**Communications**, and soon became a foundational force in Arizona's cable television landscape.


They worked with major providers like Storer, American Cable, and later Cox Communications. By the time their boots left the trenches, they had helped install nearly **2,000 miles of coaxial** and fiber optic cable across the state—connecting families, businesses, and entire communities.

But what they were really building—beyond the cable lines—was something much more profound: access, inclusion, and the possibility of connection in even the most remote corners of Arizona.

#### A Quiet Pain, A Public Promise

While their professional success grew, Scott Thompson carried with him a quieter, more painful reality—growing up as a gay man in a world that often met his identity with intolerance and judgment.

His strength, like that of many LGBTQ+ individuals, was tested by discrimination and silence. And though he lived and worked with resilience and grace, those early wounds never fully healed.



In 2023, Scott passed away unexpectedly at just 52 years old.

Bill was devastated. But through the grief, a purpose emerged. In Scott's honor, Bill made a vow—not just to remember his brother, but to **protect others like him**. To create something that could ensure the next generation of LGBTQ+ individuals never had to wonder where it was safe to be themselves.

#### From Cable Lines to Lifelines: Introducing THEAPP.ONE

Out of this promise came **LGBTQ.ONE**, a nonprofit platform founded in Scott's memory.

Its flagship tool? **THEAPP.ONE**—a free, no-download, privacy-first web application designed to help LGBTQ+ individuals and allies **identify safe**, **inclusive spaces** wherever they go. From friendly businesses and affirming professionals to welcoming events and vital community resources, THEAPP.ONE provides real-time information that can be accessed on any device—without requiring an account, login, or any personal data.

THEAPP.ONE empowers users to make informed choices—quickly, easily, and privately—so they can feel confident and safe in any city.

What began as an Arizona initiative is now expanding nationwide, with communities across the U.S. adopting the tool to promote local inclusivity and support LGBTQ+ residents, travelers, and youth.
