A Painter and A Pastor: The Spiritual Arc in William Keith's Later Art

William Keith attained in his own time the status of a premier painter in California, and his legacy as one of America's most important landscape artists was secure. Two other renowned men considered Keith their closest friend: John Muir the philosopher of nature and Joseph Worcester the philosopher of spirit. Keith notably transitioned from a naturalistic realist painter of nature to a more psychological and spiritual interpreter of nature scenes. Such influences as the American Barbizon School and fellow Swedenborgian artist George Inness played a role in the metamorphosis of Keith's style, but his unusually close relationship to Worcester—among whose many roles was perpetual art critic—provides a key to understanding the controversial turn in Keith's artistic virtuosity.

Rev. Jim Lawrence is the former co-pastor of the San Francisco Swedenborgian church and now serves as the Dean of the Swedenborgian House of Studies in Berkeley. He is the editor of numerous books on Swedenborgianism.
