Petition of the Building Inspector for a Public Hearing re: A Certain Structure which constitutes a Public Nuisance.

You're Petitioner, Dennis Hewitt, duly appointed Building Inspector of the City of Ironwood, Michigan, respectfully petitions and shows unto the City Commission of the City of Ironwood as follows:

1. That there is a enclosed stairway structure within the City of Ironwood that is dangerous and hazardous to the health, safety, and welfare of the public and citizens of the City of Ironwood. The said structure is described and situated as follows:

W 1/2 OF LOTS 5, 6, &7 BLOCK 3 AYER & LONGYEAR ADD.

420 E. McLeod Avenue

And that according to the tax rolls of the City of Ironwood, Register of Deeds Records, and such other available information, the owner or owners or representative of the owner of the above described property is:

Ms. Brittany Ragsdale 116 Beaser Ave. Ashland, WI. 54806-1250

- 2. That the aforesaid enclosed stairway structure is unfit for human habitation or use and is so dilapidated, unsanitary and decayed that it constitutes a menace to and it annoys, injures and endangers the safety, health, morals, comfort and repose of the public and citizens of the City of Ironwood, and that the structure fails to comply with the building, plumbing, electrical and sanitary codes of the City of Ironwood and the State of Michigan, by reason of the following:
 - a. The enclosed stairway on the West side of the building is pulling away from the main structure.
 - b. The building has been a nuisance to the neighborhood for the past few years.
 - c. The enclosed stairway on the West side of the building in in disrepair and is a hazard in its present condition.

Further that the aforesaid enclosed stairway structure constitutes a public nuisance in violation of applicable building, safety and sanitary codes and laws of the City of Ironwood and the State of Michigan, and that the condition is such as to make said enclosed stairway structure valueless and that the cost to rehabilitate it would be prohibitive and would exceed 100 % of the equalized assessed value.

- 3. That said enclosed stairway structure constitutes a public nuisance and is a dangerous structure, as described in Sec.17-26 et seq. of Chapter 17, Article II of the City Code.
- 4. That said enclosed stairway structure should be condemned and be ordered torn down and removed or rehabilitated within a reasonable period, work to commence within fifteen (15) days, and be completed within thirty (30) days, all such work to be done by the owner and at the owner's expense. If not done, the City Manager is authorized to see that all

necessary work required to tear down and remove said condemned enclosed stairway structure is carried out and the cost of such abatement incurred by the City of Ironwood be charged against the premises and owner as provided in Sec. 17.3 (d) of the City Code.

5. That it is requested that the City Commission of the City of Ironwood pass a resolution ordering the owner, or owner's, or representatives of the owner, of said dangerous structure to appear before the City Commission at a Public Hearing and show cause, if any he or they have, why said dangerous enclosed stairway structure should not be condemned and should not be ordered removed or rehabilitated at the owner's expense, within a reasonable amount of time, and that a copy of said resolution be ordered served (RD, RRR) upon the owner or owners, or representatives of the owner at least ten (10) days before said hearing.

6. That the City Commission of the City of Ironwood is authorized and permitted to pass such a resolution and to hold a hearing in matters of abatement of dangerous structures as public nuisances and issue such orders as may be necessary following a Public Hearing under regulations of said Code and Act No. 61, Public Acts of 1969 of the State of Michigan, all for the health, safety and welfare of the inhabitants of the City of Ironwood.

WHEREFORE, your petitioner respectfully requests that a resolution be adopted and passed by the City Commission of the City of Ironwood as above petitioned.

Resolution to Schedule a Public Hearing for removal or rehabilitation of a certain Described Structure Constituting a Public Nuisance.

That whereas a petition has been filed with the City Commission of the City of Ironwood by Dennis Hewitt, Building Inspector, advising the City Commission of the dangerous and hazardous condition of a certain enclosed stairway structure herein described as constituting a public nuisance, and said enclosed stairway structure being within the City of Ironwood, and the City Commission having Jurisdiction over the subject matter and that the owner or owners or representatives of the owner of said enclosed stairway structure be ordered to show cause before the City Commission at a public hearing as to why said enclosed stairway structure should not be ordered condemned and be ordered abated and removed or rehabilitated at the owner's expense within a reasonable period (work to commence within 15 days and be completed within 30 days), and if not done by the owner by the expiration of said time limit that the City Manager exercise his authority to abate and remove said enclosed stairway structure forthwith and such expenses incurred by the City of Ironwood because of such abatement be charged against the premises and owner as provided in Section 17 et seq. of the City Code of the City of Ironwood; and that the City Commission being fully and duly advised and there appearing good cause for the granting of said petition as prayed and that said petition

is well founded and in the best interest of the health, safety, and welfare of the inhabitants of the City of Ironwood.

A Regular Meeting of the Ironwood City Commission was held in person and via Zoom for the Public on Monday, January 24, 2022 at 5:30 P.M.

- A. Mayor Pro Tem Andresen called the meeting to order at 5:30 P.M.
- B. Discuss and consider granting excused absence of Mayor Corcoran

Motion was made by Semo, seconded by Mildren, to excuse the absence of Mayor Corcoran. Unanimously passed by roll call vote.

C. Recording of the Roll.

Financial reports from the Agenda Packet were addressed by Finance Director/Treasurer, Paul Linn for the month ending December 31, 2021.

Motion was made by Semo, seconded by Mildren, and carried to receive and place on file the Statement of Revenue & Expenditures Report for the month ending December 31, 2021 and the Cash and Investment Summary Report for December 2021.

G. Approval of Monthly Check Register Report.

Motion was made by Semo, seconded by Korpela, to approve the Monthly Check Register Report for December 2021. Unanimously passed by roll call vote.

H. Citizens wishing to address the Commission on Items on the Agenda. (Three Minute Limit).

There were none.

I. Citizens wishing to address the Commission on Items not on the Agenda (Three Minute Limit)

There were none.

J. AUDIENCE: Chris Larson, HDR Inc. (RE: Water Treatment Plant Project Update)

Mr. Chris Larson of HDR Inc. did a brief presentation on the status of the Water Treatment Plant Project. Design is now 100 percent completed and has been submitted to U.S.D.A. Rural Development and EGLE (Environment, Great Lakes, and Energy) for their review. The site plan was presented that will be located north of the left driveway of the Pump Station.

The main level floor plan was presented. The office control room will be housed on this floor as well as rooms where the chemicals will be added to take out the manganese. They will also be adding fluoride, which is a decision the Commission made a few weeks back. The high service pump room will also be housed on the main level. Noted in the middle will be filters, sand filters, and then a detention tank that allows the chemicals time to react. The upper-level floor plan indicated where operators can look down into the filters as well as stairs going outside to the roof and front of the building.

A rendering of the front of the building was shown. The building itself is primarily brick and rock-faced block. A rendering of the back of the building was also presented.

Mr. Larson also addressed the schedule. Plans and specs were submitted on December 21, 2021 to U.S.D.A. Rural Development and EGLE. HDR will then incorporate their comments and issue their plans and specs. For bidding, the probable schedule would consist of specs being submitted in a month or so. Bids would then be received, and construction would start this spring. The project will be complete in the summer or fall of 2023. Budget for the project is about \$8 million for the building, leaving some contingency. During these times, bidding is fairly uncertain. They will have to wait to see how the bids come in and react accordingly.

U.S.D.A. Rural Development is the funding agency, and a federal agency. EGLE would grant approval of the plans, i.e., permits. EGLE is a State of Michigan agency. City Manager Scott Erickson reminded the Commission that rough numbers are about a \$4.25 million in grant funding and \$5.4 million in a low interest loan. Commissioner Semo noted this site plan is similar to the plant toured in Cloquet, Minnesota.

OLD BUSINESS

K. Discuss and consider authorizing bids for the Water Treatment Plant Project.

Commissioner Semo inquired if this is the correct process to authorize bidding now before we receive approval from EGLE. Mr. Larson and City Manager Scott Erickson both confirmed that authorizing bids is the next step in the process.

Motion was made by Semo, seconded by Mildren, and carried to authorize bids for the Water Treatment Plant Project.

NEW BUSINESS

L. Discuss and consider approval of Amendment to the Agreement between the City of Ironwood and the Ironwood Tourism Council (ITC) and authorize Mayor Pro Tem to sign.

City Manager Scott Erickson addressed the Commissioners regarding the Amendment to the Agreement the City has with the Ironwood Tourism Council. The original Agreement has been in place a few years and worked well. The Ironwood Tourism Council is interested in getting people to come to Ironwood in partnership with the City of Ironwood. We are reimbursed from the Tourism Council for this service. The amendment was addressed, including the rate of pay which is reflected with more job responsibilities, as well as an update to Section 3 "Cost will also include applicable fringe benefits." Commissioner Semo noted this is a successful partnership.

Motion was made by Mildren, seconded by Korpela to authorize approval of an Amendment to the Agreement between the City of Ironwood and the Ironwood Tourism Council (ITC) and authorize the Mayor Pro Tem to sign. Unanimously passed by roll call vote.

M. Discuss and consider approval of Resolution #022-004 and authorize Mayor Pro Tem to execute Quit Claim Deed from the City of Ironwood to Ottawa Forest Products, Inc., as described in attached Exhibit A.

City Manager Scott Erickson addressed the map that was distributed, indicating the specific parcel described in Exhibit A. The attorney for Ottawa Forest Products, Inc. is cleaning up a title on the land. The City of Ironwood had sold the property many years ago. Ottawa Forest Products, Inc. has ownership. There was a reversionary clause in there that needs to be cleared up with a quit claim deed. Ottawa Forest Products, Inc., has been paying taxes on it. The City of Ironwood does not want it back. City Manager Scott Erickson recommended approval of the quit claim deed to Ottawa Forest Products, Inc.

Motion was made by Mildren, seconded by Semo to approve Resolution #022-004 and authorize the Mayor Pro Tem to execute the Quit Claim Deed from the City of Ironwood to Ottawa Forest Products, Inc., as described in Exhibit A. Unanimously passed by roll call vote.

N. Mayor's Appointments.

Mayor Pro Tem Andresen, in support and acting on behalf of Mayor Corcoran, confirmed the following Appointments:

Mayor Corcoran reappointed Anne Davey and Gemma Lamb to the Board of Review for a 3 year term (term expiring December 31, 2024), and appointed Karen Gullan to the Board of Review, for the expired term of Jeffrey Musselman, for a 3 year term (term expiring December 31, 2024).

Motion was made by Semo, seconded by Mildren, and carried to approve the Mayor's reappointment of Anne Davey and Gemma Lamb to the Board of Review for a 3 year term (term expiring December 31, 2024), and appointment of Karen Gullan to the Board of Review, for the expired term of Jeffrey Musselman, for a 3 year term (term expiring December 31, 2024).

Mayor Corcoran reappointed Wendy Hicks to the Ironwood Carnegie Library Board for a 5 year term, (term expiring December 31, 2026).

Motion was made by Mildren, seconded by Semo, and carried to approve the Mayor's reappointment of Wendy Hicks to the Ironwood Carnegie Library Board for a 5 year term, (term expiring December 31, 2026).

Mayor Corcoran reappointed Stephanie Holloway to the Ironwood Planning Commission for a 3 year term (term expiring December 31, 2024).

Motion was made by Semo, seconded by Korpela, and carried to approve the Mayor's reappointment of Stephanie Holloway to the Ironwood Planning Commission for a 3 year term (term expiring December 31, 2024).

O. Manager's Report.

City Manager Scott B. Erickson verbally gave the Manager's report noting the following items:

- * The State of Michigan Health Department's contractor will continue to provide COVID testing services each Wednesday from 10:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. at the Ironwood Memorial Building over the next few months. It's been well attended and is a good service for our area.
- * A City Commission workshop, to review and discuss options relative to the Medical Marihuana section of the new city zoning ordinance, is tentatively planned for Monday, February 7, 2022.
- * City staff are currently investigating software to allow for on-line camping reservations at Curry Park. There are currently no advanced registrations taken, and it is on a first-come, first-serve basis. The implementation of an online registration process would allow campers to book a site ahead of time and most likely increase camper usage of the tourist park. The software currently being utilized by both Iron County and Gogebic County parks is being evaluated.
- * A group of volunteers are organizing an effort to flood the oval at the Downtown City Square for ice skating. The park was designed with the idea of winter skating at this location. It will be a trial effort to see how the flooding process goes, determine what it takes to keep it clear of

- snow, and to see how it is received by the public. He noted he is looking forward to working with Commissioner David Andresen and all the volunteers on this effort.
- * Marissa Casari has been hired for the Utility Billing and Data Processing position for the Finance Department. Marissa will be starting with the City on Monday, January 31, 2022. Stop by to welcome Marissa to the City when you see her next Monday.

P. Other Matters.

Commissioner Mildren inquired about computerizing the cemetery records for Riverside Cemetery. City Clerk Wendy Hagstrom noted that as time permits, the staff in the City Clerk's Office has been entering data from the historical deed books and scanning written records into the City's software system over the past two to three years. To complete entry of all records for publishing will require detailed work related to ownership, transfer of deeds, and historical burial information for each individual space, block, and lot related to the Riverside Cemetery. With the recent staff changes upon the retirement of the City Clerk at the end of November 2021, and mandated training by the State of Michigan for the new City Clerk that is ongoing, the cemetery data entry will be scheduled around trainings and during non-election times when the staff has availability to focus on this detailed data entry. Another option is to publish what is completed at some point, going back to dates that are more commonly requested.

Proceedings of the Economic Development Corporation Meeting Wednesday, November 4, 2020

A Regular Meeting of the Economic Development Corporation (EDC) was held on Wednesday, November 4, 2020 at 10:00 A.M. via ZOOM

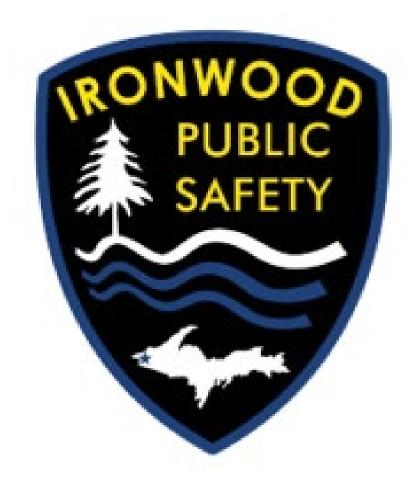

In addition, health, safety, and well-being of our employees are top priorities and ensuring their accessibility to mental and physical wellness benefits is a goal of mine. Actively engaging in the community is critical for the relationship, transparency, and trust between our department and our community.

Policing

Our law enforcement division comprises much of our work. Our agency utilizes CrimeStar records management system to collect data resulting from calls for service. Calls for service can be initiated by an officer or advised to an officer by various means to include, but not limited to, being dispatched, approached in person, email correspondence, and a growing number of social media notifications. Calls for service vary in nature, severity, and level of resources needed to address the same. These calls encompass a wide variety of police functions, including responses to crimes in progress, traffic crash investigations, disturbances, security checks, escorts, and other officer-initiated activity.

- In car computers

In 2021, the Ironwood Public Safety Department responded to 3387calls for service, a 14% increase from 2020. Incident crime reporting statistics increased 74%. Few things to note:

- Fraud complaints increased 74%
- Theft complaints increased 62%
- Health and safety increased 200%

Our agency had an 64% closure rate on Michigan Incident Crime Reporting in 2021.

Fire

- Ironwood Public Safety provides 24-hour fire protection to the City of Ironwood with contracted service to Erwin Township, Wal-Mart, and Gogebic Community College.
- Class 4 ISO rating
- Provided many fire prevention and safety programs to our community and schools.

Medical

The department provided medical training to all officers in CPR and first aid response. Most often, officers are first on-scene and give medical assistance before paramedics arrive to the scene. Each emergency vehicle has been equipped with a medical bag, AED, and oxygen. In 2019, the agency began a three-year initiative to train all officers to an emergency medical technician (EMT) certification level. Training requires 120 plus hours and continuing education. Six members have currently attained certification, with three additional officers obtaining certification eligibility in March of 2021.

Our community is serviced by Beacon Ambulance, which receives additional funding through a county mileage. Beacon has the full support of our agency and we are assisting in complementing their service. Training all officers to EMT certification level will provide an enhanced medical service to our community and secure continued medical services.

Code Enforcement/Blight

Our agency continues to support city staff. Our plan divides the city into eight zones. Officers are assigned a zone and are responsible for blight and additional problems that may arise.

The requirement for capital budgeting and creation of a Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) for the following six fiscal years is found in the Michigan Planning Enabling Act (Public Act 33 of 2008, as amended). Capital budgeting has two elements. The first is a Capital Improvements Plan, and the second is the incorporation of that plan into the annual budget and future budget forecasts. The Capital Improvement Plan is a six year schedule of all proposed major capital improvement projects including project priorities, costs estimates, methods of financing, and annual estimated operating and maintenance costs for the proposed projects. Each year the Capital Improvement Plan is revised for next fiscal year.

Including the Capital Improvement Plan in the annual budget, and future budget forecasts, is primarily for the purpose of adjusting the multi-year program of projects to changing needs and circumstances. It also ensures that projects proposed and planned for are actually completed. At the end of each fiscal year, the projects completed during that year are removed from the plan and an additional year's projects are added. The Capital Improvement Plan is designed to be amended on an annual basis. Projects can be added or subtracted as the needs and resources of the community adjust.

Recommendations

2022-2028 Capital Improvement Plan has been recommended for adoption by the Planning Commission and the Parks and Recreation Committee.

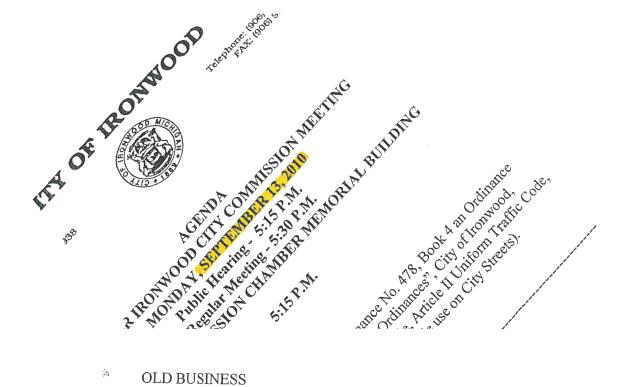

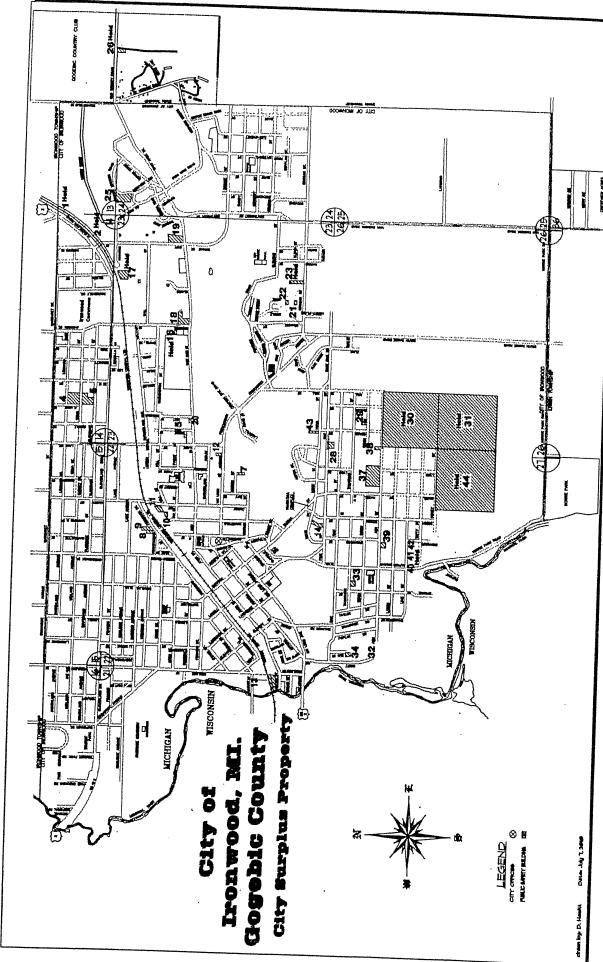

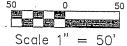

Increment Finance) Plan

Background

The City of Ironwood previously had a TIF District (Tax Increment Finance District) for the Downtown District (which eventually expired). A TIF is utilized to reinvest in the downtown through a number of community-improvement projects. This is done by diverting future property tax revenue increases from the Downtown District toward an economic development project or public improvement project in the Downtown. Those projects are based on the Downtown Development Plan (Downtown Blueprint Plan).

In 2010, the City hired a consultant to put together a Downtown Blueprint Plan. This plan was added to the Comprehensive Plan in 2014. As a result, most of the projects have been completed, or are no longer relevant to the current and future needs of the Downtown. The TIF Plan and the Downtown Development Plan go hand in hand. The TIF determines the mechanism for investment and the Downtown Development Plan guides the community on where and how the investments should be utilized.

Recommendation

This project has been budgeted in the current fiscal year budget (2021/2022), and the DIDA and the EDC have the TIF District as one of their goals. Staff in recommending hiring McKenna to develop the TIF Plan and the Downtown Development Plan for the City. The proposal comes in at \$20,500.

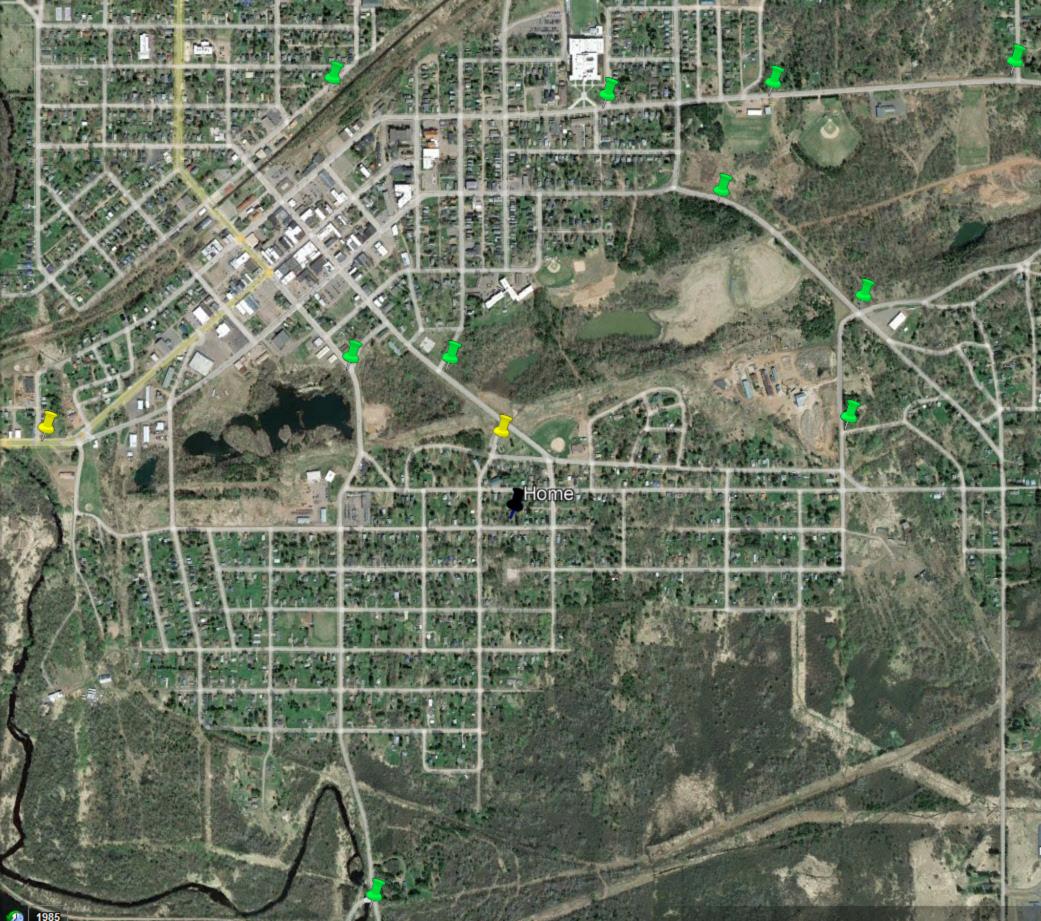
- 1. Ideally people will deposit their garbage in the cans.

Introduction

Based upon new State of Michigan drinking water rules and regulations the City of Ironwood is required to field investigate its existing water service lines to determine the material type. This information will then be utilized to evaluate the accuracy of the existing City service line records. The City has received an EGLE Drinking Water Asset Management (DWAM) grant in the amount of \$214,913.00 (which includes \$153,672.00 for construction) to assist with the cost of this project. To better align this project with the project budget and associated grant funding a deduct change order will be executed for this project. The change order will reduce the project bid to \$257,067.00, which will be funded with \$153,672 from the DWAM grant and \$103, 395.00 from the City water fund.

Recommendation

It is recommended to award a bid to Jakes Excavating, contingent upon the execution of Change Order #1, in the amount of \$401,350.20 for water service line investigation.

Dear Mr. Erickson:

We have reviewed the four (4) bids received December 1, 2021 from construction contractors for the above referenced project. We have prepared a Bid Tabulation (attached) and verified that all of the required forms for bidding were submitted. All bids appear to have met the bidding requirements.

The low bid for the project's base bid items of work was received from Jake's Excavating and Landscaping, LLC of Ironwood, Michigan in the amount of \$401,350.20. KES Excavating Service, LLC of De Pere, Wisconsin was second lowest bidder with a bid amount of \$544,367.25 realizing a difference of \$143,017.05 between the two. A tabulation of these bids, is included in the attached documents.

The low bid of \$401,350.20 is more than the grant award for the project, which has \$153,672.00 for construction. Therefore, a change order has been prepared to reduce the project scope. Change Order Number 1 will decrease the contract amount by \$144,283.20 for a new Contract Price of \$257,067.00. Jake's Excavating has indicated their verbal acceptance of the reduced project scope. With this new contract amount, the City contribution would be approximately \$103,395.00.

Based on information currently available to us, we recommend the Commission approve the base bid received from Jake's Excavating and Landscaping, LLC in the amount of \$401,350.20, contingent upon their acceptance of Change Order Number 1 concurrent with the Agreement. The City should realize this recommendation is not binding on the City and we can change the award as you direct. We realize the City may consider other information and take action that the Commission feels is in the best interest of the City.

We have prepared three (3) copies of the "Notice of Award" and "Change Order No. 1" to Jake's Excavating and Landscaping, LLC in anticipation of your concurrence with our recommendation. There are requirements listed on the Notice of Award that Jake's Excavating and Landscaping, LLC will need to fulfill prior to completion of the award process. These requirements include providing bonds and insurance certificates, a signed Agreement, and a signed Change Order No. 1. If you award the project to Jake's Excavating and Landscaping, LLC, please sign all three (3) copies of the Notice of Award and Change Order No. 1 and return them to Coleman Engineering Company. We will distribute the executed documents to the contractor along with other required contractual items. When the contract is complete, we will provide you with a fully executed set of Contract Documents.
