Marie-Claire was born in Jargeau, France, on August 25, 1940, daughter of Georges and Marie Louise Baudin and middle sister to Micheline, Morique, Marie-Noelle and Marie-Christine. Her devotion to the people she cared about is the character trait that best distinguished her in life and for which she will long be remembered. She always deflected attention from herself, preferring instead to visit, speak with, listen to, tend to and keep in touch with others whom she held dear.

She met her husband, Stephen B. Miller, in France during his US Army tour of duty. Demonstrating remarkable courage, at age 27, Marie-Claire left her beloved France and close-knit family to embark on a new life with Steve in America. She moved to the United States knowing no one but her husband. Yet she bravely embraced her new language, new country and new religious traditions and created an amazing life with Steve, to whom she was totally devoted for 48 years.

Marie-Claire and Steve loved to travel and loved adventure. They enjoyed spending time together at concerts, the heater, art shows and the movies. Marie-Claire even sat through hundreds upon hundreds of hockey games, not because she loved hockey but because Steve loved hockey and she loved Steve. Her devotion to a friend with whom she worked with in Orleans, Leone Tanner, was rekindled at a Charles Aznavour concert in 1967 and their friendship was sustained through a running, almost daily conversation for more than 48 years. Her continued contacts with her French friends in Club Amilte, and with members of her bridge groups over the years were all part of her life.

All of Marie-Claire's friends basked in the sunshine of her devotion as well—her tennis group, her bridge group, friends from Luxmanor and, of course, her French group From her name, to her beauty to her accent that never truly disappeared. Marie-Claire will always be remembered for being French. Despite living in the United States for 50 ears and eventually becoming an American citizen, she never lost her French identity. She loved being part of the French community in Washington, DC, taking her children to the old French Embassy to celebrate Bastille Day and singing "La Marselliaise" with her French compatriots.

Marie-Claire Miller died suddenly on Sunday, December 20, 2015, in Miami, FL, of natural causes, with her husband Steve at her side. Their daughter Sandra Ros and family friend Roger Balsam delivered eulogies at her funeral on December 23. After the service and especially when friends came to pay their respects, the one common rsations was that Marie-Claire "was a lady." That was extremely comforting for family members because they always felt that when Torn Jones made a hit record with Paul Anka's song, "She's a Lady," he must have done so because he knew her. Marie-Claire is buried in Norbeck/Judean Memorial Gardens in Olney, MD. Family and friends will remember fondly this petite, vivacious woman with a heavy French accent as a devoted wife, mother, grandmother, sister and friend.



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Maxime "Max" Chalmin Executive Chef



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Maxime "Max" Chalmin (October 7, 1909 - April 30,

My father, Maxime Chalmin, was born in Coulandon, France, in October 1909. In his late teens and beyond, and after a series of "apprenticeship" assignments as was the professional development protocol in those days, he came to the United States as a cook at the Belgian Pavilion at the 1939 New York World's Fair. Once completed, he returned to France but vowed to return to the United States to start a new life. After the war which he spent in Vichy. France with his new wife Marcelle and newborn son, he left France behind to pursue his dream. In 1948, he landed (again) in New York harbor with his wife and a 4 year old son to begin this saga. It was to be the fulfillment of a lifelong dream and the beginning of anothe

As a young man, raised by a widowed mother in central France, he was always restless as he pursued his passion of being a chef. In France at the time, "apprenticeships" involved working and studying under leading chefs and travelling to other countries to learn new cuisines and cooking methods - which he did. He loved and learned in these "apprentice stages' In Paris, the Cote d'Azur, Cuba, America and Morocco (where he almost left his new family were it not for a last minute visa to the US)!

I still vaguely remember our first months/years after arriving in Flushing, NY. As a 4 year old, it was easy for me to learn English - not so for my parents. My father was then "Sous Chef" at the prestigious Plaza Hotel in New York City. We then moved on from place to place as my father progressed up the ranks in the culinary world. To West Virginia (The Greenbrier Hotel), Cleveland (The Union Club), Los Angeles (The Ambassador Hotel), St. Louis and finally back to New York (The Park Lane Hotel). I was 10 and longing for stability!

It came time when my father became Executive Chef at the Park Lane and subsequently at the ever-famous Toot's Shore restaurant. We finally had found stability when my parents bought our first home on Long Island, New York, and he became the Executive Chef at the United Nations - a position he held for nearly 10 years. We are very proud of the photograph taken with my father and then U.N. Secretary General U. Thant, upon his retirement.

We lived in New York until he retired in February 1987 and bought a restaurant in Belgium ("Le Val Vert"). He returned to the U.S. in 1972 and finished his career teaching Culinary Arts at the prestigious Culinary Institute of America (CIA, Hyde Park, N.Y.) and finally at Johnson & Wales Culinary College (Providence, R.I.) where he taught until he died in 1977, passing on his knowledge to future chefs.

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Maxime "Max" Chalmin Chef de Cuisine

Mon père Maxime Chalmin, est né à Coulandon, un petit village au Centre de la France, en Octobre, 1909. Après sa scolarité et plusieurs filaments comme apprenti (comme cela se faisait à l'époque) il se dirige vers le métier de la restauration et il arrive aux Etats Unis en 1939 comme cuisinier au pavillon Belge de l'Exposition Internationale à N.Y. Il est revenue ensuite en France, mais avec l'espoir de revenir ensuite en Amérique pour y démarrer une nouvelle vie. Apres la guerre, qu'il passe à Vichy avec sa femme Marcelle et son jeune fils, il a quitté la France en 1948 pour enfin réaliser son rêve. En 1948 donc, il est revenu à New York avec sa femme et son fils de 4 ans, c'était l'aboutissement de son rêve et le commencement de sa vraie vie. Etant jeune homme, élevé par sa mère, veuve, il a toujours eu le désir de devenir «chef cuisinier».

En France, en ce temps-là, l'apprentissage consistait à travailler pour apprendre de nouvelles méthodes de cuisine sous l'autorité de grands « chefs ». C'est ce qu'il a fait: il aimait apprendre durant ces stages à Paris. sur la Côte D'Azur, à Cuba, et au Maroc. Un visa de dernière minute pour les USA lui a été octrové.

Je peux vaguement me rappeler nos premiers mois et nos premières années à Flushing, New York, A 4 ans, Il m'a été facile d'apprendre l'Anglai, mais mes parents out eu plus de mal. Mon père était alors « souschef » au prestigieux Plaza Hotel à New York. Nous le suivons dans sa carrière qui progressait dans le monde culinaire. De l'Ouest de la Virginie (Le Greenbrier Hotel), a Cleveland (Union Club), Los Angeles (Ambassador Hotel), St. Louis et finalement ce fut le retour à New York (Park Lane Hotel). J'avais 10 ans, attendant de nous fixer un peu, le rêvais de stabilité!

Elle vint quand mon père est nommé « Exécutive Chef » au Park Lane Hotel et par suite au très fameux Toot's Shore Restaurant. Nous avions enfin trouve la stabilité et mes parents ont achetés leur première résidence à Long Island N.Y. Mon père devient alors « Exécutive Chef » aux Nations Unies, poste qu'il conservera pendant presque 10 ans. Nous resterons à New York jusqu'à sa retraite en 1987. Il acheta alors un restaurant en Belgique prés de Bruxelles - "Le Val Vert", exploite pour

Il retourne à New York en 1972 et finira sa carrière en enseignant les Arts Culinaires à l'école prestigieuse «Culinary Institute of America» (Hyde Park, NY) et au « Johnson & Wales Culinary Collège» (Providence, R.I.) ou il a enseigné jusqu'à sa mort en 1977, transmettant son savoir aux futures cuisiniers américains. Lui aussi ayant transmis son savoir a beaucoup de futures chefs aux Etats Unis.

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Mariano Guadalupe Vallejo Military Commander, Politician and Rancher



Mariano Guadalupe Vallejo (c. - 1890) Military Commander, Politician and Rancher

Mariano Guadalupe Vallejo (c. 1808–1890) was a leader in the struggle for statehood for California. During his lifetime, he witnessed three nations rule California. Born to a wealthy family in Monterey, California, the eighth of 13 children, he entered military service at age 16. A soldier when Mexico took over California from Spain in 1826, Vallejo (va-YAY-ho) supported Californios (native-born California who rebelled against the Mexican governor. In 1829 he led a successful mission against a band of runaway mission Indians. In 1831 he was named commander of the presidio in San Francisco. In 1835 he was appointed commandant of the fourth military district and director of colonization of the northern frontier, the highest military command in northern California.


His next major accomplishment came when Governor Jose Figueroa asked him to lay out a pueblo at the Solano mission and authorized him to free the Indian workers and distribute the mission lands and assets to settlers. This colonization plan was designed to prevent further extension of the Russian establishment of Fort Ross. As a reward for his success, he was given approximately 44 acres in the Petaluma Valley to develop as his own private rancho. This agricultural empire and his alreadyestablished civil and military powers made him one of the wealthiest and most influential men of his day in California.

In 1841 the Russians decided to abandon their outposts at Bodega and Fort Ross and offered to sell the fort to Vallejo. After several months of delays in the negotiations, the fort was purchased by John

Sutter. This setback reinforced Vallejo's belief that California would be better served if it were ruled by the United States rather than Mexico City. In 1946 a group of unruly frontiersmen "attacked" the pueblo of Sonoma, arrested Vallejo and imprisoned him in Sutter's fort. They then raised a newly designed flag—the Bear Flag—over Sonoma. Within a month, the U.S. flag was raised in California, and the new officials released Vallejo and allowed him to return home. Sadly, he found that during his imprisonment and loss of power, his rancho was looted of its cattle, horses and other assets by the Bear Flaggers and Captain John C. Freemont. Despite this action, Vallejo sided with the Americans in the Mexican War (1846–1848).

In 1848 Vallejo was one of eight Californíos elected to the California Constitutional Convention. He then served three terms in the state legislature. Because his lands had been granted by the Mexican government, he spent much of the next decade successfully defending his land rights. He wrote his multivolume history of California to document the role played by Californios. The town of Vallejo, California, bears his name. In 1965, a Benjamin Franklin Class Ballistic Missile Submarine named for him as the \$SBN-658 was launched, and remained proudly in service until it was decommissioned in 1995. 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Mariano Guadalupe Vallejo Comandante Militar, Político y Ranchero



Mariano Guadalupe Vallejo (c. - 1890) Comandante Militar, Político y Ranchero


Mariano Guadalupe Vallejo (c. 1808-1890) fue uno de los líderes en la lucha de California por ser estado. A lo largo de su vida, fue testigo del gobierno de tres naciones en California. Nacido en una familia acaudalada de Monterrey. California, el octavo de 13 hermanos, ingresó al servicio militar a la edad de 16 años. Era soldado en 1820 cuando Méjico se apoderó de California, que estaba en manos de España, y Vallejo apoyó a los californianos que se rebelaron contra el gobernador mejicano. En 1829 lideró una misión exitosa contra una banda de indios fugitivos de una misión. En 1831 fue nombrado comandante del presidio en San Francisco. En 1835 fue designado comandante del cuarto distrito militar y director de la colonización de la frontera del norte, el comando militar más alto del norte de California

Su siguiente logro importante ocurrió cuando el Gobernador José Figueroa le solicitó diseñar y establecer un pueblo en la misión Solano y lo autorizó a liberar a los trabajadores indígenas y a distribuir las tierras de la misión y los recursos a los colonos. Este plan de colonización tenía el objetivo de evitar que se siguiera extendiendo más el establecimiento ruso en Fort Ross. Como recompensa por su éxito, se le adjudicaron a Vallejo aproximadamente 44 acres en el Valle de Petaluma para establecer su propio rancho privado. Este emporio agricultor sumado a sus poderes civiles y militares ya reconocidos lo convirtieron en uno de los hombres más ricos e influyentes del momento en California

En 1841 los rusos decidieron abandonar sus puestos de avanzada en Bodega y Fort Ross y ofrecieron vender el fuerte a Vallejo. Luego de varios meses de demora en las negociaciones, el fuerte fue comprado por John Sutter. Este revés reforzó la idea de Vallejo de que sería mejor para California estar bajo el gobierno de Estados Unidos que el de la Ciudad de Mélico. En 1946 un grupo de colonizadores rebeldes "atacaron" el pueblo de Sonoma, arrestaron a Vallejo y lo mantuvieron prisionero en el fuerte de Sutter, Luego izaron una bandera recientemente creada —la Bandera del Oso-sobre Sonoma. Al término de un mes, la bandera de Estados Unidos flameaba en California, y los nuevos funcionarios liberaron a Vallejo y le permitieron regresar a casa. Desafortunadamente, al llegar halló que durante su encarcelamiento y pérdida de poder, su rancho había sido saqueado por los partidarios de la Bandera del Oso y del Capitán John C. Freemont, quienes se llevaron todo su ganado, caballos y demás bienes. A pesar de esta acción, Vallejo tomó partido por los americanos durante la Guerra de Méjico (1846-1848).

En 1848 Vallejo fue uno de los ocho californianos elegidos para formar parte de la Convención Constitucional de California. Luego estuvo durante tres períodos en la legislatura del estado. Dado que sus tierras le habían sido concedidas por el gobierno mejicano, dedicó gran parte de la década siguiente a defender exitosamente sus derechos sobre estas tierras. Escribió su historia de California en varios volúmenes para documentar el rol que desempeñaron los californíos. La ciudad de Vallejó, en California, lleva su nombre. En 1965 se lanzó un Submarino de Misiles Balísticos clase Benjamin Franklin que se denominó en nombre de él SSBN-658. Este submarino continuó en servicio hasta que fue desmantelado en 1995. 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Albert "Chew" Kullen Businessman

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Albert "Chew" Kullen (December 27, 1909 - July 30 1966) Businessman

Albert "Chew" Kullen was born in Baltimore, Maryland, the oldest of four children. His parents, Sam and Mary Kulchinsky, were Jewish immigrants from Russia and, in addition to a rich appreciation for their heritage, they afforded their children a unique distinction. Although born in different months, each of Chew's younger brothers, Harry and Sol, were also born on the 27th and his sister, Sarah, married a man born on the 27th

Chew grew up in Baltimore, but he left high school early to help his parents support the family. He briefly moved to New York City, where he met his future wife. Irene, and they had one daughter. Marilyn. Returning to Baltimore, he began a career in the vending machine business, which then included slot machines. To many, his personality made him seem like a real-life "Damon Runvon" character. Early on, as co-owner of Andrews Vending Co., he learned to cope with the downsides of his job. Like many of his peers, he was investigated by nearly every law enforcement agency concerned about the potential for illegal activity. The results of every investigation were always the same—no racketeering connections, no tax dodging, and no hoodlum activity

Through sheer charisma and intelligence, Chew soon became the leading spokesperson for the slots industry. Because of his growing prominence in the state's political arena, in 1946 he and his brothers -who were also making names for themselves in the advertising and printing worlds-changed their last name to Kullen. Kullen was easier to pronounce than Kulchinsky, especially when Chew was

advocating for legislation to keep slots legal in the state. More than anyone else, he was statistically aware and verbally vocal about the positive economic effects that slots had on both the county and the state, including generating hundreds of well-paying jobs.

His impact on Anne Arundel County was far greater than just being the most well-known advocate for his industry in the state. He was a tireless campaigner for the North Arundel Hospital, and his efforts, along with those of the machine operators he represented, were driving forces in its creation. He was an annual sponsor of the baseball league and of numerous causes to improve the health and well-being of his fellow county residents. Yet, above all, he was a man who always demonstrated fairness in his business dealings that even the most formidable critics of his industry admired.

Chew Kullen died in 1986 of a sudden heart attack while working at his Glen Bernie office. He left behind a legacy of integrity, honesty and leadership in an industry that would ultimately cease to exist in his area. (Photograph of Chew Kullen and Sam Kulchinsky from the Kullen Family Archives.)

Constantine "Connie" Foltis was born in New York City on December 1, 1929, and died at Bailey Family Center for Caring of Community Hospice in St. Augustine, Florida, on June 16, 2011. Those who knew him at the Center would never forget his generosity, talent, laughter, friendship, love, and compassion. He was one of the friendliest people one would ever meet. His spirit lives on through the lives he touched and through the Constantine Foltis Memorial Foundation named in his honor. His will instructed his family to bury his ashes at sea.

Connie's father and mother immigrated to the United States from Russia and Scotland, respectively. Connie's father grew up in a Greek community in Russia and sailed around the world until he landed in New York City where he started in the food business pushing a donut cart. He quickly built a chain of 33 restaurants famed in New York City. Greek culture dominated family and business

Connie grew up in Flushing, New York, with his two older sisters named Helen and Jeannie. Connie's extended family summered each year at the family summer home on Shelter Island near the Hamptons on Long Island. He and his family adored Shelter Island, which remained a central focus throughout his lifetime. Here he found his passion for sailing and pursued his love for photography. He took thousands of pictures of sights and people, often developing them himself in his darkroom.

Connie excelled at school where he focused mainly on technical subjects. After graduating from

Brooklyn Tech High School, he went on to obtain degrees in Naval Architecture and Marine Engineering at the University of Michigan. He began his career in naval architecture at the Rosenblatt Shipyard in Seattle

ie married after graduating from college and raised two daughters, Christine Robinson and Rosemary Foltis, who live in the Washington Metro Area. He taught them to sail and ski as well as other interests. Connie sailed, took photographs, skied downhill skier as he lived and traveled around the U.S., Europe, and the Caribbean

Connie began his 30-year Federal Government career as a marine engineer and naval architect at the Maritime Administration in Washington, D.C. Here he received a Department of Transportation Award for Superior Achievement. Prior to his retirement, he helped create a design for offloading cargo ships still used around the world

Connie always sailed, raced and taught family members and friends to sail. He sailed at the University of Michigan Sailing Club where he made life-long friendships. He later sailed at clubs near Seattle, in Maryland, in Virginia, and in Florida. He timed his retirement to sail back from England with friends. Later, he sailed and lived on his 52-foot yacht, Nightwind, before setting down roots in Palatka on the St. Johns River near St. Augustine, Florida.

e helped others throughout his lifetime. Brought up with animals, Connie often gave homes to them. He volunteered to help schools, served on boards, and provided expert advice to many public and private groups. Connie shared good times and bad with his friends and family, sharing laughter and helping many through hard times.

Rîhei Onishi, a journalist for the Jiji Shimpo, a Tokyo daily newspaper, first came to the United States with his wealthy wine-merchant cousin, Toraichi Onishi, in 1903. They were impressed with the possibilities of growing rice in Texas and purchased approximately 300 acres of land near the property of the Saibara's, a Japanese rice-farming family that had already settled in the area

Onishi was instrumental in leading Japanese immigrants to Texas. In 1903 he returned home and brought the first group of rice-farming immigrants to Texas the following year. During their first year of operation, they grew a Japanese short-grained variety of rice that was respected for its hearty nature That type of rice grew very well in the rich Texas soil and yielded a far greater output than was produced by other Texas rice farmers.

The farming venture soon became well known, but the fact that most of the immigrants who populated the Onishi farm were men created a problem of stability. Without wives, the men could not be expected to remain on the farm and build their own future in Texas. To resolve this problem, Onishi returned to Japan in 1909 to recruit women who would marry his workmen. Many of the women who returned with him came to be known as "picture brides," because they agreed to marry men they had never met. Their only "contact" came from photographs that were exchanged between the prospective bride and groom. Once both parties were in agreement, a wedding ceremony was held in Japan (without the

groom) that enabled the bride to go to America. This wedding process was critical after 1908, because the Gentlemen's Agreement made it impossible for Japanese women to enter the United States unless they were married to American men.

The Onishi family continued to prosper during the era of World War I. However, when the Great Depression hit and the price of rice dropped, many Japanese rice farmers failed and they left Texas. The ones who remained formed an organization to pool their money and loan it to those who most needed help. By this time, Rihei Onishi had moved his family to Massachusetts and only his sons remained in Texas. A Champion for Social History

Allan Kullen

Businessman and Social Entrepreneur February 20, 1942 -

A llan Kullen was born on February 20, 1942, in Washington, DC, and grew up in the area. His father had a success in the printing industry, so Allan chose to attend the Carnegie Institute of Technologie, in Pittsburgh, PA, after graduating from high school in 1959. He graduated from its School of Printing Management in 1963.

To gain more business training, Allan then entered an MBA program at the University of California, Berkeley. During his first year, he met representatives of NBBS, a Duch travel organization that organized student trips to Europe, and began putting out a daily newspaper for the eigh-day rossing by soc. Ble also accepted an internship as a consultant for a printing company in Amsterdam. That fall, rather than returning home, be traveled extensively where, for the first time, he recognized the contributions that diverse cultures make to world history. Allan subsequently decided to enter the workforce rather than resume his schooling at Berkeley.

He began his career as marketing director for his father's printing firm, Kaufmann Press, Inc. When his father's company was acquired by a public company, Publisher's Company, Inc. (Pubco), he went to work for Pubco, first assisting with its acquisitions program and later joining its publishing division. When Pubco began to fail, Allan realized he needed to build a future where he could better control his own destiny, especially since he was now married to the former Dianc Klein and they had two children, Allison and Toold. In 1974, he acquired the assets of a struggling printing company and formed Tool Allan Printing Co., Inc., which he ran until 2013. During that period, he grew the company through internal sales and end-up acquisitions of eight smaller firms, at its peak achieving \$16 million in annual sales and employing 127.

While working at Pubco, he observed that some of its large printing vendors also owned commercial educational properties, and he brought that manufacturing strategy to Todd Allan. He set up his own publishing company in the early 1980s by buying a program called The First Experience, which featured photographs and texts on the contributions that immigrants entering through Ellis Island and to our nations' development. At the same time, he was printing for the Coordinating Committee for Ellis Island, a similarly focused nonprofit group.

Drawing inspiration from his extensive travels and reinforcing his interest in history. Allan then founded and became president of the People of America Foundation and became oc-developer of its social studies resources program, Americans All. The program includes printed lexts and recordings, period-specific posters and photographs, and simulations and teacher's agaides, all developed by a team of scholars led by Americans All codeveloper Dr. Gall C. Christopher: More recent program components support excellence in sexcial studies instruction by increasing access to high-quality resources for classrooms and professional development opportunities for teachers.







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
