We would like to point out that when the road is occasionally closed, to escort weapons convoys accross, the Marines are closing the road. Our people have been carefully instructed to stay off the roadway.

MANY OF YOU HAVE ASKED WHAT WE ARE DOING AND WHY. WE ARE OF MANY FAITHS, FROM MANY PLACES. MANY OF US ARE VETERANS WITH DIRECT MILITARY EXPERIENCE. WE ARE UNITED IN OUR BELIEF THAT THESE SHIPMENTS ARE ILLEGAL AND IMMORAL, AND MUST BE STOPPED.

From the Oakland Tribune, September 4, 1987:

"As an Air Force intelligence officer in Vietnam in the late 60's it was (Brian Willson's) job to visit villages after they were bombed and assess the damage. During those grisly body counts, Willson saw corpses—the people killed by white phosphorous explosives—that were still burning two or three days after the bombing.

Willson. had specific knowledge of shipments of white phosphorous from Concord's Port Chicago to Port Acajutla in El Salvador
