Hewitt Receives Mementos From City of Athens—Italy Will Honor the Admiral

ABOARD U. S. S. MISSOURI, in the Bay of Naples, April 16 (Delayed) — A slab of Pentelic marble, on which are inscribed the words of Pericles, "The whole earth is the tomb of illustrious men," and an urn containing earth from the Pnyx, the hill west of the Acropolis, where the Athenian republic held its popular assemblies, will be placed on the grave of the late President Roosevelt as a final token of affection from the Greek people.

These tributes were conveyed to Admiral H. K. Hewitt, commander of the United States naval forces in Europe, by Aristides Skliros, Mayor of Athens, in behalf of the City Council.

Truman Also Honored

A medal and a resolution conferring honorary citizenship upon President Truman "as a worthy successor" were transmitted to Admiral Hewitt by Mr. Skliros, who also presented a medal and a resolution from the Athens City Council commemorating the visit of the Missouri.

Numerous mementoes of the Missouri's visit were presented to Admiral Hewitt by friends of the United States in both Athens and Istanbul, Turkey. One of them was a leather shield, sword and bow and arrows of the type used by the Turks in their early expansion westward from the plateaus of Anatolia.

Admiral Hewitt, who was made a Grand Commander of the Order of George I by the Greek Government on behalf of King George II,
