The following application has been submitted by Ottawa Forest Products for a review of a Site Plan and Conditional Use for a temporary log storage located at 789 E. Ayer Street and 1243 Wall Street, Ironwood MI 49938. The property located at 789 E. Ayer is zoned O-Open and the property located at 1243 Wall Street is zoned I-Industrial.

#### Consistency with Comprehensive Plan

  - 3. By reason of the use or development of the property immediately adjoining the property in question; whereby the literal enforcement of the requirements of this chapter would involve practical difficulties.
  - 4. Any other physical situation on the land, building or structure deemed by the ZBA to be extraordinary.
- ii. *Practical difficulty/substantial justice*. Compliance with the strict letter of the restrictions governing area, setbacks, frontage, height, bulk, density, or other dimensional provisions would unreasonably prevent the use of the property. Granting of a requested variance or appeal would do substantial justice to the applicant as well as to other property owners in the district and such variance is necessary for the preservation and enjoyment of a substantial property right similar to that possessed by other properties in the same zoning district and in the vicinity. The possibility of increased financial return shall not of itself be deemed sufficient to warrant a variance.

# Ottawa Forest Products, Inc Temporary Log Yard Expansion

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# Company Overview

Our current operation, Ottawa Forest Products Inc. has been operating as a manufacturer of pre-cut pallet components in Ironwood, Mi since 1992. A devastating fire destroyed the plant in June 2011 and the rebuild process started shortly thereafter. The facility took longer to rebuild than expected but has been in full operation since May 2012. Current business has proved to be stable and profitable however largely dependant on wood supply.

Ottawa Forest Products, Inc. purchased the assets of the Pine River Hardwoods mill in late 2012, beginning operations of a high-grade sawmill in February, 2013. During 2013, significant resources, energy and time have been spent to improve mill operations and profitability. These improvements will be realized as we begin moving into 2014. The improvements made all focus on increasing the mill's throughput along with the value of the low-grade lumber (precut pallet components), increasing yield through various operations, and both lower operating costs and more up time operating. Current operations were not profitable when Ottawa took on the assets nor were they in 2013, however the projections forecasted with the above stated improvements and adequate log supply at reasonable prices all show positive cash flow moving into 2014. The mill's dependency on wood inventories is realized to be a critical component to the mills success.

As a means of inputting additional log supply into the mill, current plans have been made to begin incorporating lower grade bolts and less dense hardwoods such as Aspen, as a means to sustain mill operations with little to no down time.

Today roughly 35% of the mill's production goes to the low grade pallet market, 20% to an affiliate company which processes dense hardwoods for the cabinet industry, 20% to the flooring industry and 25% is sold as upper grade green lumber. The 20% of material going to our affiliate company all goes through a secondary custom drying process, which is split between 4 different facilities in northern Wisconsin.

#### 4 Ottawa Forest Products, Inc.

Our current plans of operating a short-term storage yard will be outlined below. These plans are based on current information that we have and our best forecast as to the operation and how it will operate on a day-to-day basis. I emphasis short-term, in the log procurement world there are many different types of log storage. Some companies that stage wood for larger pulp mills are required to stage this material in holding to allow for aging of the wood. This process requires staging in a fashion that best allows air flow in between each row and also allows for adequate UV rays. The current operation that Ottawa is working with has a benefit in which it doesn't require material aging and air drying.

Ottawa's forecast of operations allows for us to cycle the wood through the yard at the fastest most expedited way possible. We will be using these yards with a 3 phase process in mind based on usage.

This 3 Phase process is going to be split between two separate locations as you can find with the maps attached to this submission of the conditional use permit. We ask for the commission to review the application with hopes of entering an opportunity to offer our community additional economic opportunities as well as enhancing the current Miners Park.



# Sales Summary

Ironwood ~ Ottawa Forest Products, Inc proudly produces some of the area's premiere pre cut pallet component product to the marketplace throughout Northern Upper Michigan, Wisconsin, Minnesota, North and South Dakota and Illinois. Our reputation is largely built on a 20+-year relationship to long-term customers.

The current customer matrix is comprised of a variety 28-33 regular customers. With much of the product being shipped to areas such as Minneapolis Metro area, Green Bay/ Appleton, and Milwaukee. Current market conditions show great favor in the demand for Pallet components to the industry. With the increased cant composite price climbing from what was \$360-\$370/m to \$400-\$410/m has placed an overwhelming desire for pallet business's around the Midwest to buy additional pre-cut components as opposed to purchasing cants and manufacturing supply themselves.

Nearly all forecasts of market conditions look to say that the current conditions will not only remain the same for the foreseeable future but will continue to increase. Historical averages have shown that Ottawa (Ironwood mill only) will sell approximately \$3.5 - \$4 Million in sales annually.

**Amasa** ~ Producing Grade lumber in a variety of species with heavy concentrations to Maple has proved to be high demand products in today's market. Since the purchase of the Amasa mill, concentrated efforts has been made to develop relationships with customers that we feel will make great long-term impacts in the marketplace.

Industry standard is to use what is called the "Hardwood Market Report" to initiate a price entry on a particular standard specie and grade. This market report is a relative guide to all sawmills and has shown to prove that currently Ottawa is able to sell product at prices consistently over market.

Historical averages are not available for our Amasa mill, given its purchase in December 2012 but current projections indicate gross sales of approximately \$6.5 million in sales annually.

# Log Procurement

# **Amasa Mill Log Supply**

The Amasa Mill is located in the heart of the prime hardwood saw timber in western Upper Michigan. The wood resource is composed of several northern hardwood species, with Hard Maple, Soft Maple, and Yellow Birch making up about 80% of the total. Red Oak, Basswood, Ash, Aspen, and Cherry fill in the balance.

The logs are purchased by the board foot from an 8" minimum diameter up to a 30" maximum diameter, and in random lengths from 8' to 12'. Approximately 75% of the logs are purchased on the open market from local loggers. Contract loggers cutting stumpage purchased by Ottawa, from both public and private forestland in the area, produce the remaining 25% of the logs.

The local log market is competitive, with eight other large hardwood sawmills within a 100-mile radius of Amasa. The ability to supplement open market logs with purchased stumpage controlled by Ottawa is a key strategy for maintaining the log inventory. The three foresters responsible for the log supply have over 100 years of combined experience in Lake States forestry and log procurement. Their expertise has been effective in purchasing and producing the controlled wood at a low cost. The average log cost for the mill is currently around \$500/MBF.

The Amasa Mill consumes between 7-8 million board feet of logs on an annual basis. This volume must be delivered in a 10-month period that excludes the 6-8 week spring breakup season when the roads are weight limited. The log inventory peaks at the end of winter with a 1-1.5 million board feet, and reaches the low point at the end of spring or early summer when cutting the winter inventory is complete.

#### Ironwood Mill "Bolt" Supply

Ottawa Forest Products, Inc (Ironwood, Mi facility) was established in 1992 as a pre-cut pallet component business. This was a relatively new concept to the pallet world at the time. The reason as to why it was different, because nobody else was buying what the industry now calls (mini-bolts). Mini Bolts are used to describe a category of wood that is significantly better than pulp wood (for the paper industry) and is simply not what the sawmills would consider to be a good saw log. It is essentially a hybrid between pulp wood and a saw log. This bolt is

between 6" in diameter to 14" and is known to be relatively straight and free of any major defects.

Ottawa's founding members realized the ability to educate loggers to develop this new product that they could manufacture into pre-cut pallet components. A new concept that eventually led to overwhelming success and copycat businesses began to sprout up throughout other areas of Wisconsin and Northern Michigan.

The original owners strategically picked Ironwood, Mi because of its rich natural resource with the timber industry. Currently, Ottawa seeks to purchase 20,000 cords of northern hardwoods annually. Over 70% of our current production is using Red Oak while the remaining inventories are Hard and Soft Maple, Birch and a few other mixed hardwoods. Certainly seasonally weather patterns largely affect Ottawa's inventories however this developed market of the Mini Bolt has certainly gained loggers appeal and will continue to be an important part of loggers profit centers moving forward.

The Ironwood mill will consume approximately 105 cords per production day when we are operating as a two-shift operation. This volume of production puts great demand and increased importance on the procurement efforts within Ottawa. Fortunately, Ottawa has built solid relationships with loggers over the last 20+ years of business and continues to work with over 40+ loggers on a daily basis. Historical statistics and averages have proved that Ottawa is able to maintain and recruit current wood demands at a fair market price. Currently, Ottawa is buying mixed hardwood, stick scaled in our yard at an average price of \$105 p/cord.

# Log Storage Project Overview

#### **Phase 1-Operation Plans**

Ottawa currently owns a vacant parcel of land attached to our manufacturing facility. This lot was purchased from the City of Ironwood a few years ago. Currently it is zoned Industrial space. Our intention is to fully utilize the current space with log storage and base most all of the trucking operations out of the phase 1 location. We forecast we will be able to hold inventory of nearly 3,000 cords on the current site. This volume will be transported outbound on a first in first out basis. The system will operate in a fashion that all trucks will first come to the 1243 Wall Street location to check in, fill out paperwork, scale and determine unloading location. The trucks will plan to enter the Ottawa main entrance and make a loop around the East Southeast portion of the building. All drivers will be asked to check in with the scaler on duty who will scale all necessary loads and direct the driver where to unload. The yard will be mapped with row #'s to allow drivers to maintain wood in an orderly fashion. All drivers will be instructed to unload and maintain pile heights of 16' tall throughout the piling process. Should there be trailers that are staged for delivery and currently empty we will directly unload on a crib trailer. Once these trucks unload they will be leaving the premise on Ayer Street and taking the most direct route possible to US2.

Current forecast would be to have two trucks hauling out on a daily basis. These trucks will be making two trips a day to the market hauling approximately 13 cords of pulpwood. These operations are going to be operating during all hours of the day as we currently operate our mill nearly 24 hours a day. Provisions will be made to maintain the property to ensure appropriate drainage and minimize any foreign material that is beyond the normal scope of log storage.

# Phase 2- Back Up Plan

Our desire to utilize the property on Ayer Street will only be on a back up plan basis. This property is currently zoned Open. The expectation is to utilize Phase 1 location as much as possible. In the event that location 2 is needed we will plan to stage wood in a fashion to be able to allow truck traffic seasonally. The current property does not have stable soils to allow year round access to this property. If we can use this during the Winter months we will make provisions to freeze an area of operation in Phase 2. The intention would be to move all that wood outbound prior to break up. During spring break up our focus will be directed to hauling out of the

yard 1 location. In the event that we are not able to meet the outbound demand we will be making sub base improvements as early as possible to allow trucks to access the wood. Those improvements will be to haul in gravel and appropriate sub base material within phase 2 map area. This would also be the time in which we would plan to make the trail improvements with the dozer.

#### Phase 3- Expansion

Similarly to phase 2, our plans will be shadowing the phase 2 plan with the addition of opening up more area in phase 3. Continuation of log storage to the south half of the property would continue on an as needed basis. We would plan to incorporate as much of the open space as possible to enable the maximum amount of storage as possible.

In all of our efforts there will be efforts put towards piling exterior rows in a fashion to minimize noise for surrounding parties.

#### **Staffing Needs**

We would have the following staffing needs at the approximate starting salary rates indicated below to effectively and efficiently operate the proposed yard.

- 1 Michigan Log Truck Driver at an average annual earning level of \$65,000
- 2 Full Time drivers at an annual compensation level of \$50,00-\$60,000 annually
- 1 Part Time Loader Operator for 20 hours per week at \$13.00 per hour
- 1 Secretary part time additional role of 10-15 hours per week at \$13.00/hr.

These needs are based on 20,000 cords annually being transported.






#### **Miners Park Enhancements**

Ottawa Forest products will work with Tom Bergman to determine an appropriate low impact area in which some dozer work will be provided to clear a trail should phase 2 or 3 come to fruition. The trail will aim to enhance its current state and provide access on the East side of the property.

One of the goals would be to help the Miners Park create an entire loop from the Pabst Loop to the Aurora Loop.

Ottawa will be able to work with the City and the Friends of the Park to be able to provide additional trails as well as a potential easement to the south end of the property line.





- 5. Ottawa agrees to using existing access to the Driving Range property.
- 6. If Ottawa decides to sell the property they will give the Friends of the Miners Memorial Heritage Park first right of refusal on the property.

The requirement for capital budgeting and creation of a Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) for the following six fiscal years is found in the Michigan Planning Enabling Act (Public Act 33 of 2008, as amended). Capital budgeting has two elements. The first is a Capital Improvements Plan, and the second is the incorporation of that plan into the annual budget and future budget forecasts. The Capital Improvement Plan is a six year schedule of all proposed major capital improvement projects including project priorities, costs estimates, methods of financing, and annual estimated operating and maintenance costs for the proposed projects. Each year the Capital Improvement Plan is revised for next fiscal year.

Including the Capital Improvement Plan in the annual budget, and future budget forecasts, is primarily for the purpose of adjusting the multi-year program of projects to changing needs and circumstances. It also ensures that projects proposed and planned for are actually completed. At the end of each fiscal year, the projects completed during that year are removed from the plan and an additional year's projects are added. The Capital Improvement Plan is designed to be amended on an annual basis. Projects can be added or subtracted as the needs and resources of the community adjust.
