

Examples of honoree montages and information on how to create one for your legacy story

The photo montage of your honoree's legacy story must be created off line and uploaded to the story template as a single image. The minimum width is 800 pixels (10.67 inches) and the maximum height is 1600 pixels (21.33 inches). If the montage is larger, the template will reduce it proportionately to fit.

The most efficient way to begin is to select all the desired images and put them into a single folder on your desktop. If you are not sure of the layout, select more images than you think you need so you do not have to search for them later. From the folder, copy-and-paste (or drag-and-drop) each image into the design template and modify the size and position as desired.

Pages 2 shows nine thumbnail versions of montages of different sizes that contain only images. The full-size versions of each of these thumbnails begins on page 3.






Page 12 shows nine thumbnail versions of montages that combine images and text captions in various formats. The full-size versions of each of these thumbnails begins on page 13.

The most popular montage programs for experienced users are *InDesign* and *Photoshop*. However, those with more limited computer skills can take advantage of the many free montage programs (apps) are available online. For example, one such app, <http://spark.adobe.com>, is it previewed on pages 22 and 23.


PowerPoint can also be used in landscape (horizontal) format. However, if you want a larger montage, the portrait (vertical) format can be used but requires an additional step. Instructions on how to use PowerPoint and how to enlarge the image begin on page 24.



Chalmin, Maxime “Max” [Chalmin Family] (October 7, 1909 - April 30, 1977) Executive Chef

Constantine "Connie" Foltis was born in New York City on December 1, 1929, and died at Bailey Family Center for Caring of Community Hospice in St. Augustine, Florida, on June 16, 2011. Those who knew him at the center would never forget his generosity, talent, laughter, friendship, love, and compassion.



Kullen, Albert "Chew" [Marilyn Ehrlich] (December 27, 1909 - July 30, 1966) Businessman Albert "Chew" Kullen was born in Baltimore, Maryland, the oldest of four children. His parents, Sam and Mary Kulchinsky, were Jewish immigrants from Russia and, in addition to a rich appreciation for their heritage, they afforded their children a unique distinction.



Moore, Harold "Hal" [People of America Foundation] (*February 13, 1922 – February 10, 2017*) Military Officer and Author

Born in Bardstown, Kentucky, Lt. Gen. Harold Gregory “Hal” Moore moved to Washington, DC, where he completed his high school education. He attended The George Washington University for two years before receiving his appointment to the United States Military Academy.


Annual Four-Day Golf Party







Allan S. Kullen [Gordon Bernhardt] (*February 20, 1942 -*) Businessman and Social Entrepreneur






Polly Bemis [Asian American Comparative Collection, Priscilla Wegars.]



Sonia Shainwald Orbuch (born Sarah) grew up in Lubomi, a small market town 200 miles from Warsaw, Poland, with a thriving population of about 8,000, two-thirds of whom were Jewish. Her family lived near the center of the town on #37 Chelmska Street, near her many friends and relatives. Inside their modest home, Sonia grew up under the caring . . .





Zebulon Montgomery Pike [Texas State Historical Association] (*January 5, 1779 - April 27, 1813*) United States Army Officer and Western Explorer /node/564933

Zebulon Montgomery Pike, United States Army officer and Western explorer, was born on January 5, 1779, at Lambertson, now a part of Trenton, New Jersey, the son of Isabella (Brown) and Zebulon Pike, a veteran of the American Revolution and a lieutenant colonel in the United States Army. After receiving some education in . . .



Battle of Antietam, Maryland—A re-enactment of the battle at Bloody Lane, September 17, 1862. For nearly 4 hours, 5,000 Union forces under Maj. Gen. William H. French and 2,600 Confederate forces under Maj. Gen. Daniel Harvey Hill, fought in the “Sunken Clay Road” as it was known to area residents prior to the Battle of Antietam. There were more than 5,500 casualties, and at the end, it was said that the blood flowed like a river inside it, giving it the name “Bloody Lane.”


Antietam, Battle of [Ancient Order of Hibernians] (*September 17, 1862 - September 22, 1862*)
Revolutionary War Battle /node/564870

The bloodiest day in American history took place during the Civil War and the Irish had a major part in the Union victory that day. It took place at Antietam on September 17, 1862, and it was the victory that emboldened President Lincoln to issue the Emancipation Proclamation. Foremost among Union forces was the Irish Brigade led by Irish-born Gen. Thomas F Meagher.


1. Select the images you want to use and put them into one folder on your desktop. If you are not sure of the layout, select more than you might need to avoid searching for them later.




2. Choose and download the app. This one is “http://spark.adobe.com.”


3. Choose the style and click on it. (In this case, it is “Popular” and “poster.”) Then click on “Next.”




4. Click on “Upload” and a list of folders (if you are using Microsoft) will appear on the page. Click on the folder that has your images and it will appear in the “File name:” field. Apple is similar.







5. Double click on the “Upload” button (which no longer has a blue background) and click on the image from your folder. Repeat the steps until all images that you want are selected and then click on next.



6. Your image will appear (top left). You will also see variations that are available from the program (top right) and by clicking on a specific variation, your images will automatically appear in the new design (bottom). You can manually changes their shapes and locations.



7. Once you have finished the layout, click on “Download” and put the montage into your folder so it will be available when you add it to your legacy story.




How to create a montage for your legacy story using PowerPoint

You can easily create a montage for your legacy story using PowerPoint. If you use PowerPoint in the landscape (horizontal) format, note that the number of images you can include is less than if you use the portrait (vertical) format. See page 25 for instructions on how to change the format of a PowerPoint file. If you use the portrait (vertical) format for the montage, an additional step is required to increase its size to meet the minimum requirements to upload the image to your story. Several free apps are available that will enable you to do this. See pages 26 and 27.


The most efficient way to begin is to select all the desired images and put them into a single folder on your desktop. If you are not sure of the layout, select more images than you think you need so you do not have to search for them later. To create the montage, open the folder on your desktop that contains all the images. Then open a new PowerPoint file and either drag-and-drop (or copy-and-paste) each image from the folder into your new design template. Crop each image and position it as desired. If text is desired, use the appropriate icon and insert the text into the layout. Then save the montage as “.jpeg” or “.png” file and place it in your image folder so it can be easily found when you upload it to your story.

How to Change a PowerPoint Format From Landscape (Horizontal) to Portrait (Vertical)


1. Select the **View** tab on the toolbar ribbon, and then click **Normal**.
2. Select the **Design** tab.



3. Near the right end, select **Slide Size** in the Customized group, and then click **Custom Slide Size**.



4. In the **Slide Size** dialog box, select **Portrait**.



5. In the next dialog box, you can select **Maximize** to take full advantage of the space available, or you can select **Ensure Fit** to make sure that your image fits on the vertical page.
