CHUCK'S REPORT

The month of September, 1987 is one I'll never forget. The September 1 maiming of Brian Willson at the Concord Naval Weapons Station still stirs heated arguments throughout the Bay Area and the nation. A new positive vision is emerging out of the tragic events of that day. Please join us in creating this new vision.

Brian is one of a couple of dozen very committed people who, since June 10 of this year, have been vigiling at the Weapons Station to bring to the attention of the general public and the peace movement to the tremendous opportunity the Weapons Station affords all America to create a new future.

At Concord, as in the nation. You and I can help create a new nation through what we do here in our own community. Please read on, go to the tracks, come to 7:30 p.m. Wednesday open Working Group meetings at the Peace Center. Come witness the spirit I am trying to convey here.

Thousands of letters of support and tens of thousands of dollars have come to the Peace Center. Most of this support is for Brian Willson, some is for his family and some is for you and me, the local peace community. Five to seven thousand people came to the mass rally Saturday, September 5. Outrage was expressed, and commitments to education and action renewed and made anew. Many people are receiving this newsletter for the first time. Events shook them into asking us to put them on our list.

People came to Concord on Saturday, the 5th, to pray, to listen, and to share their personal witness for peace. People keep coming to the vigil. For many participants, these are their first such actions.

Most days there are twenty to sixty people at the "tracks". Before Brian's maiming we had one or two to twenty.

At Concord we see a microcosm of the nation. Trains and trucks are operated by sincere human beings with their own families and neighborhoods and with their own hearts and souls. Much of their lives involve dutifully participating in making possible the death and destruction of hundreds of other human beings in far away places. All of us are victimized by the military-industrial complex: base employees, the dead and dying in Central America, and North American taxpayers.

All of our neighbors have a right to work and we in the peace movement need to defend their rights even as we urge them to consider the true nature of what they do. We need to extend our hearts to the people at the base, to the people of the small town of Clyde, to the people of Concord and of all Contra Costa. We need to work within our community to help create a positive constructive purpose for the vast human, natural and material resources of the Weapons Station.

There is an oft repeated saying shared by the peace, justice and environmental movements: THINK GLOBALLY, ACT LOCALLY

The soul of our nation is being piqued by the events at Concord. Every single day a few people confront the authorities with the same decision they were faced with September 1: arrest or otherwise bodily remove people from the tracks or roadway; stop shipping arms; or run over

the flesh of other human beings. Every single day, young Marines line up during this process and listen closely to witness of veterans of World War II, Korea, and Vietnam. They stand dutifully while their hearts are touched.

Veterans like Duncan Murphy speak to the Marines of the horrors of war, of the humanity of the Nicaraguan people, and of how the Marines will themselves be among the first to be sent by Ronbo kill and be killed. The young men will never ever forget the killing experience, the veterans warn. The Marines' attention deepens as they hear from Duncan that more veterans of Vietnam committed suicide than died in combat. The Marines will never forget the month of September, 1987.

The Mt. Diablo Peace Center and the people sitting on the tracks and roadways want to stop the flow of arms from the United States to Central America. We may or may not do this directly through our physical presence at Concord. If we manage to achieve our goal of 50 or more people risking arrest every day, the military may find other ways to ship their weapons of destruction. However, the point is: we demand that our country abide by International Law and act once again as though people mattered. We hope public policy will change as more and more people become willing to take greater risks in their lives in order to save the lives of others.

On August 21, in an open letter about the FAST and the Nuremberg Actions Brian wrote that one thing is certain: when those trains and trucks roll by us, people in Central America are going to die and be maimed. Their lives, he added, are worth no less than ours. Our lives are worth no more than theirs.

COME VIGIL! Come to the office to help with support work. Write supportive letters to the editors (see Action of the Month). Talk with your neighbors and with fellow workers, and with members of groups in which you are active. Bring others to the tracks. Support the fasters and support Brian with your presence at the tracks. Contribute time or money to the Peace Center in order to support our work on this.

THE POLITICAL ECONOMY OF THE UNITED STATES must, I believe, be understood well if we are to chart our course for a better world in which to live. I'll be leading a six week seminar on this topic with particular emphasis on whether our economic structure determines U.S. foreign and nuclear policies. Readings of 30 or more pages per week include Helen Caldicott and Noam Chomsky. The price of books, videos and guest speakers are all included in the \$30 fee. The seminar starts Tuesday, October 6 held from 7:30 to 9:30 p.m.

Nuremberg Principles

Principles of International Law Recognized in the Charter of the Nuremberg Tribunal and in the Judgment of the Tribunal

As formulated by the International Law Commission, June-July 1950.

Principle I

Any person who commits an act which constitutes a crime under international law is responsible therefor and liable to punishment.

Principle II

The fact that internal law does not impose a penalty for an act which constitutes a crime under international law does not relieve the person who committed the act from responsibility under international law.

Principle III

The fact that a person who committed an act which constitutes a crime under international law acted as Head of State or responsible government official does not relieve him from responsibility under international law.

Principle IV

The fact that a person acted pursuant to order of his Government or of a superior does not relieve him from responsibility under international law, provided a moral choice was in fact possible to him.

Principle V

Any person charged with a crime under international law has the right to a fair trial on the facts and law.

Principle VI

The crimes hereinafter set out are punishable as crimes under international law:

a. Crimes against peace:

(i) Planning, preparation, initiation, or waging of a war of aggression or a war in violation of international treaties, agreements, or assurances;

(ii) Participation in a common plan or conspiracy for the accomplishment of any of the acts mentioned under (i).

b. War crimes:

Violations of the laws or customs of war which include, but are not limited to, murder, ill-treatment or deportation to slave-labor or for any other purpose of civilian population of or in occupied territory, murder or ill-treatment of prisoners of war or persons on the seas, killing of hostages, plunder of public or private property, wanton destruction of cities, towns, or villages, or devastation not justified by military necessity.

c. Crimes against humanity:

Murder, extermination, enslavement, deportation, and other inhuman acts done against any civilian population, or persecutions on political, racial, or religious grounds, when such acts are done or such persecutions are carried on in execution of or in connection with any crime against peace or any war crime.

Principle VII

Complicity in the commission of a crime against peace, a war crime, or a crime against humanity as set forth in Principle VI is a crime under international law.

(Source: United Nations General Assembly Resolution 95 (I). The Principles were formulated by the International Law Commission at the request of the General As-

ANDY'S REPORT

This is being written after reading in the TRIBUNE that the Contra Costa County District Attorney had announced that no criminal charges will be filed against the Navy or train crew for running over Brian Willson. I am highly incensed that the authorities disregarded evidence from the witnesses on the scene and from the video tape. (Chuck and I left five minutes too early to have been eye witnesses). Be assured, however, that the D.A.'s decision will not be the last word on this issue.

Here is my personal experience and analysis of the situation. Toni Campbell and I arrived at the scene about one hour after the stark tragedy to secure a list of witnesses.

We heard first hand what happened. Why did Brian remain on the tracks while an accelerating locomotive was bearing down on him? More than once he had clearly stated his readiness to risk life or limbs to stop the inhumanity of our war against the people



of Central America. Brian's conviction developed from his Vietnam War experiences where, as an Air Force security officer, he assessed the effects on the scene of our aerial bombardments on the Vietnamese villages and people. Brian was particularly appalled by our use of white phosphorous bombs which burn the flesh through to the bone. Years later Brian again witnessed these same crimes against humanity by our country in Central America. These experiences so shocked his soul that they gave him the incredible courage and will to take great risks--and survive!

Brian is more than just surviving the loss of both legs, he is thriving. He is continuing to be active in Nuremberg Action-Concord, an organization promoting the fact that the Nuremberg Principles, adopted by the United Nations General Assembly [Resolution 95C1], is the law of the land (the constitution specifies that international treaties are binding). Thus, the Nuremberg Principles obligate every U.S. citizen, including the President.

The Peace Center staff is working with Nuremberg Action by providing it with a coordinating center and by sending nearly all of the staff's time and energy on the project.




Phone Bank: Our membership recruitment and renewal phone bank will continue to operate under the leadership of Jan Moore, Phonebank Coordinator; a focus of the phoning will be the Northern California SANE/Freeze Export Fund. Recently, Northern California SANE/Freeze sent \$1000 to West Virginia for field organizing in conjunction with the test ban vote in the Senate. Alex Forman, our regional director, tells me that there are at least five or six good projects we could fund nationwide. N. California SANE/Freeze is the largest, and best organized regional group in the country and the only one able to fund field organizing projects!

Solano County Field Organizing Project: There is renewed interest in the nuclear issue in Solano County. Because of Contra Costa's proximity, we are the field organizers for Solano. Anyone interested in helping with this project, please let us know.

State Legislature Lobby: We plan to pay a lot more attention to the state legislature. Christic Suit Charges Conspiracy

Long before the current Iran-contragate investigations, a Washington D.C. interfaith public interest law firm had evidence of long-term covert operations involving worldwide drug trafficking, gunrunning and terrorism by a network of present and former U.S. government, military and CIA officials, according to an affidavit filed in federal court. After the Justice Dept. and FBI chose to ignore this evidence, in May 1986 the Christic Institute filed a federal civil lawsuit in Miami, charging 29 men with criminal conspiracy. Defendants include many now under scrutiny by Congress and Special Prosecutor Walsh.

The Christic Institute has been granted wide-ranging subpoena powers under the Racketeer Influenced and Corrupt Organizations (RICO) Act. The case is expected to come to trial next year. Charges include murder, kidnapping, arson, narcotics trafficking and violations of the U.S. Neutrality Act, which prohibits the arming from U.S. soil of military actions against any nation on which Congress has not declared war. Two charges concern the murder of eight persons and the injury of 28 others in a 1984 press conference bombing at La Penca, Nicaragua, evidently designed to kill independent contra leader Eden Pastora; and a plan to assassinate Lewis Tambs, then U.S. Ambassador

to Costa Rica. The suit charges that the latter was part of an aborted plot to collect a \$1 million bounty placed on Tambs's head by Colombian drug lords, while providing a rationale for U.S. military "retaliation" against Nicaragua by blaming the assassination on the Sandinistas.

Plaintiffs in the suit are U.S. journalists Martha Honey and her husband Tony Avirgan, who, along with their young children, have received repeated death threats since they began investigating the bombing that seriously injured Avirgan. Two of their key sources have been kidnapped and one killed, reportedly on the Costa Rican ranch of U.S. citizen and contra supporter John Hull.

The latest in a series of moves apparently intended to discredit Honey and Avirgan occurred on May 13, when their secretary was detained after picking up a package sent to their post office box in Costa Rica. The package contained cocaine and a letter signed "T. Borge" (Nicaragua's Interior Minister), which "implicated" in drug dealing Honey, Avirgan, the Christic Institute, Massachusetts Senator John Kerry, Nicaraguan President Daniel Ortega, the Soviet Ambassador to Costa Rica, and others. Christic Institute attorney Tom Kellenberg was arraigned and held overnight for failure to show proper respect to a police officer, during a search of the Honey/Avirgan home.

But most startling is the scope of the "secret team" conspiracy the lawsuit has brought to light. In a lengthy affidavit filed last December, Christic Institute chief counsel Daniel Sheehan cites 79 sources which corroborate a web of global political intrigue and crime so lurid it sounds like a C-rate spy movie. Originally set up as a CIA covert operations squad in 1959 by then Vice-President Richard Nixon, this undercover network can list the following on its collective resume of alleged accomplishments: the first U.S. proxy "contra" war, against Cuba; opium smuggling from Southeast Asia and political assassination projects that claimed more than 160,000 lives there; the overthrow and assassination of Chilean President Salvador Allende; Middle East drug trafficking and terrorism against opponents of the Shah of Iran; and the transformation of Nicaraguan dictator Anastasio Somoza's National Guard into the contra forces attacking Nicaragua.

In the face of a conspiracy to usurp the Constitutional powers of Congress with a foreign policy formed and executed in secret, the importance of public action cannot be overstated. As a first step, we must make the general public aware of the shocking findings of the Christic Institute case: Iran-contragate is only the tip of the iceberg.
