker

NORFOLK, Va., Sept. 16.—A Twenty-four Norwegian seaman picked up in the Atlantic by rescue vessels after the tanker "Maur" broke in two 146 miles off the North Carolina coast were en route to east coast ports today while the vessel's crew continued searching for 14 other members of the Norwegian crew.

25 Per Cent Wild Fowl Are Injured
