In the Sept. 1 incident, Willson, in the sept. I incident, Willson, joined by others, sat on railroad tracks as a Navy train moved toward them. While the others escaped serious injury, Willson was hit by the train, losing both legs.

In disciplining Cagle, the vice admiral said in the letter of admonition that the base commander "negligently failed in his responsi

"negligently failed in his responsi-bility to ensure the safety, well-be-ing and efficiency of his entire command."

The Navy spokeswoman said the letter would not affect Cagle's

present position but would be con-sidered in any of his future com-failing to ensure proper training of mands.

Ching, the officer in charge of the facility's public works, "failed to adequately support the com-manding officer... failed to prop-erly organize, plan, direct, super-vise and train personnel of the pubvise and train personnel of the public works department so as to conduct safe railroad operations at the weapons station on Sept. 1," the reprimand said, according to the spokeswoman.

Additionally, Ching was found

failing to ensure proper training of command railroad personnel between June 1985 and Sept. 1," the spokeswoman said, quoting from the letter.

Another investigation of the incident will begin Nov. 18, when the House Armed Services Subcommittee on Investigations begins hearings.
