COVID-19







Some may 'think' that - 1) wearing a mask - or 2) continuing to practice social distancing - are <u>not</u> necessary - especially if they've already been infected with COVID-19 - or vaccinated for COVID-19. Understand → COVID-19 <u>can</u> be <u>LETHAL</u>!

Says <u>Dr. Abinash Virk</u>, infectious diseases expert at the Mayo Clinic: "Even those who 'have already been' vaccinated for COVID-19 - still need to ... **a)** continue wearing a mask ... **b)** continue practicing social distancing ... **c)** continue washing their hands".

Since the COVID-19 pandemic began, several "variants" of the virus have emerged. But the one named **Delta** is [currently] the



'most severe' of them all. This "highly contagious variant" was first identified in India, in Dec / 2020, Within 6 months, it spread to 85 countries, and is now in all 50 states of the USA, where it's [again, currently] become the "dominant strain" of the **COVID-19** Virus.



From The CDC - Different COVID-19 Vaccines:

Vaccines are now widely available. In most cases,

you do need an appointment - but do not wait for any specific brand - they're all Ok.

Needle - Learn how to find a [proven] COVID-19 **vaccine** - get vaccinated - get it as soon as possible! All currently authorized, and recommended, COVID-19 vaccines: are safe, are effective, and reduce your risk of severe illness. The CDC does not recommend any one vaccine over another.



<u>Pfizer</u> (USA + Canada) - People 12 years and older - **2** shots [Given 3 weeks (21 days) apart - 2 weeks after your second shot]

<u>Moderna</u> (USA + Canada) - People 18 years and older - **2** shots [Given 4 weeks (28 days) apart - 2 weeks after your second shot]

<u>Johnson & Johnson</u> (USA + Canada) - People 18 years and older - **1** shot [Given about 2 weeks apart - after your first shot]

<u>AstraZeneca</u> (Canada only) – People 18 years and older - **2** shots [Given 4 to 12 weeks apart - after your first shot]

According to the CDC ...

- 1) If you have had a severe allergic reaction (anaphylaxis) or an immediate allergic reaction to any ingredient in the vaccine you receive, you should not get that vaccine. If you have been instructed not to get one type of COVID-19 vaccine, you may still be able to get another type. Learn more information for people with allergies.
- **2)** You should get your second shot as close to the recommended [3-4-12 week] interval as possible. However [with the exception of AstraZeneca], your second [2nd] shot could be given up to 6 weeks (42 days) after the first [1st]dose, if necessary.

Vaccines in Phase 3 Clinical Trials

Large-scale (Phase 3 / Booster) clinical trials are in progress [or being planned] for the COVID-19 / DELTA vaccines - at least, in both the United States and Canada.
