## Theme and Content Presentation

## The Constancy of Creation

"The universe is the primary revelation of the divine. The primary scripture, the primary locus of divine-human communion." (Thomas Berry, as quoted in Original Blessing: A Primer in Creation Spirituality. Copyright © 1983, by Bear & Company, Inc.)



One of the elements that draws retreatants to St. Benedict's is its natural setting. During breaks and times of silence, many people move out of doors to walk the path around the pond or the trail that leads through the Stations of the Cross. We also sit outside to meditate, journal, or sketch.

We find it easier to tune our souls to the Divine revealed in nature when we are removed from the normal distractions of our everyday lives. No matter when we come to St. Benedict's, we can be assured that, barring some grave natural disaster, the hill upon which it stands will be there as well as the trees, the ponds, and the birds. It is a constant in a chaotic and changing world.

Nature itself is a constant, a constant we need in this time of pandemic, divisive politics, and social injustice. Birds sing, flowers bloom, and younglings frolic unburdened by the cares of the world. We see the cycle of life, death, and resurrection of Christ mirrored in the seasons of the year.

During our content time, we will examine ways in which creation provides constancy in our lives and can give us hope in times of uncertainty. Video clips, songs, and words of wisdom from contemplatives will be used to reveal to us how nature attests to the faithfulness of God. A good example of this attestation is found in the third verse of "This is God's Wondrous World:

This is God's wondrous world: O let me ne'er forget that though the wrong seems oft so strong, God is the ruler yet. This is God's wondrous world: Why should my heart be sad?

Let voices sing, let the heavens ring: God reigns, let earth be glad!

With the air, You have given birds their habitation; they sing among the branches.

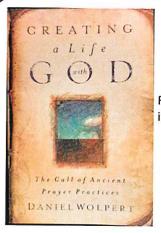

We look to the seas, great and wide, which teem with life innumerable, helping to maintain the balance. O, that we might receive your gifts, taking only what is needed with grateful hearts.

Three Different Variations on the Practice of Praying in Nature:

#### General Prayer with the Natural World

Purposely turn your attention to God when you are outdoors, either to focus on a specific item like a sunrise or blooming flower or to dwell on the natural setting as a whole.

Notice your thoughts and feelings.

Be aware of the power of the natural world and God's hand in its creation.

Ponder your place in and responsibility toward nature.

Thank God for God's good creation.

Determine if God is calling you to action in the world as a result of your time in prayer with the natural world.

If you are drawn to this prayer practice, intentionally schedule time to be spent in nature.

Combining Other Prayers with Natural Settings - Prayer in Nature can be combined with other types of prayer practices, such as breath prayer, walking an outdoor labyrinth, or journaling.

#### Deep Examination of Natural Item

This type of prayer can be practiced indoors or outdoors

Select a natural item for use during the prayer practice. This item could be a feather, a flower, a rock, or anything from nature that speaks to you. Even a photograph or video of the natural world will suffice.

Choose a specific length of time for the prayer.

Focus your attention and your prayer time on this single item.

Things to ponder

Why did you choose this item?

How does this item represent the unity and the diversity of creation? Where does the item fit in the web of creation?

How does this item reflect the power and/or goodness of God?

Thank God for the natural world.

Determine, to the best of your ability, how God is speaking to you through your chosen item. Is God calling you to action in the world as a result of your time in praying in nature?
