
# Training School

- Lifetime follow-up support




# Canine Development Center



# Autism Service Dog Program



- “Lock up” or “anchor” to stop a bolting child
- Interrupts and can diminish unwanted behavior
- Connectivity
- High success rate with better sleeping, school function and less stress
- A positive use for sensitive Guiding Eyes dogs who want to work



- It costs over \$50,000 to breed, raise, train, and partner a Guiding Eyes dog with a person who is blind or visually impaired.
